President pro tem. Bennett in the chair. Clerk being absent trustee Murphy appointed to act. Roll call. Present trustees Murphy, Bonney, Bennett and Miller.

On motion council adjourned until Monday evening May 4th, 1891.

President Watson in the chair. Roll call by the clerk.

The bill of S. Vaughn of 50c for burying a dead cat was allowed.

Moved by Murphy supported by Bennett that the freight bond be fixed at \$2000. All voted yes.

Moved by Murphy supported by Bennett that W. M. Ellison be appointed chief engineer. Carried. All voting yes.

The play of North street was read and on motion of Bennett supported by Bonney was approved. All voting yes.

Moved by Miller and supported by Murphy that the fire committee be instructed to locate stations for fire engine in different parts of the village and report at the next meeting.

Carried. All voting yes.

Moved by Miller and supported by Murphy that the street commissioner be instructed to notify owners of lots on Elm, Oak and Court sts to build the side walks in proper time and to comply with notice given in cause the same.

Carried.

Moved by Miller and supported by Murphy that the street commissioner be instructed to notify owners of lots on Elm, Oak and Court sts to build the side walks in proper time and to comply with notice given in cause the same.

Carried.

Moved by Miller and supported by Bennett that the village attorney be instructed to protect the village.

Carried. All voting yes.

Clerk Mount was granted a furlough for balance of evening.

Murphy appointed to act.

Moved by Miller and supported by Bennett that the council proceed to an informal ballot for marshal. Carried.

Moved by Miller supported by Bonney that A. W. Lowe be declared duly elected marshal. Carried all voting yes.

Sealed bids for night watchman and lamp lighting were opened and were:

Wm. Phelan, \$39. per mo. for year; H. Thieman \$35 per mo; John Sims \$25 per day; Stephen Vaughn \$1.25 per night as satisfactory to council.

Moved by Bonney and supported by Miller that the bid of S. Vaughn be accepted and hours of duty be fixed on 5 p. m. until 4 a. m.

Carried. All voting yes.

Moved by Miller and supported by Bennett that Stephen Vaughn be appointed as special police.

Moved by Murphy and supported by the resolution fixing the marshal's salary at \$100 be recinded. Carried.

Moved by Bennett and supported by the salary of marshal be fixed at \$100 per year with a fee of \$2.50 per call of tax roll collector.
