Village Elections.

The annual charter election of the village of Tawas City took place Monday last, and owing to several of the candidates being on both tickets, not over one half the voters turned out, and our people considering good candidates on both tickets, but very little erasing was done, although 22 tickets were thrown out, 12 presented themselves to vote and, not being educated in the difference of voting at township meetings and village elections, their votes were placed in the "dead letter box," in the hands of the election commissioners. All wishing to vote in the village should bear in mind, that they must have their names recorded in the village, as well as the township, there being two registration boards. The village registration takes place on Saturday, previous to the second Monday in March, and the township registration the Saturday previous to the first Monday in April, of each year. Voters, educate yourselves in voting under the new law, and be sure you don't lose your votes this spring. An (X) on the head of your ticket counts that ticket straight, and if there is people on that ticket you do not wish to vote for, erase the name on your ticket, and make an (X) in the square opposite the name on the other ticket, and she is a winner. Observe the large cards of instructions, which has been furnished by the state, and which will be posted up in the polling room. All languages of instructions will be posted public, so you do not need to lose a vote.

WHEREAS, the people of Michigan have always been generously disposed to contribute to the relief of suffering humanity in all parts of the world; and

WHEREAS, I have been requested by the Russian Famine Relief Committee of the United States to designate persons to receive and forward contributions from the people of Michigan;

NOW THEREFORE, I, Edwin B. Winans, Governor of the State of Michigan, do hereby recommend a prompt response by the people of our State to this appeal, and the following named gentleman of the city of Detroit, who have consented to receive and forward contributions, are hereby designated for the purpose.

R. W. Gillett, Vice President Chamber of Commerce; J. H. Donovan, President Board of Trade; J. S. Gray, President Merchants and Manufacturers' Exchange; R. G. Butler, Agent Wabash Railway; David Stott; James W. Flynn.

Supplies of flour, corn meal, cured meats, canned or dried fruits, and other provisions, as well as money contributions are asked for, and should be forwarded to one of the gentlemen named above, and marked "For Russian Famine Relief."
