We are informed that the Township of Tawas, and the Village of Tawas City will arrange it so a flour mill will not have to pay any taxes for about 10 years. A \$10,000 mill will be built this spring.

No more nominations can be made on the Saturday night preceding a village or township election, thus compelling the printer to labor all day Sunday getting out tickets and slips.

Dr. D. C. Howell of East Tawas assisted by Dr. Darling, Goodale, Tompson and Dillon undertook a very delicate job Monday, at this place amputating the leg of Joseph Tate above the knee. Mr. Tate had his leg frozen over a year ago near Alabaster, and has suffered terrible pain ever since, and the Doctors decided that he could not survive without this operation. He is resting easy at present and may get better.

Mitchell & McClure have decided to run their big Duluth mill nights about half the summer, and have set their mark for the year's cut at 60,000,000 feet, making the firm one of the biggest operators in the northwest. They are now driving piles and doing the framing for a second lumber dock. It will have a capacity of from 10,000,000 to 12,000,000 feet, and will give the firm a dock piling capacity of about 29,000,000 feet. Trams are also being built on the shore side of the mill. Ex.

OPINION OF THE ATTORNEY GEN'L

The General Election Law applies to Local Elections and Township Meetings.

Booths Must be Provided—Tickets to be Furnished by Local Election Commissioners—Tickets, where Printed—Where Conventions and Caucuses must be Held.

Lansing, Feb. 24, 1892.

To ED. HERALD:

DEAR SIR—There have been so many questions asking local officers of various townships, incorporated villages and cities, relative to the application of the general election law to local elections and town meetings to be held in the spring of 1892, that I desire to say to such officers, through the medium of your paper, that: Act No. 190 of the Public Acts of 1891, known as the general election law, as limited by Act No. 194 of the Public Acts of the same year, applies to all local elections held in the various cities, villages and townships of this State. That such elections must be held according to the provisions of said general law, so far as

the same are applicable thereto. It is provided among other things, in section one of Act No. 194, "all the provisions of such general law relative to the board of election inspectors, the arrangement of polling places (which would include the providing and arrangement of booths), the manner of voting and receiving of votes, and the canvass and declaration of the result of such elections are made applicable to such municipal and township elections;" but the time for opening and closing of the polls shall not be affected by reason of Act No. 190.

The time for opening and closing of the polls in township elections is controlled by section 704 of Howell's Statutes, which provide that:

"The polls shall be opened at nine o'clock in the forenoon, or as soon thereafter as may be, and shall be closed between the hours of three and six o'clock in the afternoon, and the inspectors shall cause proclamation to be made at least one hour before the closing of the polls, that the polls of the election will be closed at or within the specified hour, naming it."

Section two, of Act No. 194 provides that:

"The township board of each township, and such persons as shall be elected therefor by the common council of the various cities and villages in this State, shall be the board of election commissioners for such township, city or village respectively, and shall perform such duties relative to the preparation and printing of ballots as required by law of the board of election commissioners of counties, and the like duties and privileges as are enjoined and granted by the laws governing general elections, upon the various committees of the different political organizations, are hereby prescribed for the city, village or township committees, in elections held pursuant to said act; except that no vignette or heading for the ballot, other than the name of the party shall be necessary. It will be necessary to hold the caucuses for the nomination of candidates at least five days before election day, as section three of the act provides that "the names of candidates shall be given in by the committees of the various political organizations, to the board of election commissioners of such municipality, not less than five days before each election, and the proof copy of the ballot shall be open to the inspection of the chairman of each committee at the office of the township clerk, and city or village clerk or recorder, not less than two clear secular days before such election."

The ticket must be printed in the same form as is provided in the general law and the board of election commissioners for the township, city or village, must furnish the ticket. They can get the printing done at such place as they choose. The words "political organizations" or "political party" used in this act, must be construed to mean any respectable body of citizens who are electors of any township or election district, and who assemble themselves together in the manner provided by the law and hold a nominating caucus or convention. Hence it is only necessary, in order for a person to have his name printed upon the ticket, that he should be nominated by a respectable body of electors properly assembled, who are entitled to vote for him at the election.

Any person who is not nominated or who is placed in nomination by persons who reside outside of his election district would not be entitled to have his name printed on the ticket.

It is not intended, however, that any person who desires to run for office shall be prohibited from furnishing slips or seeking, within the provisions of the law, to have his name written or pasted on the ticket by electors when they are preparing their ballots in the booths. All such votes and the votes for any person, when on the ballot, should be counted under the same directions as govern the counting of votes for regular candidates whose names are printed on the ballots.

By section 4, of Act No. 190, it is provided:

"No election district or voting precinct under the provisions of this act shall contain more than five hundred electors according to the poll lists of the last preceding general election. When any election district or voting precinct shall contain over five hundred electors it shall be the duty of the township board in township, and the city council in cities, to divide such voting precincts into two or more election districts."

In case the division is made in a township or incorporated village, the provisions of chapter eight of Howell's Statutes, are to apply and govern such division.

If the division is made in cities, and there are no special provisions in the city charter existing relative thereto, than the division, the election commissioners, and the election inspectors and all matters arising by reason of the division, must be provided for by ordinance of the common council. The common council has power to make all necessary rules and regulations in connection therewith, to fully carry out the provisions of the law.

In all voting precincts in cities where there are special provisions in the char-

ter for designating inspectors of election in cases of division of voting precincts such inspectors should be designated directed in the charter and would be inspectors of election under the law.

Now we are to have some light. A committee has been appointed by the House of Representatives to investigate the effect of the McKinley tariff on agricultural products. All you farmers who are paying off your mortgages with your increase of income due to the McKinley tariff want to stand right up and be counted. Do you hear, my Republican farmer friend? Stand right up.

REPRESENTATIVE Weadock has introduced a resolution asking the secretary of the treasury for information which will show what rebate has with imported salt. Under the operation of the McKinley law the big packers have practically enjoyed free salt at the expense of the other fellows who receive no rebate. The same is true of the Standard Oil Co., in its use of tin packages for exporting oil, and it is only another example of Republican favoritism for the rich.

Russell, Pattison and Campbell are presidential possibilities, yet they have all declared that Mr. Cleveland is their first choice. In case of it being impossible to nominate Cleveland on account of the New York delegation, Mr. Russell is the most likely to receive the support of the Cleveland element. Russell and Boies or Boies and Russell would make a winning ticket and smooth the wrinkles out of the angry brow of New York.—Bay City Times.

THERE is great suffering among the unemployed at Vienna. It is estimated that fully 5,000 shoemakers, 3,000 carpenters, 1,500 metal workers, 7,000 stone workers and 23,000 unskilled laborers are out of work. As an alleged result of the McKinley law, 12,000 pearl workers were thrown out of employment, and are now classed as unskilled workmen, the Austrian laws preventing their embracing a new trade without serving a new apprenticeship, which is impossible in the case of adults burdened with families.

me-Me-MEETING,

Editor HERALD:

Your readers, and especially such as reside in the village of Tawas City and in Tawas Township, were by the issue of the HERALD of February 26, 1892, treated to a spicy bit of news in the following words: "We have been interviewed by men who get logs cut at our villages, and they claim taxes are so high that they cannot afford to put their logs into our mills for manufacture. They state our taxes are 1/4 per cent higher than in the Saginaw Valley. No wonder our mills don't run over half the time for want of work. Let our citizens give this matter some attention, and bring the matter before the electors at the spring election." Those men who get logs cut at our villages complain of high taxes, do they? Have they to pay a higher rate of taxes upon their property which may happen to be in Tawas township when assessment is made, than the day laborer who happens to own a house in this village, but has only the good luck to get always up from 27 to 140 days during the 365 days? Or the average farmers who, after counting up all things of and belonging to his farm in Tawas township, and give his farm credit for everything he takes from it, can not show a clear profit of two per cent a year and frequently less than one per cent. Has the day laborer complained, or has the farmer complained of taxes being too high? Whatsoever the private opinion may have been, certainly it has not been publicly expressed. Is this class of people satisfied? Or is the ox accustomed to crawl under the yoke? Or can the day laborer in this village, or the farmer of this township afford to pay high taxes, or are they afraid to complain? If they had not dared to complain however oppressive such taxes are and have been; it is then a fortunate affair that strangers, who only now and then have to pay taxes in this locality, come to open the eyes of the residents hereabouts and show to them the cause, which as effect, produced and does produce hard times. The cause, which as effect, prevents people from locating hereabouts either as farmer or as manufacturer. The advice of the HERALD, "Let our citizens give this matter some attention and bring the matter before the electors at the spring election," is good as far as it goes; but on township meeting day there is no time to consider such matters; and then, an excited crowd but ill prepared to consider matters of importance or of a serious nature. It is

such they have, as it would be for a merchant or banker with his books there to make out his balance sheet.

It is time that the tax payers, whether they reside upon a lot in the village, or upon a farm in this township, should like men that meant business, hold one or several meetings, following the example of the successful merchant and take an inventory of the entire taxing and tax affair, would it take long to discover the leakage, the cause, which, cancer-like, keeps on eating, sending every inhabitant hereabouts, that by his own work, whether as laborer or farmer, instead of advancing one step forward each year, is kicked two steps backward. How true the old saying makes itself to be here in this locality: "What is everybody's business is nobody's business; and what is nobody's business is everybody's business." 2x3 ARE 11x5 IS 21.


