The Council met in regular session at the Village Hall Tawas City, April 28, 1892.

President Smith in the chair. Roll call. Present—Murphy, Bonney, Gale, Koenig and Kelley, Absent—Nesbit.

The minutes of meeting of Mar. 28 were read and approved.

Trustee Nesbit then came in and took his seat.

Moved by Koenig supported by Bonney that the council ballot for president pro tem for the ensuing year. Carried.

The result of the ballot was as follows: Bonney, 4; Koenig, 2; Kelly 1. Mr. Bonney having received a majority of the votes cast was declared elected.

Standing committees for the year were then appointed by the president.

Moved by Koenig supported by Bonney that the liquor bonds be fixed at \$3,000 for the ensuing year. Carried.

Moved by Kelly, supported by Bonney that the druggists' bonds be fixed at \$2,000 for the ensuing year. Carried.

Moved by Kelly supported by Nesbit that the village marshal's bond be fixed at \$1,000 for the faithful performance of his duties for the ensuing year. Carried.

Moved by Kelly supported by Koenig, that the bond of Village Treasurer be fixed at \$2,000 for the ensuing year. Carried.

Moved by Nesbit, supported by Murphy that the bond of village clerk be fixed at \$500 for the ensuing year. Carried.

Moved by Murphy supported by Koenig that the bond of St. Com'r be fixed at \$200 for the ensuing year. Carried.

Moved by Gale, supported by Nesbit that the bond of village constable be fixed at \$200 for the ensuing year. Carried. GEO. W. MOUNT, Clerk.

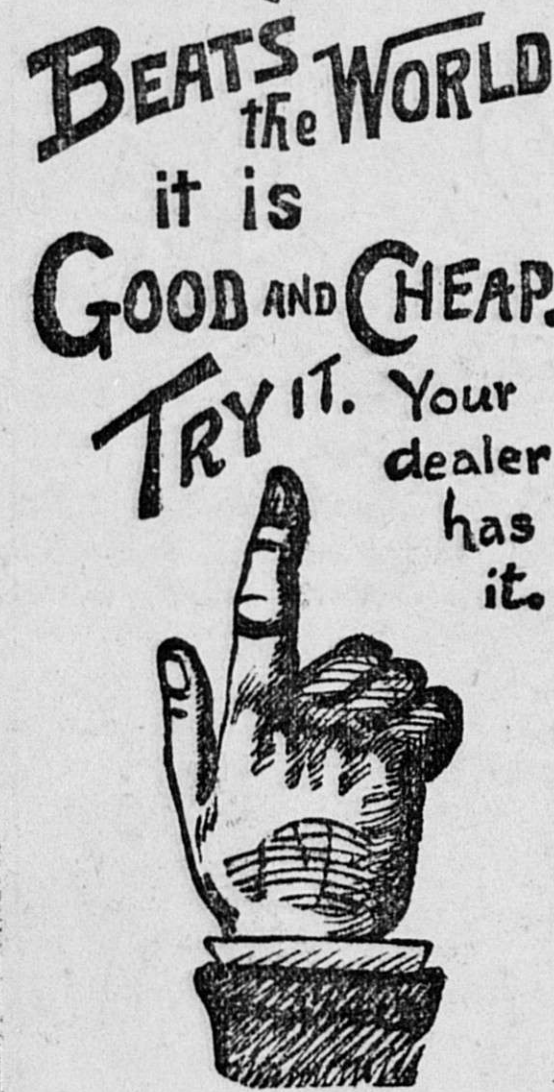

OBITUARY.

Mrs. Rosenthal was a native of Poland, born in 1838. She emigrated to N. Y. City in girlhood, where she lived with her two brothers—her only immediate relatives, one of which still lives—until her marriage, when Miss Annie Wolfe became Mrs. E. Rosenthal in 1857. In 1872, she came to East Tawas with her husband, who went into the merchant tailoring business, which he followed successfully for five or six years, then started a dry goods and clothing store, which he continued to run till about four years ago, when he sold out to his son Joe, who conducted the business in an enterprising manner till last winter.
Nine children, five boys and four girls, now all grown up, were the result of the union between Mr. and Mrs. Rosenthal, all of which survive her, one daughter being married and now living in N. Y. City. Mr. Rosenthal also survives his wife.
Mrs. Rosenthal has not enjoyed good health for some time, and when she was attacked with inflammation of the brain and taken away, her friends and relatives were somewhat fortified against the sad blow.
The remains were taken to Bay City Saturday evening, and interred in the Hebrew cemetery at that

place on Sunday.
She was highly esteemed and respected by her people, and many kind friends mourn her demise.
