Friday night one of the most serious calamities ever occurred in the village, was the burning of nineteen of the most prominent business places in the village. The fire was discovered at 8:45 in the rubbish beneath Rosenthal's store. The fire alarm was given but the water hydrants were frozen and had it not been for the aid of the Oscoda fire department the whole business part of AuSable would have been laid in ashes. BURNED TO THE GROUND.

Our Union School Building a Mass of Ruins,

On Monday last, about the hour of two p. m., the fire beil at the engine house told our town's people that there was a fire in our midst.

On rushing out, the fire was soon located, the Union School Building being a mass of flames.

The citizens promptly rangut the fire-extinguishing apparatus, and with the assistance of a couple of teams, were soon on the scene and death of D. W. Colburn, of Stanton, in full operation, but it was found that the fire was beyond control. and the building was comparatively abandoned by the fire department, with a view to saving the wood shed in the rear of the school house, but not till all the books, quite a number of seats, some of the black-boards a couple of stoves, and everything movable had been removed.

The wood-shed and other outbuildings, valued at \$300, were saved by dint of hard work.

The teachers deserve great credit for the manner in which they battled against the flames and saved so much material.

The following speaks for itself:

As the school building just burned was public property and being under my immediate care and keeping it seems but right that those whose property it was should have 'a statement from me regarding its loss.

Further, from conversation with some I am aware that there are mistaken ideas as to the origin of the fire. And hence that all may know the facts and that no blame be attached to any one unjustly is my reason for making the following brief statement. At 2:40 p. m. Monday during the intermission the fire was first seen around the moval of the Town Wall from its pres register just over the Intermediate room from which the High School recitation room was heat. This was, I feel confident, where the fire originated. As the blaze seemedsmall and there being no amount of smoke we had confidence that we could extinguish it and went to work accordingly. But before we had it put out in the floor it had passed between the joice, up the side of the room between the studding, and into the attic and before five minutes had passed the fire and smoke were coming from the roof. Seeing that all efforts on our part to save the building were in vain, we at once began to remove books and furniture, and quite an amount was saved, which helps much in fit-John E. 
