MICHIGAN DEMOCRATS ADHERE FIRMLY TO THE EX-PRESIDENT.

The Largest Convention Ever Held by the Party in the State at Muskegon, May 4th.

Don M. Dickenson heads the delegation to Chicago; Hon. Spencer O. Fisher, Edward Ryan and E. F. Uhl the other delegates at large; D. J. Campau retained as chairman of the State Central Committee. He is also recommended as National Committeeman. H. B. Hudson, temporary and Peter White permanent president.

The platform presents tariff reform as the over-shadowing issue; a free waterway demanded of the national government. The administration of Gov. Winans highly commended. Speeches full of earnestness and eloquence. Great enthusiasm at the mention of Cleveland's name. Campau telegraphs the president.

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CORRESPONDENCE SOLICITED.

The Republican harmony in Ohio is evidently of the old-fashioned cut-throat brand.

The greatest danger to the Harrison boom lies in the uneducated delegates to the Minneapolis convention.

The Republicans always make wry faces when they are compelled to take a dose of their own political medicine.

Ex-Czar Reed has hoisted a new double power Presidential lightning rod, with a strong anti-Harrison foundation.

Is there treason in the Harrison household? If not why is it that Mr. Blaine has not secured the Maine delegation for his chief?

The McKinley boom is as yet "no larger than a man's hand," but its shadow has been cast in front of the present occupant of the White House, who likes it not.

CHAUNCEY DEPEW and the New York Assembly have declared for Woman Suffrage, and Mr. Gladstone against it. The first round may be considered a draw.

The direst misfortune that has yet overtaken the Harrison boom is the endorsement of Murat Halstead, who has long enjoyed the undisputed title of king of the political hoodlums.

The world is horrified because a civil official of the Czar's household murdered his wife, but nothing is said against the Czar for the numerous murders he has, by proxy committed.

QUAY still has the call on the Pennsylvania Republicans, and now that his return to the Senate is practically assured he is not doing any more talking about the probability of his early retirement from public life.

The free coinage men are now talking about nominating a Presidential ticket on a platform favoring the free and unlimited coinage of both gold and silver. Talk is cheap; it takes votes to elect a President.

An English writer strikes a blow at our prison reform associations by asserting that the prisons of Massachusetts are but schools for crime. In England, where solitary confinement is the rule, it is decreasing, while in America it is increasing.

MR. BLAINE is quoted as having said that it was the hand-shaking the President has to do at the public receptions that caused him to decline the nomination in 1888 and this year. We always had an idea that it was fear of another kind of shake, something like the November, '84 incident that caused those declinations.

BISMARCK has in his time had many editors fined or imprisoned, and some papers confiscated, for libel. He will now have an opportunity to know how it feels to be tried for libel, as an editor has brought suit against him for having declared that the editor was actuated by a corrupt and unpatriotic motive in making certain charges against public officials.

SENATOR Quay's posing as "one of them d— literary fellows" is almost as queer as his championing the Sunday closing of the World's Fair, but the why of his appearance in the pages of the North American Review may be found in the following quotation from his article: "Somewhat in line with the anti-third term idea is a theory-plastic as yet, but tough and indurating to conviction—of the impolicy of attempting a Presidential re-election." S. singing.

On Tuesday the sessions are from 10 to 12, forenoon; 2 to 5, afternoon; and 7 to 10, evening. Programs will be got at the meeting.

The ladies of both Tawas will provide dinner in the basement of the church on Tuesday, and supper at the end of the afternoon's session.

Christ Church Mission.

(Crowded out last week.)

On Sunday morning last, Rev. R. T. W. Webb gave the annual account of the work of the mission.

Since last Easter the congregations have doubled, and the revenue has been considerably augmented. General fund: Cash on hand from last year, \$11.35; collections for year, \$195.30. Disbursements: Church rent, \$34.50; janitor, \$45.50; stipend account, \$22; traveling expenses of clergymen, \$8.62; Easter offering presented to Rev. Mr. Webb, \$42; current expenses, supplies, etc., \$28.97; missions, \$9.25. Total—\$190.84. Cash balance on hand,

\$16.24.

A comparative statement of the clergyman's stipend account showed as follows: Subscriptions paid in—last year, \$190; this year, \$286.50. Ladies Guild—last year, \$166; this, \$77.40. General fund—last year, \$55.65; this, \$22.

The guild has a cash balance of about \$140.

The missionary has received gifts in cash and goods to the amount of about \$160.

During the year the priest in charge held 288 services, preached 258 sermons, delivered 81 lectures and addresses, made 980 calls, conducted six funerals, four marriages, 59 baptisms and celebrated the Holy Eucharist 53 times. In East Tawas there have been 29 celebrations, at which 160 communions have been made.

On Tuesday evening last the Bishop of the diocese visited this mission, and twelve persons received the blessing of God in confirmation. The Bishop gave a very practical address, which was followed with close attention by the large congregation present. Dr. Davies was the guest of Mrs. Fick, at the Iosco, and after the service a goodly number accepted the invitation given to all to meet the Bishop in Mrs. Fick's parlors. **
