## Relics of the Past.

East Tawas, Mich., May 24, 1892.

EDITOR HERALD:

Allow me to trespass upon your valuable time and space for the purpose of replying to the article "Time to Call a Halt" in the Iosco Co. Gazette by its editor, last week.

He also publishes resolutions from the W. C. T. U., passed at a special meeting held May 19, one day before the village board met. How is this?

He admits that the petition was too late, as the amount of the sureties had already been fixed at \$3,000, and the Marshal had been instructed to see that they obeyed the law. Now, there had been two bonds accepted. How could we raise the sureties to \$6,000? If we had done so, it would simply mean free saloons and no license.

Where were your tolerant citizens in 1885 when I first came to East Tawas? Sixteen saloons running twenty-four hours a day. Did the town receive any benefit? No.

Now then, the President and two trustees that you honored so highly are welcome to all the honors that you can bestow upon them. I want none of them. Where do you get your bread, Mr. J.? Providence told you to earn it by the sweat of your brow, and not by abusing the people who support you, more from sympathy than from any valuable service you ever rendered the community at large or the vicinity in which you reside.

I have all due respect for the members of the W. C. T. U., and admire their dignity; and I think if you had properly informed them of the only action that could have been taken on their petition under the circumstances, they would have had no cause for their resolutions of indignation. I wish to inform the ladies that there were two former motions on said petition, neither of them being supported. The subscriber then made a motion that the petition be tabled, which was supported and carried. Now it could be taken from the table any time and acted upon; when, had it been received and placed on file, I suppose there would have been less indignation.

Now, Mr. C. R. J., don't come before the Board of Trustees again and plead the "baby act," asking for more than contract price for your printing. Don't imagine you run this council. If you understand the saloon business so well, run it; as you say how many open saloons since May 1, why don't you go and see. You have the same privilege as any other citizen.

Well, Mr. Gazette Editor, there is no "handle" to my name; it is just plain, every-day Henry Bearinger. The "boys" call me "Hank" for short, and if you are "Hank"ering for any more, just remember that I am on deck.

The world moves. One of the handsomest and most complete exhibits at the Berlin international wine exhibition is from are own California.

The Pacific Mail Steamship company, an adept in the art of procuring Congressional favors, is out for an American registry for one of its ships, and another slice of the subsidy.

EX-CONGRESSMAN Ben Butterworth now on the pay-roll of the World's Fair, has written a letter in which he very cleverly straddles the question of opening the exposition on Sunday.

LITERARY magazines have nothing to gain and everything to loose by opening their columns to abuse of eminent candidates for the Presidential nomination of the Democratic party, as the editor of the Century may soon learn, if he has not already done so.

The Chilian scandal is again being revived at Washington, and a Congressional investigation of the charges which have from time to time been made against Minister Egan, Consul-General McCreery and Admiral Brown is regarded as probable. The charges certainly ought to be investigated.

The Republican Senate deliberately turned its back upon the opportunity to distinguish itself by cutting down the river and harbor bill, which was urged upon it with great persistency by Republican newspapers representing sections not provided for in the bill, and added more than a million dollars to the total of the bill.

SURELY there must be a nice state of affairs at the Government immigration station on Ellis Island, when the Assistant Superintendent—a Republican, of course—admits that there is collision between Government employes and steamship officials to evade the alien contract labor law. There is another instance of the love of the Republican party for the American workingman.

So Andrew Carnegie is to become the head of a great steel trust, with a capital of \$15,000,000. How much is this trust to contribute to the Republican campaign fund in return for the clear steal of nearly \$7 a ton—that being the excess over and above the difference in the cost of production in America and England—on every ton of steel rails manufactured by it, which is allowed by the McKinley tariff law?

TWAS well that Senator Gorman called attention to the fact which seems to be entirely overlooked by some over-impetuous people, of the impossibility of the Democratic majority in the House making radical curtailments in government expenditures as long as the Senate and Executive remain Republican. What is needed is an entire change of system, which can only be brought about by placing all branches of the government under Democratic control.

The John Sherman boom met an early death. Mr. Blaine would much prefer seeing Harrison again re-nominated; he has not forgotten that it was Sherman who kept him out of the coveted nomination, in 1880; nor has he forgiven it. In fact there is no forgiveness in Mr. Blaine's make-up; if he is once an enemy he is always an enemy. This trait in his character seems to have been entirely overlooked by some of those who are figuring on his aiding their Presidential aspirations.

The Sunken Pewabic.

There is liable to be exciting times at Alpena for the next few weeks. Two rival expeditions are to search for the wreck of the steamer Pewabic, which went down at the mouth of Thunder Bay 27 years ago. The Pewabic was loaded with copper, which is said to be valued at \$100,000, and there is also a tradition that there is \$25,000 in gold in her safe.

The Coon expedition, with the steamer Emerald left Ashland last Tuesday. Almost simultaneously another expedition left Duluth, and that there will be a clash of interest is certain. Coon has fitted out the Emerald and three divers accompany him, headed by a Boston expert. He is backed by Ashland capital, Mayor Durfee and F. Prentice having the controlling interest. The Duluth expedition is sent out by Minneapolis capital. Coon supervised the Emerald expedition last year when Diver Pelky lost his life while working at a wreck at a depth of 218 feet.
