## MADE A BAD BREAK.

Chairman Richardson, of the House committee on state affairs, made a bad break the other day in recommending the passage of the bill abolishing the game warden system. We always gave him credit for better sense. The game warden system has proved its value, not only by increasing over ten fold the convictions for violations of the fish and game laws and by collecting in fines more than the whole amount paid by the state for the expense of the office, but more than all this by preventing violations and preserving fish and game. Any person at all acquainted with operations of the law in northern Michigan knows that the system has paid for itself a hundred times over.

We can't understand what ails some of our legislators anyway in blundering into the very thing they ought not to do. What was the use of spending time at the expense of the people trying to abolish an office which is no burden and which all the people want? There was no demand for its abolishment, but on the other hand the press of the state is unanimously in favor of the continuance of the system and the legislature has been flooded with protests against its abolishment.

There is no excuse for it on the grounds of economy, because the cost of the office is so insignificant compared with the millions of dollars that it takes to run the state that it wouldn't be worth considering, even if the office was of no earthly use. Even if the bill should pass without opposition, the time that it would take in the legislature would cost more than the yearly expenses of the office.

If the members of the legislature understand the case and we believe they do, they will not make themselves ridiculous by voting sixty thousand dollars more, in addition to the immense sums already paid for stocking our waters with fish and then allow Tom, Dick and the d—l to destroy all the results of this propagation, simply to save the state a twelve hundred dollar salary. We who live in northern Michigan know that without special officers to enforce the fish and game laws there will be no enforcement and instead of helping out the system our reform legislature should reform its defects by passing the Wachtel bill which will provide deputies empowered to act anywhere in the state, as asked for by the fish commissioners and yet does not create any new offices nor increase the expense to the people.

## The Eight Hour Demand.

The failure of the miners and mine operators to settle their difference at the recent Pittsburgh convention reduces the question of a strike in that industry to well nigh a certainty. And when it comes it will be of gigantic proportions, directly involving an enormous number of persons and indirectly affecting the welfare of a vast army besides. The eight hour demand is the matter on which the issue will be joined. It is known that the American miners are thoroughly organized for their proposed strike and that the greatest labor organization in the world—the American Federation of Labor—will lend its moral and financial support to the struggle. Beyond the seas, also, there are indications of a determination among the miners of the old world to join in the struggle for a shorter day, those on the continent being the more agitated on the subject.

Should the strike extend to all the American mining districts, not far from 100,000 men will be directly involved and half a million of people indirectly affected, with a perceptible effect upon the business of the entire country. Perhaps the strike and the destitution and distress which invariably accompany such occurrences are inevitable. There may be no other way to bring about the improvement of its condition which labor regards as imperatively demanded by the interests of human progress and social emancipation; and employers may regard the change as impracticable. Yet there is room for concessions and mutual forbearance, and it is hoped that the conservative and patriotic among capitalists and laborers will choose the smoother part of concession and gradual approach, rather than that of stubborn resistance and entire surrender.

## An Octogenarian Passes Away.

After an illness of two weeks, Mrs. Mary Glendon, the relict of the late Patrick Glendon, died at the residence of her son, East Tawas Thursday morning April 30th, at 6:30, aged 84 years.

The deceased was born at Killkenney, Ireland. About 50 year ago, in company with her husband and small children, she left the home of her fathers to seek a new home in America, settling at Toronto, Ont. After a residence at that place of 25 years she came to Baldwin township, this county, where her partner in life for 55 years, died seven years ago. Two sons and a daughter survive her. Thos. Glendon, of East Tawas, Michael Glendon, of Wash. and Mrs. Andrew Murphy, of this place.

The funeral will be held from St. Joseph church to-morrow, at 8:30 a. m. The remains will be interred at the Catholic cemetery.

# BOARD OF SUPERVISORS.

The board of supervisors of Iosco county met at the court house in the village of Tawas City in said county, on the 21st day of April, A. D. 1891 at one o'clock p. m., pursuant to call of one-third of the members of the board and notice given by the clerk to each member of the board.

The following supervisors answered to their names: Thos. Wilson, 1st ward, AuSable; Geo. Orth, 2nd ward, AuSable; Geo. E. Mason, 3rd ward, AuSable; Selig Solomon, mayor AuSable; T. D. Hawley, in place of C. R. Henry as city attorney, AuSable; Wm. J. Angell, AuSable; Asa Rodman, Wilbur; J. E. Dillon, Baldwin; A. J. Ferrister, Plainfield; S. M. Dillabough, Reno; Jas. A. Jackson, Sherman; F. W. Latham, Grant; Jas. Hurford, Burleigh; B. F. Slingerland, Alabaster; A. F. Zeiter, Tawas; T. P. Thompson, Thompson; Chris. Yockey, Oscoda.

On motion T. F. Thompson was chosen temporary chairman. The board then proceeded to the election of a permanent chairman for the ensuing year. Three candidates were in the field, Zeiter, Orth and Wilson. First ballot Zeiter 10, Orth 3, Wilson 2. The motion was made formal and Supervisor Zeiter was declared elected chairman of the board of supervisors.

The chairman appointed the following supervisors as temporary auditing committee: B. F. Slingerland, Thomas Wilson, T. D. Hawley, A. J. Rodman and F. W. Latham.

Moved and supported that the chairman appoint a committee of three on Rules of Order.

Motion prevailed. The chairman then appointed the following named persons as such committee: Supervisors Hawley, Orth and M. J. Connine, prosecuting attorney.

Moved and supported that the bill of Cutcheon and Elliot for services in the case of Iosco county vs. Robert Merrick, be reconsidered. Motion prevailed.

Moved and supported that the bill of Cutcheon and Elliot for services in the Merrick case be referred to the prosecuting attorney for his opinion. Carried. Report of Auditing Committee:

City, Towns and Villages—Selig Solomon, A. J. Rodman, F. W. Latham, S. M. Dillabough, Geo. E. Mason.

Equalization—Jas. E. Dillon, Geo. Orth, Chris. Yockey, B. F. Slingerland, James Hurford.

On motion the board then adjourned until the 22nd day of April A. D., 1891, at 9 o'clock a. m.

APRIL 22ND, 1891.

The board of supervisors of Iosco county met at the court house in the village of Tawas City in said county on the 22nd day of April, A. D. 1891, at 9 o'clock a. m. pursuant to adjournment.

Roll call. Present—Wilson, Angell, Latham, Ferrister, Dillabough, Jackson, Latham, Hurford and Zeiter, Quorum present.

Moved and supported that the chairman appoint a committee of three to estimate the expense and to consider the

advisability of constructing a road to extend east on town line between townships of Grant, Sherman, Tawas and Alabaster. Motion carried.

The chair then appointed as such committee Supervisors, Latham, Dillabough and Jackson.

Supervisor Dillabough offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That the county treasurer at the meeting on the second Monday in June next, make his report to the board of supervisors as to the standing of each township and that he make his quarterly report as contemplated in section 72 of the Public Acts of 1889, the same being act No. 195.

Moved by Wilson and supported, that the resolution be adopted, which motion was carried by a full vote of the board. On motion the clerk was ordered to send a certified copy of the resolution to the county treasurer.

On motion the board took a recess of one hour.

After recess of one hour the board was called to order and the chairman ordered the roll called.

The following members were present: Wilson, Mason, Solomon, Hawley, Angell, Rodman, Dillon, Ferrister, Dillabough, Jackson, Latham, Hurford, Zeiter and Thompson.

Minutes of April the 21st 1891, were read and on motion approved.

The following communication was received and read, and on motion it was ordered placed on file.

Oscoda, Mich. 4-22, 1891.

To the Board of Supervisors of Iosco County:

Gentlemen:—I think it right for me to advise you that up to this time I have been able to effect no settlement of the state and county tax with the city of AuSable, and therefore their hands unpaid \$3198.81 of state and county tax.

Moved and supported that the following resolution be adopted:

Resolved, That a special committee consisting of the president of this board and one other member of this board, together with the prosecuting attorney and county treasurer as ex-officio members be appointed to confer with a similar committee of the common council of the city of AuSable to collect the delinquent personal tax.

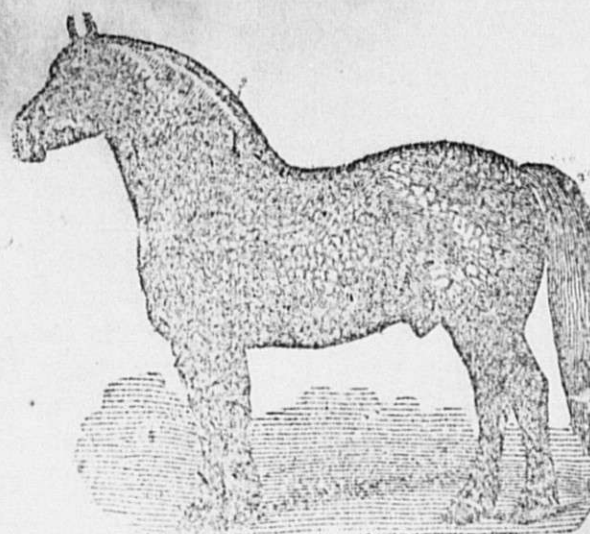




