Washington Letter.

Speaker Crisp has found such a hard taskmaster in the grip which has held fast to him ever since the day of the recess adjournment, that it is not probable that he will be well enough to preside over the House when it reassembles tomorrow. In that case the House is not expected to transact any further business than the election of a Speaker pro tem, and the adoption of a resolution authorizing the employment of clerks to the various committees.

This program may however be added to, if Mr. Harrison shall send in the Chilian correspondence and his special message, as it has been semi-officially announced that he would do this week. If the correspondence and the message shall prove to be as important as the public have been led to believe, the House will probably take it up at once to the temporary exclusion of all other business. In this connection it may be well to give the views of Representative McCreary of Kentucky, who has long been justly regarded as one of the clearest-headed democratic members of the House committee on Foreign Affairs. He says: "I still think that the Chilians will not want to go to war with us. I believe they will make proper reparation for the affront that has been given us. They have nothing to gain from such an unequal contest. Peru would be only too willing to give the United States permission to land troops on her soil and to establish store houses there. We could land one hundred thousand troops, and such a step being once taken, there would be no halt until our forces had marched through the whole country. The intelligent Chilians must appreciate this danger, if they compel hostilities, and upon the assumption that they do, I believe that they will not permit war. Soon after Congress reconvenes the President will send the correspondence to the two houses and then we can consider the situation with a better understanding. I am sure that the course of the United States will be dignified, firm and courageous. Whatever the result, I do not think we can be charged with having rushed into war, or that we shall suffer any loss of dignity." The last sentence is significant, as there are reasons for the belief that Representative McCreary has already read the correspondence.

Were it not for the fact that Frank Hutton had been known to bear a bitter personal grudge against Mr. Blaine ever since just before the meeting of the Republican national convention in 1880, his rather plain intimations in the Washington Post, that Mr. Blaine had, by reason of a business deal with ex-Mayor Grace, of New York, who has large business interests in Chili, determined to prevent war between the two countries, even if it becomes necessary to back down, to do so would have created a sensation. They have only raised a smile, and recalled the adage "Give a dog a bad name, etc."

Although nothing definite is known on the subject it seems to be the opinion of the majority of Democrats that the committee on Rules of the House will not recommend the restoration of all the appropriation bills to the Committee on Appropriations, as they were some years ago, and as Representatives Holman, Myers Dockery and other champions of economy wish them to be again. It is possible that the committee may conclude to get the views of a Democratic caucus before acting on this very important matter.

Representative Springer has prepared the first of the series of tariff bills with which it is proposed to assault the present class-favoring law, and it will be submitted to the Ways and Means Committee probably this week. The free list, and the proposed

Trouble Ahead for Soper.

Lansing, Jan. 2.—The Soper investigating committee has reported to Gov. Winans, and the report is far from a whitewash of the ex-secretary of state. Perhaps the most damaging testimony the committee found was in connection with the purchase of a mannual paper, which shows almost conclusively that Soper attempted to get money as a consideration for the purchase of supplies for the state. The committee also finds that Soper had illegally distributed manuals and received pay for them which should have gone to the state.

Governor Winans, when interviewed yesterday, said the report was just what he expected it would be, and that he considered the charges had been fully covered. When asked if Soper would be prosecuted under the common law, he replied that he was not prepared to say, but rather conveyed the impression that the ex-secretary had before him a rough and rugged path to travel.—Bay City Times.

THE senatorial fight in Ohio between Sherman and Foraker waxes hot and furious. The Forakerites are raw under the collar because Columbus has been filled up with a cloud of federal office holders; they say there are three or four for every member of the general assembly; last night Foraker made a speech to his followers in which he defied the administration, referring to it as grandfather's hat and Baby McKee. Both Sherman and Foraker express themselves as confident of victory.

The Bay City Times of Jan. 2, has the following: The fourth annual ball given by Mackinaw division No. 338, Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers at Arbeiter hall last evening, was largely attended and like its predecessors, proved one of the most enjoyable events of the season. The hall which is a large one was just sufficiently filled to make dancing enjoyable. At an appropriate hour a sumptuous repast was served in the dining hall which was partaken of by all present. The dancing was kept up until a late hour when the guests departed taking electric cars, which had been in waiting, for their homes in the various parts of the city.

During the entire evening a full orchestra furnished the music. The hall and dining room were beautifully decorated and all present declared that the "Engineer's Fourth Annual" was the most successful event yet given by Mackinaw division.

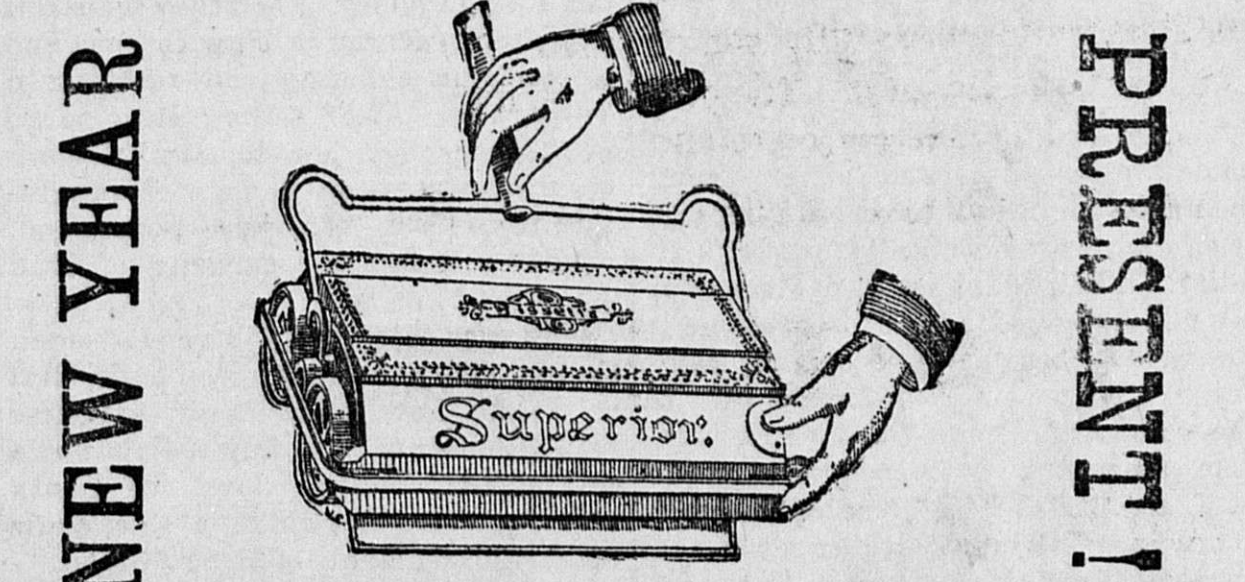



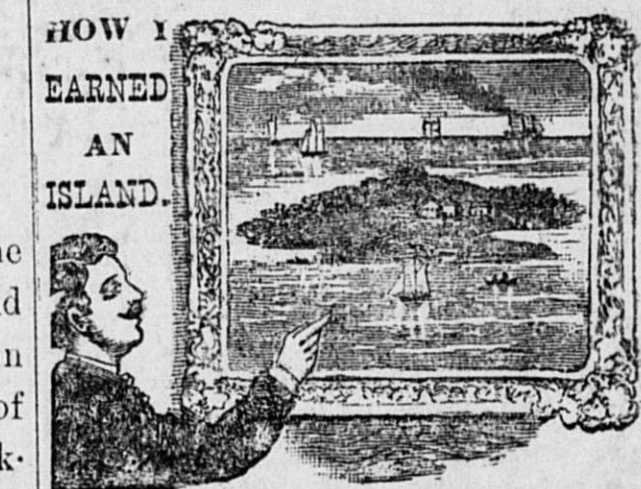

Washington Letter.

Speaker Crisp has found such a hard taskmaster in the grip which has held fast to him ever since the day of the recess adjournment, that it is not probable that he will be well enough to preside over the House when it reassembles tomorrow. In that case the House is not expected to transact any further business than the election of a Speaker pro tem, and the adoption of a resolution authorizing the employment of clerks to the various committees.

This program may however be added to, if Mr. Harrison shall send in the Chilean correspondence and his special message, as it has been semi-officially announced that he would do this week. If the correspondence and the message shall prove to be as important as the public have been led to believe, the House will probably take it up at once to the temporary exclusion of all other business. In this connection it may be well to give the views of Representative McCreary of Kentucky, who has long been justly regarded as one of the clearest-headed democratic members of the House committee on Foreign Affairs. He says: "I still think that the Chileans will not want to go to war with us. I believe they will make proper reparation for the affront that has been given us. They have nothing to gain from such an unequal contest. Peru would be only too willing to give the United States permission to land troops on her soil and to establish store houses there. We could land one hundred thousand troops, and such a step being once taken, there would be no halt until our forces had marched through the whole country. The intelligent Chileans must appreciate this danger, if they compel hostilities, and upon the assumption that they do, I believe that they will not permit war. Soon after Congress reconvenes the President will send the correspondence to the two houses and then we can consider the situation with a better understanding. I am sure that the course of the United States will be dignified, firm and courageous. Whatever the result, I do not think we can be charged with having rushed into war, or that we shall suffer any loss of dignity." The last sentence is significant, as there are reasons for the belief that Representative McCreary has already read the correspondence.

Were it not for the fact that Frank Hatton had been known to bear a bitter personal grudge against Mr. Blaine ever since just before the meeting of the Republican national convention in 1880, his rather plain intimations in the Washington Post, that Mr. Blaine had, by reason of a business deal with ex-Mayor Grace, of New York, who has large business interests in Chili, determined to prevent war between the two countries, even if it becomes necessary to back down, to do it, would have created a sensation. As it is they have only raised a smile, and recalled the adage "Give a dog a bad name, etc."

Although nothing definite is known on the subject it seems to be the opinion of the majority of Democrats that the committee on Rules of the House will not recommend the restoration of all the appropriation bills to the Committee on Appropriations, as they were some years ago, and as Representatives Holman, Sayers, Dockery and other champions of economy wish them to be again. It is possible that the committee may conclude to get the views of a Democratic caucus before acting on this very important matter.

Representative Springer has prepared the first of the series of tariff bills with which it is proposed to assault the present class-favoring law, and it will be submitted to the Ways and Means Committee in a few days, probably this week. It will put wool on the free list, and place carpets on about the basis proposed by the Mills bill.

Ex-Representative Perkins, of Kansas, who is to attempt to fill the vacant chair of the last Senator Plumb, by right of a gubernatorial appointment, did not make a reputation to be very proud of during the four sessions he served as a member of the House. As a statesman he was a bad misfit, but as a blind, bitter partisan losing sight of everything but the momentary success of his party, he was a howling success. His career in the Senate will probably be but a repetition of that in the House.

New Interest Law.

O. L. Partridge has just received a large stock of blanks. The mortgages and contracts contain the new Mortgage tax clause that has been adopted by the leading lawyers of Detroit. It should be remembered that, according to the new interest law the legal rate of interest is fixed at 6 per cent. and anything above 8 per cent. shall be deemed usury and forfeit all the interest.—Ex.

Trouble Ahead for Soper.

Lansing, Jan. 2.—The Soper investigating committee has reported to Gov. Winans, and the report is far from a whitewash of the ex-secretary of state. Perhaps the most damaging testimony the committee found was in connection with the purchase of a manual paper, which shows almost conclusively that Soper attempted to get money as a consideration for the purchase of supplies for the state. The committee also finds that Soper had illegally distributed manuals and received pay for them which should have gone to the state.

Governor Winans, when interviewed yesterday, said the report was just what he expected it would be, and that he considered the charges had been fully covered. When asked if Soper would be prosecuted under the common law, he replied that he was not prepared to say, but rather conveyed the impression that the ex-secretary had before him a rough and rugged path to travel.—Bay City Times.

The senatorial fight in Ohio between Sherman and Foraker waxes hot and furious. The Forakerites are raw under the collar because Columbus has been filled up with a cloud of federal office holders; they say there are three or four for every member of the general assembly; last night Foraker made a speech to his followers in which he defied the administration, referring to it as grandfather's hat and Baby McKee. Both Sherman and Foraker express themselves as confident of victory.

The Engineers' Ball.

The Bay City Times of Jan. 2, has the following: The fourth annual ball given by Mackinaw division No. 338, Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers at Arbeiter hall last evening, was largely attended and like its predecessors, proved one of the most enjoyable events of the season. The hall which is a large one was just sufficiently filled to make dancing enjoyable. At an appropriate hour a sumptuous repast was served in the dining hall which was partaken of by all present. The dancing was kept up until a late hour when the guests departed taking electric cars, which had been in waiting, for their homes in the various parts of the city.

During the entire evening a full orchestra furnished the music. The hall and dining room were beautifully decorated and all present declared that the "Engineers' Fourth Annual" was the most successful event yet given by Mackinaw division.

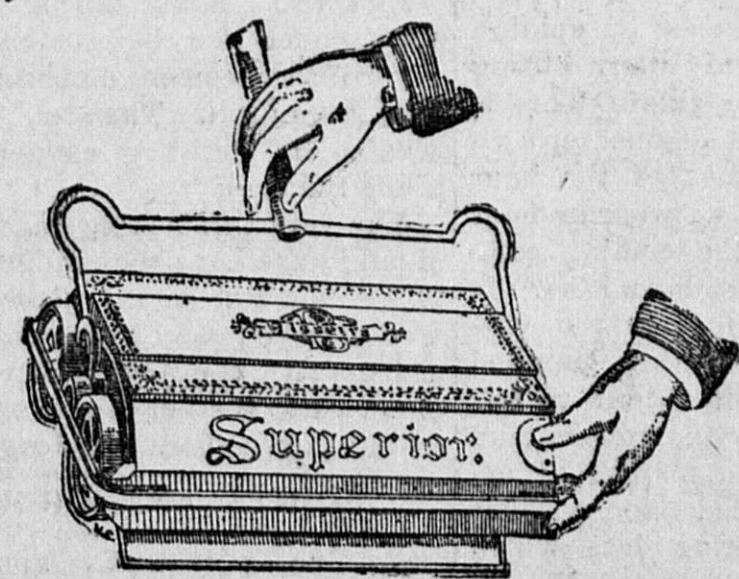

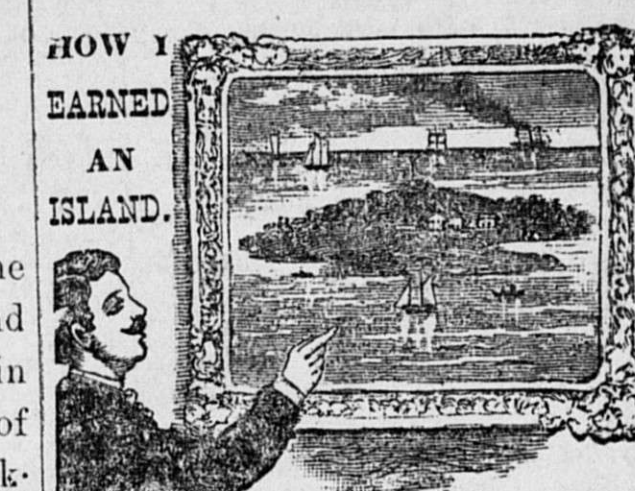

He has about three miles of railroad track laid at present and the logs are skidded in the woods with five teams and hauled to the mill with the Lima. The mill is cutting from 65 to 70 thousand shingles per day and the upper qualities are kiln-dried and shipped as fast as manufactured. The mill crew and woods crew have separate camps—the one at the mill being called headquarters. Everything is in good running order, and with prospects for good returns for the money invested.
