COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS

(OFFICIAL.)

The Village council met in regular session at the village hall Tawas City Oct. 26, 1891.

President pro tem Bennett in the chair. Roll call by the clerk.

Present—Murphy, Bennett, Koenig and Bonney. Absent—Smith and Armstrong. The clerk then read the minutes of meetings of Oct. 12th and 19th.

Armstrong then came in and took his seat.

Moved by Murphy supported by Koenig that the minutes stand approved as read with a correction in last minutes of Mr. Bennett's bill. Carried.

Bills for work on streets to the amount of \$66.63 were allowed.

Moved by Bonney supported by Koenig that the clerk be instructed to order 100 ft. of 12 ft stone drain tile at 18c per foot from Frank Miller of Vassar, to be used on 9th Ave. at R. R. crossing. Carried.

The following resolution was then offered by Bonney:

Resolved, That the village President be authorized to extend the time for the collection of the village taxes for 30 Days from Oct. 28 1891 to Nov. 28 1891.

Resolution adopted.

Moved by Murphy supported by Armstrong that the street committee be authorized to put clay and gravel 20ft wide on Lake street at Prescott's store as far as new grade extends south. Carried.

Moved by Armstrong supported by Bonney that the street commissioner and marshal be requested to make a report at next regular meeting. Carried.

Moved by Murphy supported by Koenig that the night watchman be requested to make a report of what arrests have been made during the summer at the next regular meeting. Carried.

Board of Supervisors.

(OFFICIAL.)

ANNUAL SESSION.

The Board of Supervisors of Iosco county met at the court house in the village of Tawas City, in said county, on the 14th day of October, A. D. 1891, at nine o'clock a. m., pursuant to adjournment.

Chairman Zeiter called the meeting to order and ordered the roll called.

Present—Wilson, Howard, Mason, Solomon, Yockey, Angel, Rodman, Dillon, Jackson, Latham, Hurford, Slingerland, Zeiter and Thompson. Quorum present. On motion the bill of S. W. Chilson was referred to Pros. Attorney.

Supr. Solomon presented a resolution relative to the drawing of a portion of the land in the township of Au Sable, Baldwin and Wilber.

Motion made and supported that the resolution of Mr. Solomon, relative to draining land in Iosco county, be referred to the committee on Roads, Bridges and Drains and Ditches, which motion prevailed by a unanimous vote.

Motion made and supported that the bill of Richard Bros. & Hubbell for \$9.56 for sundries for poor farm be allowed, which motion prevailed by a unanimous vote.

Motion made and supported that the report of the special committee appointed Latham, Jackson, and Dillabaugh relative to improvements of roads and bridges, in the townships of Burleigh, Reno, Grant, Sherman, to Tawas, be received and placed on file, and referred to the committee on roads, bridges, drains and ditches. Motion prevailed.

On motion the Board took a recess until one o'clock p. m.

The Board was called to order at one o'clock p. m. by the Chair. Roll call:

Present—Wilson, Howard, Mason, Solomon, Yockey, Rodman, Dillon, Ferrister, Jackson, Latham, Hurford, Slingerland, Zeiter, Quorum present.

The minutes of Oct. 14, 1891, were on motion approved.

Supr. Mason offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That the County Clerk be instructed to collect from the Plaintiff in each case begun in the circuit court for this county, the entry fee of two dollars, and when so collected, the same shall be by said Clerk paid to the County Treasurer and his receipt taken for the same.

Resolution adopted.

Supr. Mason offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That the County Clerk be instructed to collect from plaintiff and defendant according to law, the stenographer's fees provided for in the special act applicable to the 23d judicial circuit, and that the same be demanded and collected before any evidence shall be taken in any cause, and when so collected, the same shall be by said Clerk paid to the County Treasurer and his receipt taken for the same.

Resolution adopted.

The report of the finance committee was read and on motion was ordered spread at length on the minutes.

Report of finance committee:

To the honorable Board of Supervisors of Iosco County:

GENTLEMEN:—We the undersigned, Finance committee of your Honorable Board, beg to report that we have audited the County Treasurer's account for the financial year ending the 10th of Oct. 1891, that as part of such auditing committee we compared the vouchers having stubs with the stubs and after such examination said stubs were cancelled by us. We also compared all other vouchers with his balance sheets that we find the amount as below set forth to be correct. The following is the account, viz:

Copy of Treasurer's account.

Your Board will perceive by the account that the Treasurer has made payments amounting to \$55,178.77, and that his receipts from all sources were \$56,847 during which financial year, an excess of receipts over disbursements of \$1668.93. This makes the credit balance of the county stand thus:

Cash in Treasurer's hands Oct. 13, 1891, \$6935.04

Excess of receipts over expenditures for fiscal year ending Oct. 13, 1891, 1668.93

Total balance in hand, \$7733.97

Of the above balance the Treasurer reports that about \$2,500 stands to the credit of the fund for general county purposes.

Your committee gave the County Treasurer credit for \$34.84 delinquent taxes paid to the treasurer of Au Sable township, the vouchers for which payment has not been returned to the Treasurer by said township treasurer. It will be in the recollection of your honorable Board, that at our last annual meeting the Prosecuting Attorney was directed to put in force the judgement against the sureties of Robert Merrick, ex-County Treasurer, for \$2,393.53, balance found due the county, and also for the costs and interest subsequently together with costs and interest due the county. Your committee are of opinion that there has been uncalled for delay in getting this matter settled, and recommend that immediate steps be taken to recover the amounts unpaid as above.

Your committee find that the present bonded indebtedness of the county to be as follows, viz:

13 bonds issue of July 1, '86 of \$500 each, \$ 7,500

20 bonds issue of Sept. 1, '87 of \$500 each, 10,000

Jail bonds due Dec. 30, '88, 5,000

Unpaid of \$2,000 authorized to be borrowed Oct. '89, 1,000

Total, \$23,500

We find that 5 of the above bonds amounting to \$2,500 all due Mar. 1, '92.

Your honorable Board should make provision for payment of this amount. We recommended that the County Treasurer be instructed to repay the \$1000, borrowed as above at as early a date as practicable, and thus making a saving of interest thereon.

The county Treasurer has requested your committee to make provision for meeting the expenses of the county until

receipts come in on 1891 taxes.

Your committee recommend that your honorable Board do empower the Treasurer of the county to borrow such a sum of money not exceeding \$2000 for incidental purposes as he may require.

Finally your committee do suggest to your honorable Board that the account of the county Treasurer be submitted to your Board in a proper book of record to be provided for that purpose and that the financial statement for the fiscal years ending Oct. 13, 1891 and Oct. 10, '91, be recorded therein.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

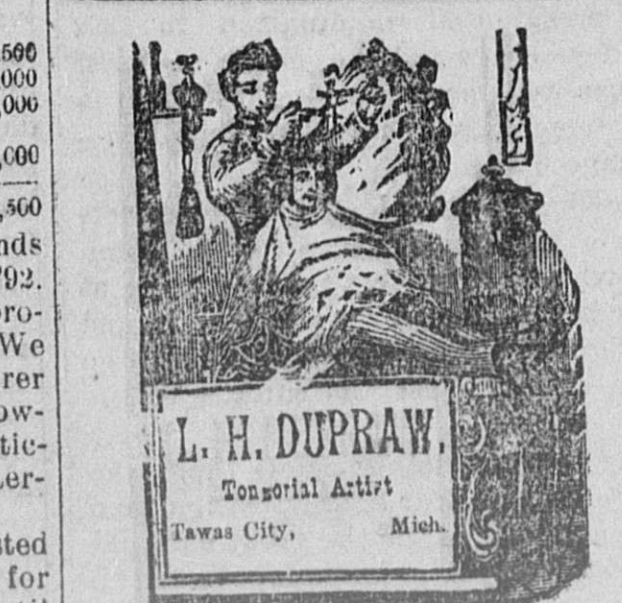

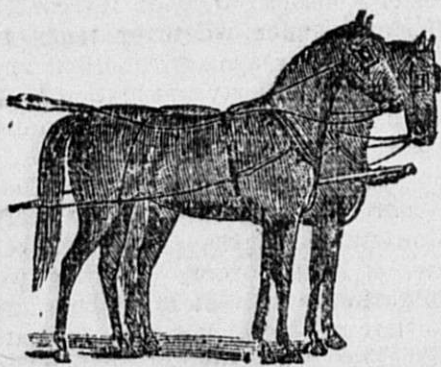

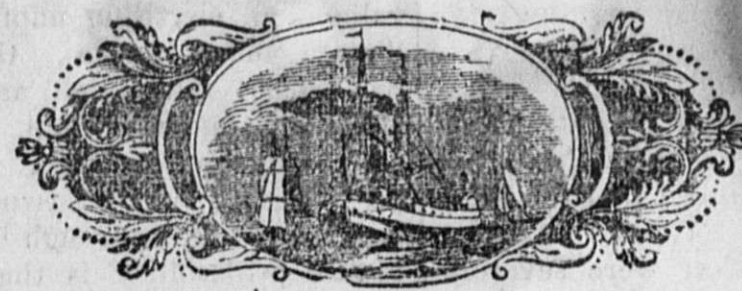

GIVE ASSURANCE OF A DEMOCRATIC VICTORY IN '92.

NEW YORK OVERWHELMINGLY DEMOCRATIC!

DEMOCRATIC VICTORY IN IOWA.

The Republicans again Beaten in Massachusetts!

McKINLEY IS LEFT AT HOME TO STAY.

Michigan, However, Gets Some Crumbs of Comfort.

The results of Tuesday's elections more than justify our predictions of last week. The empire state elects Flower governor over Fassett by an overwhelming majority, and for the first time since the infamous Republican gerrymander of New York state, the senate is Democratic.

Gov. Boise and the entire Democratic ticket was elected in Iowa, but on account of the customary Republican gerrymander the legislature is Republican, although the Democrats have five or six thousand majority in the state.

The desperate efforts to win Massachusetts back to the Republican party were unavailing, Gov. Russell being re-elected by eight thousand majority, although the legislature, by reason of the shameless gerrymandering of the Republicans, is overwhelmingly Republican.

Ohio is the only state which could possibly be called doubtful in which the Republicans have not been beaten, and even here McKinley's majority over Campbell will not be more than fifteen thousand, while the Republicans were claiming thirty to forty thousand.

In Michigan the Republicans have consolation. The Detroit fight resulted, of course, in the election of Pingree, but that was not all. The two factions of the Democratic party devoted themselves to killing and burying each other, and succeeded so handsomely that the entire city ticket and board of aldermen were carried by the Republicans.

Charlie Balknap was also elected for the balance of Ford's unexpired term in the fifth district by reason of the three cornered fight. He has only a small plurality, and would have been buried out of sight, had it not been for the thousands of Democratic votes cast for Schults.

The reason ex-Gov. Campbell got left in Ohio was that McKinley got too many votes.

Game Warden Hampton has caught a rapid gait and is going to make things easy for his successors if declarations will do it. He declares he will break up the practice of shooting deer out of season, which he knows is carried on in the upper peninsula to a considerable extent. He has been up north and made arrests in Ogema and Gladwin counties.—Evening News.

Opinions have been handed down by some of the best legal talent in the State regarding the law of taxing mortgages and it is confirmed that all mortgages executed and recorded previous to this new law coming into effect cannot be assessed but all made since the law became op-

erative is assessable you cannot lay this measure to the Squaw-buck legislature, so called. This is high protection clean out of sight for the poor devil who wants to borrow.

Moved by Bonney supported by Koenig that the clerk be instructed to order 100 ft. of 12 ft stone drain tile at 18c per foot from Frank Miller of Vassar, to be used on 9th Ave. at R. R. crossing. Carried.

The following resolution was then offered by Bonney:

Resolved, That the village President be authorized to extend the time for the collection of the village taxes for 30 Days from Oct. 28 1891 to Nov. 28 1891.

Resolution adopted.

Moved by Murphy supported by Armstrong that the street committee be authorized to put clay and gravel 20c wide on Lake street at Prescott's store as far as new grade extends south. Carried.

Moved by Armstrong supported by Bonny that the street commissioner and marshal be requested to make a report at next regular meeting. Carried.

Moved by Murphy supported by Koenig that the night watchman be requested to make a report of what arrests have been made during the summer the next regular meeting. Carried.

Board of Supervisors.

(OFFICIAL.)

ANNUAL SESSION.

The Board of Supervisors of Iosco county met at the court house in the village of Tawas City, in said county, on the 14th day of October, A. D. 1891, at nine o'clock a. m., pursuant to adjournment.

Chairman Zeiter called the meeting to order and ordered the roll called.

Present—Wilson, Howard, Mason, Solomon, Yockey, Angel, Rodman, Dillon, Jackson, Latham, Hurford, Slingerland, Zeiter and Thompson. Quorum present. On motion the bill of S. W. Chilson was referred to Pros. Attorney.

Supt. Solomon presented a resolution relative to the drawing of a portion of the land in the township of Au Sable, Baldwin and Wilber.

Motion made and supported that the resolution of Mr. Solomon, relative to draining land in Iosco county, be referred to the committee on Roads, Bridges and Drains and Ditches, which motion prevailed by a unanimous vote.

Motion made and supported that the bill of Richard Bros. & Hubbell for \$9.56 for sundries for poor farm be allowed, which motion prevailed by a unanimous vote.

Motion made and supported that the report of the special committee appointed Latham, Jackson, and Dillabaugh relative to improvements of roads and bridges, in the townships of Burleigh, Reno, Grant, Sherman, to Tawas, be received and placed on file, and referred to the committee on roads, bridges, drains and ditches. Motion prevailed.

On motion the Board took a recess until one o'clock p. m.

The Board was called to order at one o'clock p. m. by the Chair. Roll call:

Present—Wilson, Howard, Mason, Solomon, Yockey, Rodman, Dillon, Ferrister, Jackson, Latham, Hurford, Slingerland, Zeiter, Quorum present.

The minutes of Oct. 14, 1891, were on motion approved.

Sup Mason offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That the County Clerk be instructed to collect from the Plaintiff in each case begun in the circuit court for this county, the entry fee of two dollars, and when so collected, the same shall be by said Clerk paid to the County Treasurer and his receipt taken for the same.

Resolution adopted.

Sup Mason offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That the County Clerk be instructed to collect from plaintiff and defendant according to law, the stenographer's fees provided for in the special act applicable to the 23d judicial circuit, and that the same be demanded and collected before any evidence shall be taken in any cause, and when so collected, the same shall be by said Clerk paid to the County Treasurer and his receipt taken for the same.

Resolution adopted.

The report of the finance committee was read and on motion was ordered spread at length on the minutes.

Report of finance committee:

To the honorable Board of Supervisors of Iosco County:

GENTLEMEN:—We the undersigned, Finance committee of your Honorable Board, beg to report that we have audited the County Treasurer's account for the financial year ending the 10th of Oct. 1891, that as part of such auditing committee we compared the vouchers having stubs with the stubs and after such examination said stubs were cancelled by us. We also compared all other vouchers with his balance sheets that we find the amount as below set forth to be correct. The following is the account, viz:

Copy of Treasurer's account.
Your Board will perceive by the account that the Treasurer has made payments amounting to \$55,178.77, and that his receipts from all sources were \$56,847 during which financial year, an excess of receipts over disbursements of \$1,668.93. This makes the credit balance of the county stand thus:

Cash in Treasurer's hands Oct. 13, 1891... \$6955.04

Excess of receipts over expenses for fiscal year ending Oct. 10, 1891... 1668.93

Total balance in hand... \$7733.97

Of the above balance the Treasurer reports that about \$2,500 stands to the credit of the fund for general county purposes.

Your committee gave the County Treasurer credit for \$34.84 delinquent taxes paid to the treasurer of Au Sable township, the vouchers for which payment has not been returned to the Treasurer by said township treasurer. It will be in the recollection of your honorable Board, that at our last annual meeting the Prosecuting Attorney was directed to put in force the judgement against the sureties of Robert Merrick, ex-County Treasurer, for \$2,393.53, balance found due the county, and also for the costs and interest subsequently together with costs and interest due the county. Your committee are of opinion that there has been uncalled for delay in getting this matter settled, and recommend that immediate steps be taken to recover the amounts unpaid as above.

Your committee find that the present bonded indebtedness of the county to be as follows, viz:

15 bonds issue of July 1, '86 of \$500 each... \$ 7,500
10 bonds issue of Sept. 1, '87 of \$500 each... 5,000
10 bonds due Dec. 30, '88... 5,000
Unpaid of \$2,000 authorized to be borrowed Oct. '90... 1,000

Total... \$28,500

We find that 5 of the above bonds amounting to \$2,500 all due Mar. 1, '92. Your honorable Board should make provision for payment of this amount. We recommended that the County Treasurer be instructed to repay the \$1,000, borrowed as above at as early a date as practicable, and thus making a saving of interest thereon.

The County Treasurer has requested permission to make provision for the expenses of the county until

receipts come in on 1891 taxes.

Your committee recommend that your honorable Board do empower the Treasurer of the county to borrow such a sum of money not exceeding \$3000 for incidental purposes as he may require.

Finally your committee do suggest to your honorable Board that the account of the county Treasurer be submitted to your Board in a proper book of record to be provided for that purpose and that the financial statement for the fiscal years ending Oct. 13, 1891 and Oct. 10, '91, be recorded therein.

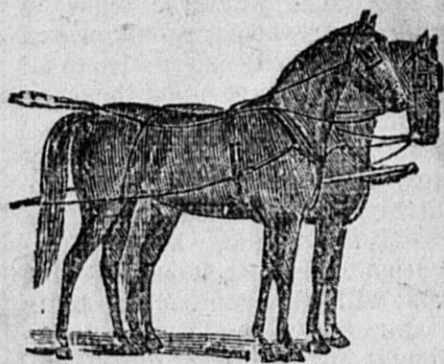

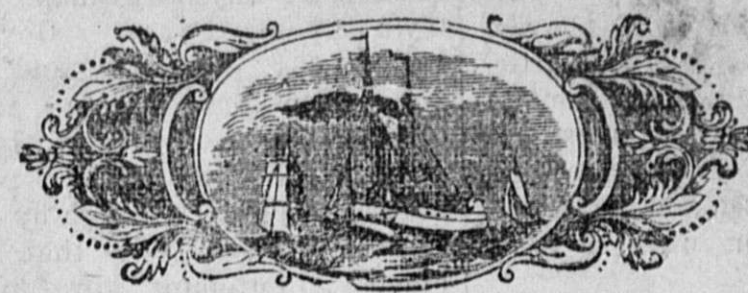

GIVE ASSURANCE OF A DEMOCRATIC VICTORY IN '92.

NEW YORK OVERWHELMINGLY DEMOCRATIC!

DEMOCRATIC VICTORY IN IOWA.

The Republicans again Beaten in Massachusetts!

McKINLEY IS LEFT AT HOME TO STAY.

Michigan, However, Gets Some Crumbs of Comfort.

The results of Tuesday's elections more than justify our predictions of last week. The empire state elects Flower governor over Fassett by an overwhelming majority, and for the first time since the infamous Republican gerrymander of New York state, the senate is Democratic. Gov. Boise and the entire Democratic ticket was elected in Iowa, but on account of the customary Republican gerrymander the legislature is Republican, although the Democrats have five or six thousand majority in the state.

The desperate efforts to win Massachusetts back to the Republican party were unavailing, Gov. Russell being re-elected by eight thousand majority, although the legislature, by reason of the shameless gerrymandering of the Republicans, is overwhelmingly Republican.

Ohio is the only state which could possibly be called doubtful in which the Republicans have not been beaten, and even here McKinley's majority over Campbell will not be more than fifteen thousand, while the Republicans were claiming thirty to forty thousand.

In Michigan the Republicans have consolation. The Detroit fight resulted, of course, in the election of Pingree, but that was not all. The two factions of the Democratic party devoted themselves to killing and burying each other, and succeeded so handsomely that the entire city ticket and board of aldermen were carried by the Republicans.

Charlie Balknap was also elected for the balance of Ford's unexpired term in the fifth district by reason of the three cornered fight. He has only a small plurality, and would have been buried out of sight, had it not been for the thousands of Democratic votes cast for Schults.

The reason ex-Gov. Campbell got left in Ohio was that McKinley got too many votes.

Game Warden Hampton has caught a rapid gait and is going to make things easy for his successors if declarations will do it. He declares he will break up the practice of shooting deer out of season, which he knows is carried on in the upper peninsula to a considerable extent. He has been up north and made arrests in Ogemaw and Gladwin counties.—Evening News.

Opinions have been handed down by some of the best legal talent in the State regarding the law of taxing mortgages and it is confirmed that all mortgages executed and recorded prior to this new law coming into effect, shall be assessed but one-half of the full value. The commission service will be maintained.

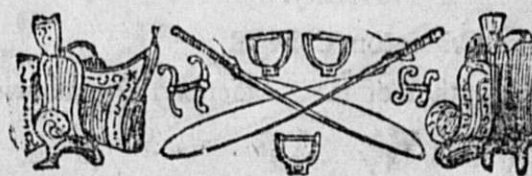
