Washington Letter.

The meeting of the National Democratic Committee to be held here this week to decide where the National convention shall be held, is exciting much interest. Arrangements have been perfected by the local democrats to entertain the committee in true democratic style. Washington would like to have the convention come here, but she will have to be contented with merely wishing for it, as it is regarded as being between New York and a western city, with the chance decidedly in favor of New York, should its representatives really wish to make a winning fight.

The interest in the meeting of executive committee of the National Association of Democratic Clubs, which is also to be held here this week, is only second to that felt in the meeting of the National Committee. The purpose for which this meeting is held is not made public, further than that it is for the transaction of business important to the Democratic clubs of the country. Its proceedings will, of course, be secret.

Mr. Blaine endeavored to convince the House committee on Foreign Affairs, that the House ought to pass the bill, pledging the endorsement of the Government to an issue of \$100,000,000 of the bonds of the Nicaragua canal company, but it was labor lost, as Representative Holman's resolution, which was adopted by the House, has made it certain that no such scheme can get through that body.

Representative Holman says his resolution against subsidies and government aid of any kind to private industries, and against any appropriations not actually needed, which has been criticized in some quarters, will not interfere with the passage of a river and harbor bill or any other legitimate appropriation. But it attacks the private schemes higher than a kite.

Representative Alderson, of West Virginia, introduced a resolution in the House for the appointment of a committee of seven to investigate the charges of partisanship, mismanagement and waste of money which have been made against the Census Bureau.

Ex-Chief of the House is not to be allowed to monopolize the role of clown on the floor of the present House. He has arrived in the person of Representative Boutelle, of Maine, who was so much worked up in his mind because the House adopted Representative Holman's resolution against government subsidies of all kinds, and against the appropriations of government money for anything except to carry on the necessary business of the government, that he took upon himself the task of making a funny speech to amuse his mind. After serving the House with a sort of act, poorly made of equal parts of wit, witless, witless, witless, and Democratic economy, he jumped on cover his head by hurling anathemas at the Democratic party because Mrs. Flower, the wife of the present popular Governor of New York, did not find the contents of the linen and china closets, as turned over by the retiring Governor, to be as full and complete as desired them to be. That was humor of the most subtle kind, wasn't it? Boutelle is very, very "funny", almost as comical as Keed.

There has been considerable active maneuvering on the part of the Republican bosses around here of late. Clarkson has been holding private conferences with Quay, Alger, Blaine, and Allison, and many think that Alger is trying to make a combine with Blaine, either to take the second place on the ticket, or to obtain the support for the lead, if he doesn't take it himself.

Senator Turpie succeeded, after a hard fight in getting the Senate committee on the Judiciary to postpone the consideration of the nomination of Judge Woods as member of the new Circuit court until Senator Voorhees gets back, will be some time this week. No stone will be left unturned by the Indiana Senators to defeat the confirmation of Woods, but present indications are that the Republicans will vote solidly for his confirmation.

Having become satisfied that the Chilian minister has been "playing possum", to the intentions of his country, the administration will, it is for the third or fourth time said, send the correspondence to Congress this week, with a message

from Mr. Harrison recommending that war be declared. Congress is ready to meet him more than halfway, if the correspondence be of the nature it has been represented to be. A bill is pending in both House and Senate to repeal the law against the appointment of men who served in the Confederate Army and Navy to positions in the U. S. Army or Navy, in order that the Government may get the benefit of their services in the war, with Chili, which is regarded as being almost a certainty.

Board of Supervisors.

(OFFICIAL.)
January 5, 1892.
Board of Supervisors of Iosco county met at the court house in the village of Tawas City, said county, at 9:00 o'clock a. m., pursuant to adjournment.

Chairman Zeiter was present and called the board to order and ordered the roll called.

There being no quorum present the board adjourned till one o'clock this afternoon.

One o'clock p. m.
Board of Supervisors of Iosco county met at the court house Tawas City, pursuant to adjournment.
Roll called. Present: Zeiter, Henry, Yockey, Angel, Rodman, Dillon, Ferris, Dille, Laugh, Jackson, Latham, Hurford, and Slingerland. Quorum present.

Minutes of Oct. 24, 1891 were read, corrected and approved.
Sup. Henry offered a resolution relative to the collection of the personal tax of the J. E. Potts Salt & Lumber Co., which resolution on motion was referred to the Prosecuting Atty for his opinion.

Moved and supported that the Clerk be authorized to let the contract for printing the circuit court calendar for the year 1892, and in awarding such contract that he designate the paper to print such calendar which in his judgement will do the work in the best manner and at a reasonable price. Carried.

Moved and supported that there be a committee appointed to investigate the amount of additional duties imposed upon the County Treasurer by the laws of 1891, and that said committee report to the board such additional duties so that the board may determine the amount of salary to pay such Treasurer for such additional duties. Carried.

Referred to committee on County officers' salaries.
Moved and supported that the telegraph operators of Tawas City be paid during the months of December, January, February, March and April, the sum of ten dollars per month for his or her retention in the office. Carried.

Gentlemen:—The resolution of Sup. Henry relative the county sharing with the city of Au Sable in the expense of collecting the delinquent personal tax of the J. E. Potts S. & L. Co. for the year 1890 having been referred to me, I would respectfully report thereon as follows: That the city of Au Sable has made one attempt in the courts to collect this tax, and has paid the expenses attendant upon that attempt. The question. The question of whether the State and county's part of this tax can be demanded of the city before it is collected is being agitated, and has not yet been decided upon by the officials, much less by the courts. If the matter reaches a court it may be decided either way. It should be held that the city must pay the state and county tax here involved regardless of its collection, then the county would have no direct interest in its collection. But if it should be decided that the county cannot demand its share of this tax until the city has actually collected it, then the county will certainly be deeply concerned in its collection, and in that event might reasonably pay a part of the expense necessary to collect.

It seems to be at this stage, more a question of good public policy at the hands of the Board than anything else. Certainly the county should stand by the cities and townships in pushing the collection of taxes. And while the strict right of the city to ask this aid may be denied by some, it certainly would encourage the city to assist them. And it would undoubtedly encourage the collection of taxes throughout the county in future, if it becomes known that the county proposes to stand by the minor municipalities in the collection of taxes.

Moved and supported that the opinion of the Pros. Atty be attached to the resolution offered by Sup. Henry relative the collection of the J. E. Potts S. & L.

Co. per. onal tax. Carried.
The resolution as offered by Supervisor Henry:
WHEREAS, The tax assessed against the personal property of the J. E. Potts S. & L. Co. for the year 1890 has not been collected, and
WHEREAS, It is now authoritatively reported that the receivers of the J. E. Potts S. & L. Co have now in their hands a considerable sum of money which was received by them from the disposition of property which was not covered by or included in the mortgage given by said company, and
WHEREAS, It is the opinion of the Pros. Atty that by petitioning the circuit court for the county of Wayne said tax can be realized from said fund, and
WHEREAS, The county tax amounts to about twenty-five hundred dollars. Therefore,

Resolved, That the Prosecuting Attorney be and is hereby authorized by the board to take steps and institute such proceedings as he shall deem advisable to recover the said personal tax, and that as a board, one-half of all expenses and services incident thereto, shall be borne and paid by the county provided the city of Au Sable pays an equal proportion. Carried.
