The most obvious effect s. Felix Paradise, on Wednesday of this striking agreement between the two great parties is that it is sure-so far as anything in politics can be sure -to take the question of the currency out of the field of political struggle in the national elections of next year. Since both republicans and democrats have resolved that every dollar issued by the government shall be as good as every other dollar, there is nothing in the direction of further currency legislation for them to dispute about.


