## EAS THE BEARINGER MILL WNWED <br> Loss $\$ 25,000, \$ 18,500$ Insu ance--Will Probaldiy be Re-Built.

At 7:00 o'elock last Monday mor ning, a very small fire was diseover 'ed near the engines in the E. T. M. \& I. Co.s mill, better known as the Bearinger mill. The hose were taken out to attach to the mill hydrant, but the wrench for turning the "caps" could not be found, and the attempt was absendoned. Only for this piece of masfortune the mill might have easily bson saved. The alarm wà carried to Emery's mil (one block to the east,) , but reached the water works nearly as quickly, when it was soon known that there was a fire in town by the shrill blasts of the fire whistle. A num ber rushed to the hall for the hos carts, which. were run out and in a very short time on the soene, but it was found that it would be impos sible to save the mill, so the fire department set themselves to work to prevent the fire from spraading.
Water was playing on: the flames in ten minutes or less after the alarm was first given, but in، that very short time the mill, every timber of which, as is usual, was: saturated with orl, was a solid mass of fire. Four streams were in use, and by the use of protectors erected in front of them. the fireman were enabled to approach very close to the mill. By 100 'clock the fire was all out, but nothing remained of the fine Bearinger mill but a mass of debris and
the parts that were not burnable. The burner remains uninjured, and there are many other parts that look as if with some repairing, would be servicable, sueh as the gangs, (which stands erect, water having been kept
off of it while hot,) engines, "nigoff of it while hot,
gers," boilers, etc. A number of houses, over which the sparks were flying, caught, but the fire was extinguistied in them before any damage was done.
The loss to the mill is placed at about $\$ 25,000$, and the company held insurance policies for $\$ 18,500$. Unless rebuilt, it will be a great blow to East Tawas, it having employed nearly 100 men and boys.
A raft containing 5,000,000 feet of $\log$ was expected. from Spanish
river Monday and the mill was being prepared to-start Tuesday morning With a view to rumming might and mill must be rebult, and that it will be rumning in 60 days, and whether it is actually rebuilt or not rests with the result of the settle ment with the insurance companies The fire company did good work under chief Hale.
