Village election next Monday. Pick out good men, and you will not regret your failing.

Brother Gray, of AuSable Times, made us a pleasant call. Mr. Gray is a hustler in the newspaper business.

Wilfred Grise, son of O. Grise, our village blacksmith, wagon, buggy and cutter reaper, was in Bay City Thursday, purchasing stock.

Alderman Smith is putting up a large quantity of ice, which will be used in connection with his creamery and dairy the coming season.

The infant child of Sheriff Bradley has been at the point of death for over a week, with spinal disease. It is somewhat improved now and hopes are entertained of its recovery.

The beautiful snow has about disappeared and the robins will soon nest again. About two feet of ice is in our bay and skating, horse racing and ice boating are among the list of sports.

Hugh Kennedy met with an accident last Monday. His buggy gave away letting its occupants drop to terra firma. Oliver Thomas was also a passenger. No bodily injury was sustained, the wreck was repaired and they went home rejoicing.

The Pennsylvania parties who have been prospecting for oil and natural gas at Killmaster, for the last sixty days, have met with partial success. At 560 feet down, at the Marshall shale, they struck a large vein of gas, which came up with great force and quantity. This vein continued for twenty feet, when they struck a vein of water, which rose to within 100 feet of the surface. They were then compelled to draw out the eight-inch pipe which was down about 400 feet, and run out the hole large enough to pass the eight-inch pipe down to the water vein. They reached this vein with the large enlarged hole last Friday, and in passing through it a large flow of 85 per cent brine came over the pipe. Going deeper with the large hole at 600 feet on Saturday they struck a flow of oil which is at present forcing its way to the surface with the heavy brine. The log of the well so far agrees with geological charts. The operators are able to deepen the well fully fifty feet a day, so that but a very few days are liable to elapse before the oil plane is reached.
