What We Observed.

No Finer Land in Northern Michigan
Nor Under the Sun than Lays
In Iosco County.

A trip on the Hemlock road revealed to us the fact that no better farming country or better farms can be seen in Northern Michigan. We drove to the Hemlock bridge which is about 12 miles from Tawas City. Field after field of grain, potatoes and hay met our view until we reached the farm of George Hall. Mr. Hall has 80 acres, with about 40 acres cleared, with good farm buildings, good fences, a quantity of stock, bees &c. Next to Hall on the North side of the Hemlock road and on the East is the 80 acre farm of Barney Monahan, with about 15 acres cleared and in grain and potatoes, good fence, but no buildings as yet. On the same side of the road a short distance to the Eastward is the 80 acre farm of Mr. Herman Brown, with about 50 acres cleared, with good fences and good buildings, being under grain, root crops and hay. On the same side of the road the next large farm we saw was the farm of Henry Watts, who owns about 300 acres, with about 150 acres cleared, good buildings and fences and a large amount of stock. Across the road on the South side opposite Geo. Hall's is a 120 acres belonging to Wm. Bamberger, who has over 80 acres cleared and under crops, good buildings and fences and a good variety of stock and mostly under grain and root crops. On the East is Robert Watts who has 80 acres, with 25 cleared, a good barn and fences, Robert has not caught the bird yet, consequently he has no cage. We almost forgot Dan. Kennedy with an 80 acre farm, about 20 cleared under crops, with good buildings. Opposite Dan. is Sam. Bamberger with 80 acres and 50 cleared, good buildings and under grain, hay and root crops. Next is Chas. Bamberger, with 80 acres of first-class land 40 cleared, good buildings and mostly under grain. We next come to the large farm of Frederick Latham who has about 100 acres under cultivation and in grain, hay and root crops, Mr. Latham has fathered Grant township for about 20 years, being elected Supervisor every spring. Opposite Mr. Latham's is the farm of Henry Watt's Jr 80 acres, with 60 cleared and a fine new barn. His farm is mostly under hay and root crops. We almost forgot the farm of Peter Bamberger which lays along side of Mr. Watts with 35 acres cleared and in good crops. Next to Fred Latham's on the East is the farm of John Scarlet, 120 acres with about 80 acres cleared, with good buildings and first-class crops. Next comes another solid farmer, his name in big letters is Geo. Culham who has 80 acres, all cleared and in grain hay and root crops, a good new house and other buildings, fences, &c. Next is the Hyland farm of 40 acres, all cleared, but now owned by Thos. Curry, and being under hay and grain, with good fences and buildings. Next comes the farm of Andrew Murphy, known as the Wade farm, being 40 acres all cleared, mostly under hay, good fences and buildings. Next comes the farm of the Kennedy Bros. 120 acres, with about 80 acres cleared.

Next is the 80 acre farm of Thos. Low opposite Geo. Culham with 70

acres cleared, good buildings and crops, mostly grain. On the East of Mr. Low is Barney Long, with an 80 acre farm, 70 cleared, good buildings and fences and fine crops. Next on East is the Conover farm of 80 acres with 70 cleared, good crops and buildings. John Curry comes next with a fine 80 acre farm 65 acres cleared with good buildings and crops, and a large quantity of stock. Bob Aikins has the next 80 acres with 60 acres cleared and a good cage, horses and carriages, but has no bird for the cage. The next farm is Thos Davis with 80 acres 65 cleared mostly in grain.

Our observation of the above was those farms we seen while driving along the Hemlock Road. Those North and South of the road will hear from us soon, also the Meadow road.

Summer Resort.

Tawas Lake, only two miles distant has been looked upon as a place for pleasure and amusement. Tenting and camping out, fishing and boat riding are the principal pleasures. Sheriff Bradley and family in company with Miss Conover and others from this city are at the lake camping. Henry Barringer and family of East Tawas and others are also in line with Mr. VanPatten at the head. If Tawas City and East Tawas would put their shoulders to the wheel a more beautiful pleasure resort could not be found in northern Michigan, than could be made at Tawas Lake. This lake is three miles long and one-half mile wide, one mile from East Tawas and two miles from Tawas City.

Ordance No. 31.

An Ordinance Relative to the Planting of Shade, Fruit and Ornamental Trees and the protection of the same from Injury.

Sec. I. The Village of Tawas City Ordains: That any person owning or occupying any land adjoining any public street in said Village, may plant or set out shade, fruit or ornamental trees on such street contingent to his land, which trees shall be set in regular rows at a distance of not less than six, nor more than twenty feet from each other, and on streets sixty feet wide, eight feet from the line of lots, and on streets fifty feet wide, six feet from the line of lots, the trees not to be less than eight feet high and not less than two inches in diameter properly set and guarded by stake or guard.

Sec. II. No person shall hitch, tie or fasten in any manner, any horse or horses, ox or oxen, or other animal to any shade, fruit or ornamental tree standing or growing in any of the public streets, alleys or lanes of the Village of Tawas City, or within reach of any shade tree. No person shall break or cut down, root up, injure, destroy, remove, girdle, cut, bruise or in any way deface any shade, fruit or ornamental tree, standing or growing in any public street, or upon any public ground or land or alley in the Village of Tawas City, or any stake or guard properly set and guarding the same, and any person who shall willfully violate any of the provisions of this section, shall on conviction thereof be punished by a fine not exceeding twenty-five dollars and cost of prosecution, or by imprisonment in the county jail of said Village of Tawas City, or in the common jail of Iosco County for a period not exceeding sixty days, or both—such fine and imprisonment at the discretion of the Court before whom such conviction is had, and in the imposition of such fine and costs the Court may make, further order, that the offender be committed to said jail or to the common jail of Iosco County until the payment thereof, provided that the whole of such imprisonment shall not exceed the term of sixty days.

Sec. III. This Ordinance shall take effect on and after the 17th day of August, A. D. 1891.
