### Colonel E. B. Spileman.

We clip the following from the Western Soldier, published in San Francisco:

Edward B. Spileman, Colonel of the Ninth Regiment of Infantry, N. G. C., is justly regarded as one of the ablest officers in the service. Colonel Spileman served in the Union army during the war, and participated in several engagements.

In the great battle of Gettysburg he was wounded, but recovered and returned to duty at the front. He enlisted in Company A of the Ninth Infantry, First Brigade, September 7, 1859; was elected captain of the company September 8, 1859, and colonel of the regiment February 8, 1860. He commanded the First Brigade encampment at Santa Monica last summer, and so well did he perform his duty that Captain O'Connell of the first U. S. Infantry, whose duty it was to visit all of the encampments of the State troops, paid to the colonel the highest tributes of commendation. Colonel Spileman is a gentleman who has gained the greatest of popularity in the regiment, although, in a military sense, he is a strict disciplinarian. The excellence of the Ninth is in a large measure due to his diligent attention and his ready knowledge of military affairs.

### THE BEARINGER MILL BURNED.

Loss \$25,000, \$18,500 Insurance--Will Probably be Re-Built.

At 7:00 o'clock last Monday morning, a very small fire was discovered near the engines in the E. T. M. & I. Co.'s mill, better known as the Bearer mill. The hose were taken out to attach to the mill hydrant, but the wrench for turning the "caps" could not be found, and the attempt was abandoned. Only for this piece of misfortune the mill might have easily been saved. The alarm was carried to Emery's mill (one block to the east,) but reached the water works nearly as quickly, when it was soon known that there was a fire in town by the shrill blasts of the fire whistle. A number rushed to the hall for the hose carts, which were run out and in a very short time on the scene, but it was found that it would be impossible to save the mill, so the fire department set themselves to work to prevent the fire from spreading.

Water was playing on the flames in ten minutes or less after the alarm was first given, but in that very short time the mill, every timber of which, as is usual, was saturated with oil, was a solid mass of fire.

Four streams were in use, and by the use of protectors erected in front of them the fireman were enabled to approach very close to the mill. By 10 o'clock the fire was all out, but nothing remained of the fine Bearer mill but a mass of debris and the parts that were not burnable.

The burner remains uninjured, and there are many other parts that look as if with some repairing, would be servicable, such as the gangs, (which stands erect, water having been kept off of it while hot,) engines, "niggers," boilers, etc.

A number of houses, over which the sparks were flying, caught, but the fire was extinguished in them before any damage was done.

The loss to the mill is placed at about \$25,000, and the company held insurance policies for \$18,500. Unless rebuilt, it will be a great blow to East Tawas, it having employed nearly 100 men and boys.

A raft containing 5,000,000 feet of logs was expected from Spanish river Monday and the mill was being prepared to start Tuesday morning with a view to running night and day.

Members of the company say the mill must be rebuilt, and that it will be running in 60 days, and whether it is actually rebuilt or not rests with the result of the settlement with the insurance companies.

The fire company did good work under chief Hale.

The ladies and small boys showed their interest in a way that was very much appreciated by those fighting the fire, by furnishing water, lemonade, coffee, etc., to those in need of it, and it is safe to say these beverages were in great demand.
