OBITUARY.

As we were unable to get an authentic report of the business life of the late W. M. Ellison, we deferred the final obituary till this week:

Mr. Ellison was a native of Ireland, born in 1856. He emigrated to this country with his parents in 1860, and located in Tuscola county. He was married twice, his first wife having been dead about ten years. On Sept. 28, 1887, he married Miss May Workman, of Vassar, who still survives him, and will continue to carry on the well merited business of her late husband in this place.

As we stated last week death was very sudden. Mr. Ellison died Sunday, July 19, after six hours of intense suffering from apoplexy.

His business career in this city is above reproach, having been here about four years.

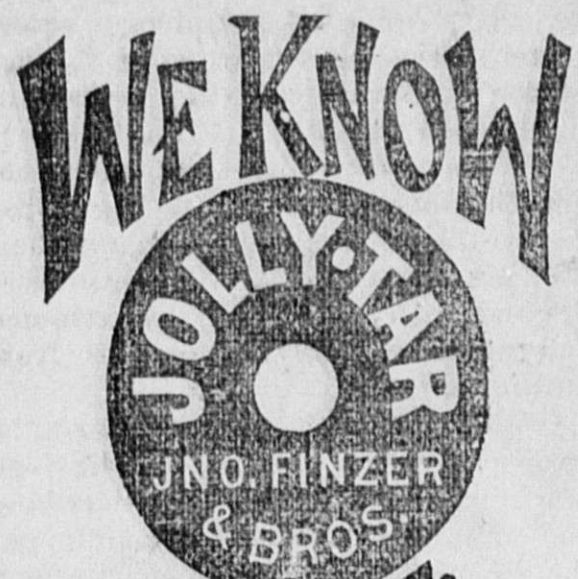

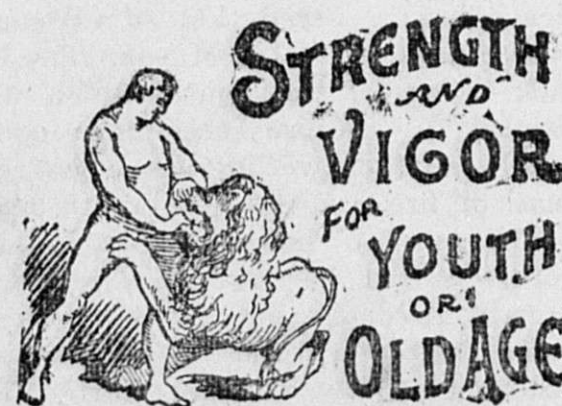

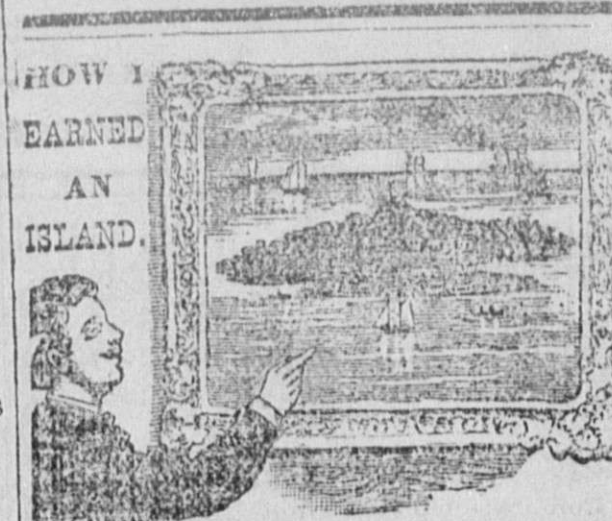
