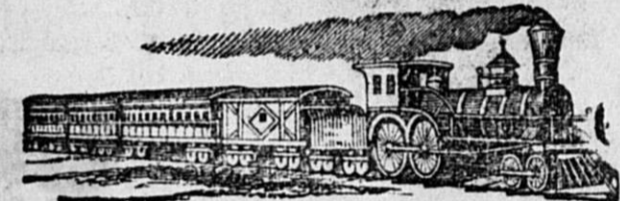

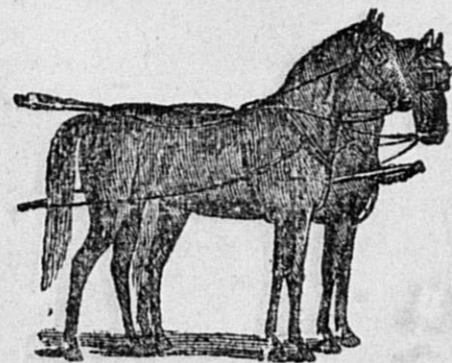

The village council met in regular session at the Village Hall, Tawas City, Sept. 28, 1891.

Motion by Smith supported by Koenig that the above bills be referred to the proper committee. Carried, all voting yes.

The committee to whom the above bills were referred reported favorably on all except that of Mr. Webster, which was allowed at \$2.50 instead of \$2.75.

Motion by Smith supported by Bonney that the above bills be allowed as reported by the committee. Carried, all voting yes.

Motion by Bennett, supported by Koenig that the committee on water works be granted further time in which to make their report. Carried, all voting yes.

Motion by Smith supported by Bonney that the committee on electric light be granted further time to make report. Carried, all voting yes.

Motion by Bonney supported by Koenig that the President be authorized to extend the time for the collection of village taxes for thirty days. Carried, all voting yes.

Trustee Murphy then came in and took his seat.

Motion by Bonney supported by Smith that the Clerk be instructed to write notices and have them served on property owners to rebuild the sidewalks on the south east side of Lake st from W. S. & L. Co's tram to VanWey's new building. Carried, all voting yes.

Motion by Bonney supported by Murphy that the nightwatchman commence his duties each day at 4 o'clock in the afternoon and continue on duty until 3 o'clock in the morning. Carried, all voting yes.

Motion by Koenig supported by Murphy that the council adjourn until Friday evening next. Carried.

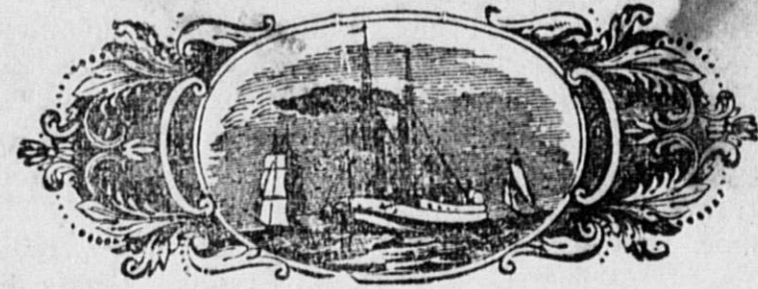

OUR FARMING COUNTRY.

A. Trip Through the Farming Country in Burleigh, Reno, Grant and Plainfield Townships.

(Continued from last week.)

Archy McLain was the next farm located on Sec 16-21-5, who has 20 acres with about 12 acres cleared, and has good buildings etc.

Dave Erhart was our next farm with 20 acres of land in sec 16-21-5, and 18 acres cleared, and has good crops, buildings, fences etc.

Chas Bronson has the n w 1-4 of the n w 1-4 of sec 15-21-5, with 20 acres cleared, and had good fences and buildings.

Frank Bronson was our next halt. He owns the n e of n w sec 15, has 5 acres cleared, being only newly started.

Sam Kelley owns 80 acres in sec 15 and has 30 acres cleared with good buildings and first class crops, having 200 bushels of grain, 400 bushels of potatoes, 400 bushels of bagas and 10 tons of hay.

Frank Hunter owns the n e of s e 1-4 of sec 16; has 7 acres cleared and is mostly in grain and root crops.

Tom. Ruckle owner of the w 1-2 of the n e 1-4 of sec 16 has 15 acres cleared, good buildings and first class crops and a quantity of stock.

Jonas Erhart has about 10 or 15 acres cleared and is located on the s e of s e 1-4 of sec 16. Has a good start for a new farm.

Dave Tucker owns the e 1-2 of the n e 1-4 sec 21 and has good buildings, crops and a lot of stock and poultry and has 25 acres cleared.

Edwin Fry was the next man we met, who informed us that he owned 280 acres of land in secs 28, 29 and 30, 21-5 and has 170 acres cleared, good buildings and fences, has 32 head of cattle, 6 horses, 20 sheep, 32 hogs, 100 ducks, 20 geese, 20 turkeys, and other stock. He has 4 acres of potatoes, 8 acres of corn, and has threshed 1100 bushels of grain. Mr. Fry is located on what is known as the old Keystone Farm, having purchased the same a few years ago, and is now one of those enterprising grangers from "away back."

Our next visit was at the farm of Fred Hess, who holds the funds for Burleigh township, being township treasurer. Mr. Hess has also a fine farm, having good buildings and fences. He has added some extensive repairs to his dwelling, and painted the same in an artistic manner. He is located on the e 1/2 of the n e 1/4, sec 20 and has the n w of s w 1/4, sec 16-21-5. He has 60 acres cleared, has thrashed about 400 bushels of grain, and raised 25 tons of hay, and 250 bushels of corn, 4 acres of root crops; has 20 hives of bees, has ready for market 1000 lbs of honey. Fred says Iosco county is good enough for him. He has no idea of "going West."

We did not have time to call on C. F. Gordon, who is located on the n 1/2 of the n e 1/4 sec 19-21-5, who has 40 acres cleared, a good orchard, good buildings, and first-class crops. He has 9 acres of grain, 5 acres corn, and raised 25 tons of hay, two acres of potatoes and other crops, such as roots, fruit, &c. He has a quantity of stock of every description. Mr. G. has a first-class farm. The best of soil is in that neighborhood.

Samuel Brooks owns the n w 1/4 of n w 1/4 sec, 20, and has ten acres

cleared, good buildings, crops, fences and a quantity of stock.

Geo. Scheffer owns the w 1/2 of n e 1/4 sec 20, has 17 acres cleared, good crops, and a good young orchard. This farm is now worked by Mr. J. P. Colvin, formerly one of the merchants of Whittemore.

Ed. Wilson is another good farmer who owns the e 1/2 of n e 1/4 sec 21, with 25 acres cleared, good crops, buildings, fences, and fine selection of stock.

Mrs. Wisner has a snug little farm on the s w 1/4 of s w 1/4 sec 16 with 10 acres cleared, a small orchard and good crops.

H. Hyland is located on the s e 1/4 sec 18, with 20 acres cleared and good crops. This place is known as the Campbell estate.
