# CLEVELAND!

HE IS THE DEMOCRATIC LEADER, NOMINATED YESTERDAY.

As E. Stevenson, of Illinois, His Running Mate.

Few National Conventions in the history of the United States ever equaled in harmony the one held by the Democrats in Chicago this week which placed at the head of the party the name of GROVER CLEVELAND for president and ADLAI E. STEVENSON for vice president.

Tammany opposed Cleveland quite vigorously at first, but very cheerfully conceded after the nomination.

Gov. Abbott, of New Jersey nominated Cleveland amid tumultuous applause and enthusiasm.

Wm. C. Dewitt, of Brooklyn, nominated Hill, and John S. Duncombe, of Fort Dodge, presented the name of Horace Boies, of Iowa.

There were in all 902 delegates, of whose votes Cleveland received 616 (being 17 1/2 more than was necessary for his nomination. Hill 114, Boies 103 and Senator Gorman received 36 1/2. There were 11 1/2 scattering votes. This was the result of the first ballot, and the "first ballot" will elect Cleveland as decidedly and emphatically next November. During the session the mere mention of Cleveland's name would create roars of cheers that would last for fifteen or twenty minutes at a time thus showing the appreciation of the great Democratic leader by the party. As a further appreciation on motion his nomination was made unanimous.

John E. Lamb nominated Gray of Indiana, for vice president, and Mr. Worthington, of Indiana, started Stevenson, on the road to victory. The good judgement of the convention is shown by their choice. It could not possibly have been better, and the nomination is a sure winner.

Hurrah for Cleveland and Stevenson!

AND "Granny" Blair, where was he?

THE Harrison "ice-wagon" will make this a cold campaign for big Tom Reed.

THE old Grant Republicans have good memories, and they are fond of revenge. They have not forgotten the many bitter things Whitelaw Reid wrote of Grant, before and during the '72 campaign, and they will not neglect the opportunity to "get even" that his running for Vice President gives them.

Force Wire at Alpena.

June 21.—The most violent storm of wind, rain and hail that ever visited this portion of the state swept over the city yesterday about noon.

In two minutes after the storm had commenced the wind had attained a velocity of 72 miles per hour and was carrying many things before it.
