### OFFICIAL BALLOT.

INSTRUCTIONS.—First, mark or stamp a cross (X) in the square under the name of your party at the head of the ballot. If you desire to vote a straight ticket, nothing further need be done. If you desire to vote for candidates on different tickets, also erase the name of the candidate on your ticket you do not want to vote for and make a cross in the square before the name of the candidate you desire to vote for or write his name in the space under the name erased. A ticket marked with a cross under the party name will be deemed a vote for each of the candidates named in such party column whose name is not erased. Before leaving the booth, fold the ballot so that the initials may be seen on the outside.

### ATTY. GENERAL ELLIS SPEAKS.

What He Says about Running on a Stump Ticket.

The following is a letter to one of the Ypsilanti papers, written by the Atty. General, while in the Upper Peninsula.

In what I said in my circular about slips you will observe that I was speaking about persons who desired to run for office, and who have not been nominated by any party, and whose names have not been printed on the ticket.

It seems quite clear to me that the parties who drafted the law had forgotten the man who wanted to run for office on a "stump ticket." I concluded that, as there were no positive provisions in the law applying to such a person, he would have the right to furnish slips to the electors.

I am of the opinion that no slips should be furnished by candidates whose names are printed on the ticket. Slips in such a case would be absolutely unnecessary.

It is a reasonable requirement that the elector should be required to strike a name off from his ticket and place a cross before the name of the candidate on the opposite ticket, if he desires to vote for a candidate not on his ticket and cannot write.

He can make a cross before a name as easily as he can use a slip. Hence, as to all such, no slips should be allowed. If the same rule applies to candidates whose names are not printed on the ticket, inasmuch as the voter must ordinarily prepare his ballot in the booth, and may be a poor writer or unable to write, it practically amounts to saying that a person who is unable to control the caucuses or conventions shall not be allowed to run for office; or at least if he does run, he shall not use the methods in common use to get his name on the ticket.

I believe in giving every man an equal chance, even though he cannot control a ward caucus or a county convention; and if a better man presents himself than the regular nominee the electors should have an opportunity to vote for him, unless the law clearly forbids; and in this case I do not think it contains any such prohibition.

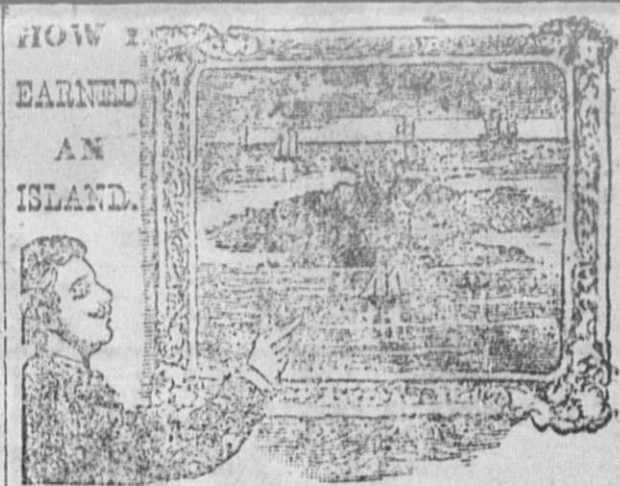
