The Horse Races a Failure.

Iosco county had a fair Wednesday and Thursday of this week. Wednesday was a very cold, disagreeable day, and a slim attendance was the result. Thursday being a fine day, people from all over the county gathered in to witness the exercises advertised in the program, but owing to some mismanagement on the part of the managers in charge, not over half what was advertised was carried out. Horse racing and other amusements that would have pleased the multitude of spectators, ceased to be a virtue.

Our farming community exhibited specimens of grain and root crops that Iosco county may well be proud of; as the state of Michigan cannot show finer specimens. The grain was of a superior quality; the roots, such as potatoes, turnips, rutabagas, pumpkins, squash, beets, etc., were of the highest order. A small variety of fruit was entered, but it was excellent.

The horses exhibited by Mr. Dun of Au Sable, and Thos. Curry, A. Grant, R. Wade and Temple C. R. Henry showed a pair of matched drivers, and carried away one of the banners.

In the Floral Hall the display was fine. The lower story was crowded with grain and root crops. We heard expressions from old farmers from abroad that Iosco county was, if anything, in the lead in the line of exhibits of grain and roots. We also noticed C. V. Hicks of Osceola, with his display of Domestic sewing machines, pianos and organs crowded in one corner of the lower story. He said it was a little dusty, but he was still in the race. His display was fine. The second story was filled with fine exhibits of fruits and pastry. We noticed a good many 1st prizes being awarded to Chas. Martin on apples and other fruits and also root crops.

The 3d story was extra fine, this apartment being mostly devoted to the displays of the ladies, such as patch-quilts, tidys, household products, embroidery, needlework, oil paintings, scroll sawing, flowers, etc. This department did not quite come up to last year. 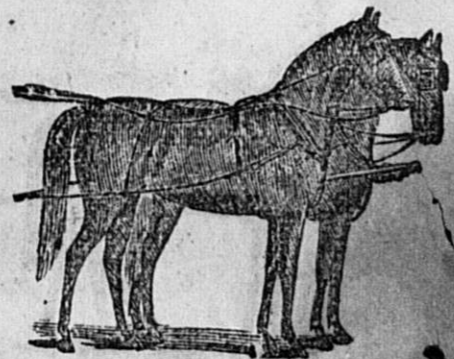

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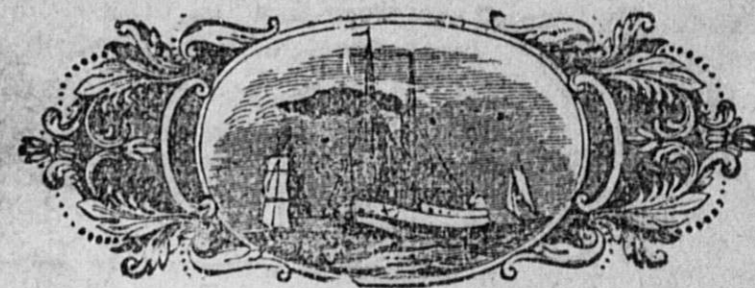
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
