## MORSE LEADS.

### The Grand Rapids Convention Nominates a Winning Ticket.

### A GREAT DEMONSTRATION OF ENTHUSIASM BY THE DELEGATES.

### List of Candidates Nominated at the Convention.

Hartman's Hall, where the convention was held, was tastefully decorated for the occasion. The doors opened soon after 11 o'clock, Wednesday, and the delegates filed in and took their seats with smiles that argued well for harmony and enthusiasm.

Promptly at 12 o'clock Chairman Campan called the convention to order and announced that the divine blessing would be invoked by Rev. Christian Vanderveen, of Grand Rapids, after which he made a few well selected remarks commending Democracy for the efficiency of its administration in the State during the past two years, and speaking very confidently of a repetition of our victory of 1890.

He was frequently interrupted with enthusiastic cheers and applause. At the close of his address he named I. M. Weston as temporary chairman, and P. J. McKenna as temporary secretary. They were escorted to their posts, and after being greeted with cheers, Mr. Weston proceeded to address the convention in a very able manner, after which he read letters from Gov. Winans and And. Gen. Stone respectfully declining renominations. After a few more preliminaries the convention adjourned till 2 o'clock.

On reassembling Chairman Weston called for committee reports. Committee on Credentials reported that Isle Royal was the only county not represented. Committee on permanent organization reported Congressman T. A. E. Weadock as permanent chairman amid tumultuous applause. Mr. McKenna was re-appointed permanent secretary. Mr. Weadock spoke appropriately and then proceeded to the nominations.

Hon. E. F. Uhl, of the fifth district, in a very able speech put in nomination for Governor, Hon. Allen B. Morse, Chief Justice of the State, who was unanimously chosen to lead Michigan Democrats to victory by acclamation and applause.

Judge Morse very gracefully accepted the nomination, much to the gratification of the convention and every true-hearted Democrat in the State.

J. Maurice Finn, of the twelfth nominated James P. Edwards, of Houghton, for Lieutenant-Governor, and the nomination was confirmed in a twinkling by unanimity.

For Secretary of State the call of districts reached the 7th, when F. M. Crocker, of Pt. Huron nominated Arthur M. Clark, of Lexington. Tim Tarsney, of the 8th, nominated Chas. F. Marksey, of Saginaw, when the first nomination was withdrawn and Mr. Marksey was nominated by acclamation.

Hon. Peter White, of the twelfth nominated Joseph A. Vannier, of Marquette, for Aud. Gen. There being no other nominations, Mr. Vannier went in with a cheer.

Frederick Marvin, of Wayne, was nominated by Wm. C. Maybury. The rules were suspended and Mr. Marvin was quickly declared the candidate for Treasurer.

Adolphus A. Ellis was nominated to succeed himself as Att'y-Gen. There were several candidates but not much opposition, so Mr. Ellis is booked for another victory.

Gen. Geo. L. Shaffer received a well-merited re-nomination for Commissioner of the State Land Office from the convention.

F. S. Fitch was re-nominated for Supt. of Public Instructions; and James K. Burr, of Lyndon, is the nominee for member of Board of Education.

G. H. Durand, of Flint, for the eastern district, and Hon. Peter White, of Marquette, for the western district, were chosen as electors at large.

It is conceded by all who attended this convention that it was the most successful of any of whatever character ever held in Michigan. All was peace and harmony, and we believe a stronger ticket would have been impossible to select. It is a SURE WINNER.

JAMES LaBerge, of East Tawas was a candidate on the Democratic ticket for County Treasurer two years ago, and made a good run considering he made it against R. K. Gowanlock, who the people thought was entitled to a second term, as was the case with our humble self. Now that Mr. LaBerge is willing to make the race once more while the coast is clear, and he being well qualified, he should receive the nomination on the Democrat ticket by acclamation. Democrats should endorse those who have spent their time and money freely, qualifications and etc., being equal.

Acts of the Special Session.

The following laws were enacted at the special session of the Legislature, August 5th and 6th, for the reapportionment of the state into Senatorial and Representative districts:

AN ACT

For the reapportionment of Senators in the State Legislature.

SECTION 1.—The people of the State of Michigan enact, That this State shall be and is hereby divided into thirty-two Senate Districts, each district to be entitled to one Senator, which said district shall be constituted as follows, viz:—

- FIRST DISTRICT.—The ninth, eleventh, thirteenth and fifteenth wards in the city of Detroit, and the townships of Grose Point, Hamtramck, Greenfield, Redford, Livonia and Elymouth, in the county of Wayne. SECOND DISTRICT.—The first, second, third, fifth, and seventh wards of the city of Detroit. THIRD DISTRICT.—The fourth, sixth, eighth, and tenth wards of the city of Detroit. FOURTH DISTRICT.—The twelfth, fourteenth, and sixteenth wards of the city of Detroit, and the townships of Canton, Nankin, Dearborn, Springwells, Van Buren, Romulus, Taylor, Leorse, Bunker, Huron, Brownstown and Montaugon, and the city of Wyandotte in the county of Wayne. FIFTH DISTRICT.—The counties of Lenawee and Monroe. SIXTH DISTRICT.—The counties of St. Joseph, Branch and Hillsdale. SEVENTH DISTRICT.—The counties of Berrien and Cass. EIGHTH DISTRICT.—The counties of Allegan and Van Buren. NINTH DISTRICT.—The counties of Kalamazoo and Calhoun. TENTH DISTRICT.—The counties of Jackson and Washtenaw. ELEVENTH DISTRICT.—The county of St. Clair. TWELFTH DISTRICT.—The counties of Oakland and Macomb. THIRTEENTH DISTRICT.—The counties of Livingston and Genesee. FOURTEENTH DISTRICT.—The counties of Shiawassee and Ingham. FIFTEENTH DISTRICT.—The counties of Barry and Eaton. SIXTEENTH DISTRICT.—The first, second, third, fourth, fifth, sixth, seventh, eighth, ninth, and twelfth wards of the city of Grand Rapids, in the county of Kent. SEVENTEENTH DISTRICT.—The tenth and eleventh wards of the city of Grand Rapids, and the townships of Tyrom, Solon, Nelson, Spencer, Sparta, Alpena, Conradian, Oakfield, Alpena, Plainfield, Cannon, Grant, Walker, Grand Rapids, Ada, Vergennes, Wyoming, Paris, Cascade, Lowell, Byron, Gaines, Caledonia and Bowne in the county of Kent. EIGHTEENTH DISTRICT.—The counties of Ionia and Montcalm. NINETEENTH DISTRICT.—The counties of Chippewa and Gratiot. TWENTIETH DISTRICT.—The counties of Huron and Sanilac. TWENTY-FIRST DISTRICT.—The counties of Tuscola and Leapeer. TWENTY-SECOND DISTRICT.—The county of Saginaw. TWENTY-THIRD DISTRICT.—The counties of Muskegon and Ottawa. TWENTY-FOURTH DISTRICT.—The counties of Ben, Arenac and Midland. TWENTY-FIFTH DISTRICT.—The counties of Osceola, Newaygo, Mecosta and Isabella. TWENTY-SIXTH DISTRICT.—The counties of Manistee, Mason, Lake and Oceana. TWENTY-SEVENTH DISTRICT.—The counties of Benzie, Wexford, Grand Traverse, Leelanaw, Kalkaska, Antrim and Charlevoix. TWENTY-EIGHTH DISTRICT.—The counties of Crawford, Osceola, Alpena, Missaukee, Roscommon, Ogemaw, Iosco, Clare and Gladwin. TWENTY-NINTH DISTRICT.—The counties of Otsego, Montmorency, Alpena, Presque Isle, Cheboygan, Emmet and Manistowick. THIRTIETH DISTRICT.—The counties of Mackinac, Chippewa, Luce, Schoolcraft, Delta and Menominee. THIRTY-FIRST DISTRICT.—The counties of Marquette, Alger, Dickinson and Iron. THIRTY-SECOND DISTRICT.—The counties of Houghton, Baraga, Keweenaw, Gogebic, Ontonagon and Isle Royal. SECTION 2.—The election returns of each county forming one senate district, shall be made to the county clerk's office of said county. The election returns of each senate district composed of more than one county, shall be made to the county clerk's office of the county in such senate district containing the largest number of inhabitants according to the census of one thousand eight hundred and ninety. The election returns of each senate district composed of a portion of a county, shall be made to the county clerk's office of such county. This act is ordered to take immediate effect. Approved August 6th, 1892.

AN ACT

To apportion among the representatives among the several counties and districts of this State.

SECTION 1.—The people of the State of Michigan enact, That the House of Representatives shall hereafter be composed of one hundred members, elected agreeably to a ratio of one representative to every twenty thousand nine hundred and thirty-eight persons, including civilized persons of Indian descent, not members of any tribe, in each organized county, and one representative of each county having a fraction more than a moiety of said ratio, and not included therein, until the one hundred representatives are assigned, that is to say, within the county of Wayne, twelve (12); Kent, five (5); Saginaw, four (4); Bay, three (3); St. Clair, three (3); Lenawee, two (2); Jackson two (2); Calhoun, two (2); Washtenaw, two (2); Berrien, two (2); Oakland, two (2); Muskegon, two (2); Marquette, two (2); Genesee two (2); Kalamazoo, two (2); Allegan, two (2); Ingham, two (2); Houghton, two (2); Ottawa, two (2); Montcalm, two (2); Ionia, two (2); Sanilac, two (2); Tuscola, two (2); Monroe, two (2); Eaton, two (2); Macomb, two (2); Shiawassee, one (1); Hillsdale, one (1); Van Buren, one (1); Lapeer, one (1); Gratiot, one (1); Huron, one (1); Clinton, one (1); St. Joseph, one (1); Branch, one (1); Manistee, one (1); Barry, one (1); Cass, one (1); Menominee, one (1); Livingston, one (1); Newaygo, one (1); Mecosta, one (1); Isabella, one (1); Mason, one (1); Oceana, one (1); the counties of Midland, Gladwin and Arenac shall constitute a representative district and shall be entitled to one representative, and the election returns of said district shall be made to the county of Wexford. The counties of Osceola and Lake shall constitute a representative district, and be entitled to one representative, and the election returns of said district shall be made to the county of Osceola. The counties of Grand Traverse, Leelanaw and Benzie shall constitute a representative district and be entitled to one representative, and the election returns of said district shall be made to the county of Grand Traverse. The counties of Antrim, Charlevoix and Kalkaska shall constitute a representative district and be entitled to one representative, and the election returns of said district shall be made to the county of Antrim. The counties of Iosco, Alpena, Roscommon and Ogemaw shall constitute a representative district and be entitled to one representative, and the election returns of said district shall be made to the county of Iosco. The counties of Alpena, Montmorency, Otsego, Osceola and Crawford shall constitute a representative district and be entitled to one representative, and the election returns of said district shall be made to the county of Alpena. The counties of Cheboygan, Emmet, Presque Isle and Manitowick shall constitute a representative district and be entitled to one representative, and the election returns of said district shall be made to the county of Cheboygan. The counties of Chippewa, Mackinac and Ionia shall constitute a representative district, and be entitled to one representative, and the election returns of said district shall be made to the county of Chippewa. The counties of Delta, Schoolcraft and Alger shall constitute a representative district and be entitled to one representative, and the election returns of said district shall be made to the county of Delta. The counties of Dickinson, Iron and Baraga shall constitute a representative district and be entitled to one representative, and the election returns of said district shall be made to the county of Dickinson. The counties of Gogebic, Ontonagon, Keweenaw and Isle Royal shall constitute a representative district and be entitled to one representative, and the election returns of said district shall be made to the county of Gogebic. This Act is ordered to take immediate effect. Approved August 5th, A. D. 1892.

The counties of Wexford, Missaukee and Clare shall constitute a representative district and be entitled to one representative, and the election returns of said district shall be made to the county of Wexford. The counties of Grand Traverse, Leelanaw and Benzie shall constitute a representative district and be entitled to one representative, and the election returns of said district shall be made to the county of Grand Traverse. The counties of Antrim, Charlevoix and Kalkaska shall constitute a representative district and be entitled to one representative, and the election returns of said district shall be made to the county of Antrim. The counties of Iosco, Alpena, Roscommon and Ogemaw shall constitute a representative district and be entitled to one representative, and the election returns of said district shall be made to the county of Iosco. The counties of Alpena, Montmorency, Otsego, Osceola and Crawford shall constitute a representative district and be entitled to one representative, and the election returns of said district shall be made to the county of Alpena. The counties of Cheboygan, Emmet, Presque Isle and Manitowick shall constitute a representative district and be entitled to one representative, and the election returns of said district shall be made to the county of Cheboygan. The counties of Chippewa, Mackinac and Ionia shall constitute a representative district, and be entitled to one representative, and the election returns of said district shall be made to the county of Chippewa. The counties of Delta, Schoolcraft and Alger shall constitute a representative district and be entitled to one representative, and the election returns of said district shall be made to the county of Delta. The counties of Dickinson, Iron and Baraga shall constitute a representative district and be entitled to one representative, and the election returns of said district shall be made to the county of Dickinson. The counties of Gogebic, Ontonagon, Keweenaw and Isle Royal shall constitute a representative district and be entitled to one representative, and the election returns of said district shall be made to the county of Gogebic. This Act is ordered to take immediate effect. Approved August 5th, A. D. 1892.

SECTION 1.—The people of the State of Michigan enact, That this State shall be and is hereby divided into thirty-two Senate Districts, each district to be entitled to one Senator, which said district shall be constituted as follows, viz:—

FIRST DISTRICT.—The ninth, eleventh, thirteenth and fifteenth wards in the city of Detroit, and the townships of Grose Point, Hamtramck, Greenfield, Redford, Livonia and Elymouth, in the county of Wayne. SECOND DISTRICT.—The first, second, third, fifth, and seventh wards of the city of Detroit. THIRD DISTRICT.—The fourth, sixth, eighth, and tenth wards of the city of Detroit. FOURTH DISTRICT.—The twelfth, fourteenth, and sixteenth wards of the city of Detroit, and the townships of Canton, Nankin, Dearborn, Springwells, Van Buren, Romulus, Taylor, Leorse, Bunker, Huron, Brownstown and Montaugon, and the city of Wyandotte in the county of Wayne. FIFTH DISTRICT.—The counties of Lenawee and Monroe. SIXTH DISTRICT.—The counties of St. Joseph, Branch and Hillsdale. SEVENTH DISTRICT.—The counties of Berrien and Cass. EIGHTH DISTRICT.—The counties of Allegan and Van Buren. NINTH DISTRICT.—The counties of Kalamazoo and Calhoun. TENTH DISTRICT.—The counties of Jackson and Washtenaw. ELEVENTH DISTRICT.—The county of St. Clair. TWELFTH DISTRICT.—The counties of Oakland and Macomb. THIRTEENTH DISTRICT.—The counties of Livingston and Genesee. FOURTEENTH DISTRICT.—The counties of Shiawassee and Ingham. FIFTEENTH DISTRICT.—The counties of Barry and Eaton. SIXTEENTH DISTRICT.—The first, second, third, fourth, fifth, sixth, seventh, eighth, ninth, and twelfth wards of the city of Grand Rapids, in the county of Kent. SEVENTEENTH DISTRICT.—The tenth and eleventh wards of the city of Grand Rapids, and the townships of Tyrom, Solon, Nelson, Spencer, Sparta, Alpena, Conradian, Oakfield, Alpena, Plainfield, Cannon, Grant, Walker, Grand Rapids, Ada, Vergennes, Wyoming, Paris, Cascade, Lowell, Byron, Gaines, Caledonia and Bowne in the county of Kent. EIGHTEENTH DISTRICT.—The counties of Ionia and Montcalm. NINETEENTH DISTRICT.—The counties of Chippewa and Gratiot. TWENTIETH DISTRICT.—The counties of Huron and Sanilac. TWENTY-FIRST DISTRICT.—The counties of Tuscola and Leapeer. TWENTY-SECOND DISTRICT.—The county of Saginaw. TWENTY-THIRD DISTRICT.—The counties of Muskegon and Ottawa. TWENTY-FOURTH DISTRICT.—The counties of Ben, Arenac and Midland. TWENTY-FIFTH DISTRICT.—The counties of Osceola, Newaygo, Mecosta and Isabella. TWENTY-SIXTH DISTRICT.—The counties of Manistee, Mason, Lake and Oceana. TWENTY-SEVENTH DISTRICT.—The counties of Benzie, Wexford, Grand Traverse, Leelanaw, Kalkaska, Antrim and Charlevoix. 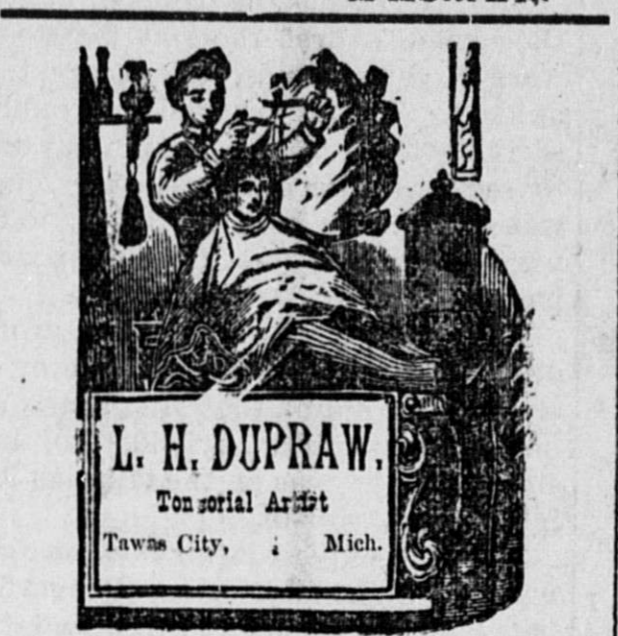

Board of Supervisors met at the court house, in the Village of Tawas City, pursuant to adjournment.  
Present—Sups. Ferrister, Balcom, Latham, Johnson, Murphy, Duplanty, Dillon and Jackson.  
There being no quorum present the board adjourned till 1 o'clock p. m.  
One o'clock p. m. Present—Sups. Ferrister, Slingerland, Betz, Balcom, Latham, Sloat, Rodman, Johnson, Murphy, Dillon, Duplanty, Yockey, Galbraith and Jackson. Quorum present.  
Minutes of April 20th read and on motion approved.  
The chairman appointed a committee to canvass the county vote for the loan of \$15,000 for the improvement of drains, bridges and ditches, which was submitted to the electors of the county on the 4th day of April, '92. Following is the committee appointed: Dillon, Slingerland, Betz, Galbraith and Duplanty.  
Committee reported that the loan was defeated by a majority of 731 votes.  
On motion the report was adopted.  
The following resolution by Sup. Jackson, was adopted:  
WHEREAS, The electors of the Twp. of Sherman, at their annual meeting held on the 4th day of April, A. D. 1892, by motion decided to bond their township for the purpose of building an iron bridge across the East Branch of the Au Gres River, in said township, providing the question of the county loan did not carry;  
WHEREAS, The said loan did not carry, and  
WHEREAS, The said loan question was voted in the negative, therefore  
Resolved, That the electors of the Twp. of Sherman be and are hereby authorized and empowered to raise by the vote of the electors of said township, for the purpose of building and constructing bridges and roads in their township by bonding the same for the sum of one thousand dollars or under for the year 1892, and that said bonds should be paid on or before the term of five years from the date of issue of said bonds.  
The following resolution by Sup. Yockey was adopted:  
WHEREAS, Judge Laidlaw reports to this board that R. R. Emmons, of Au Sable is in such condition that he has been obliged to place him in the hands of a night and day watch at the expense of the county, and until such time as he can give him a hearing and get room for him in an insane asylum, at present there being no room in the asylum for any more persons. Therefore be it  
Resolved, That Judge Laidlaw be authorized to use his own discretion for the care of said R. E. Emmons at the expense of Iosco county as he may in his judgment direct.

To the Board of Supervisors of Iosco county:  
Your committee on supplies and repairs to whom was referred the resolution relative to placing screens at the mouths of the various creeks in the county to prevent the speckled trout from going into the various rivers and lakes, report that the recommendations in said resolution be not carried out for the reason it is unlawful, according to section 13 of the general fish law of 1892, and that no further action be taken in regard to same until Game Warden Murphy shall confer with the proper officers of the State regarding same.

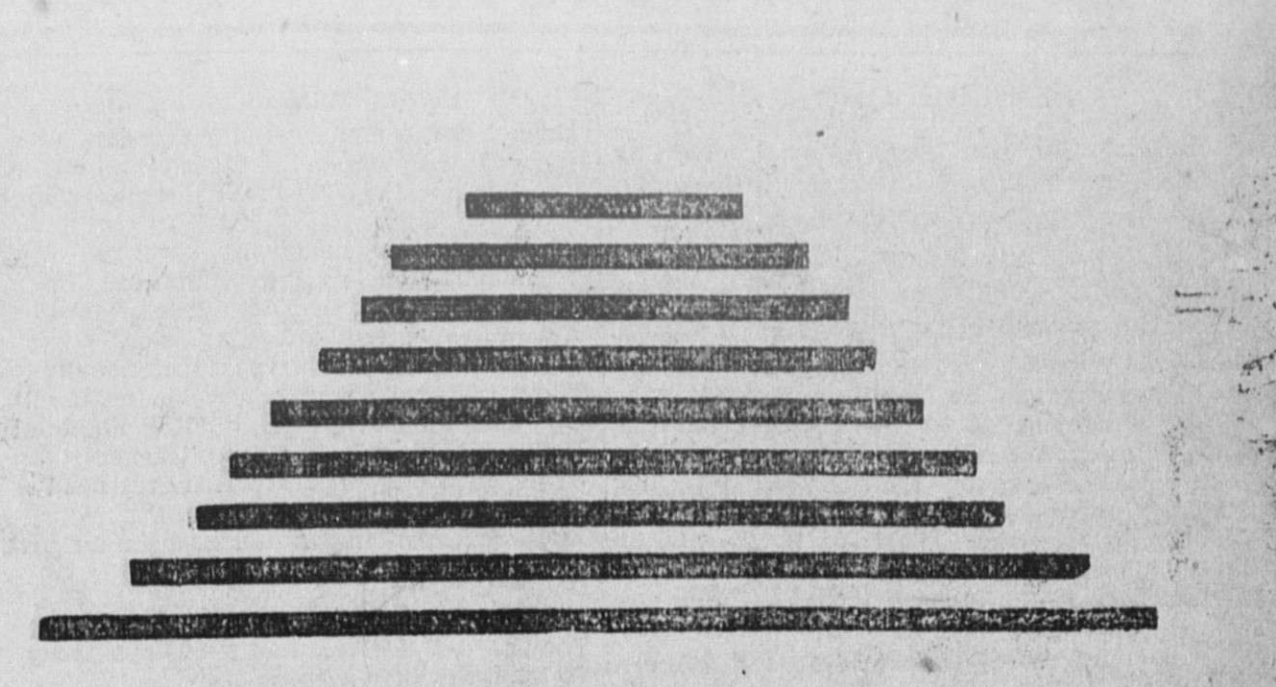

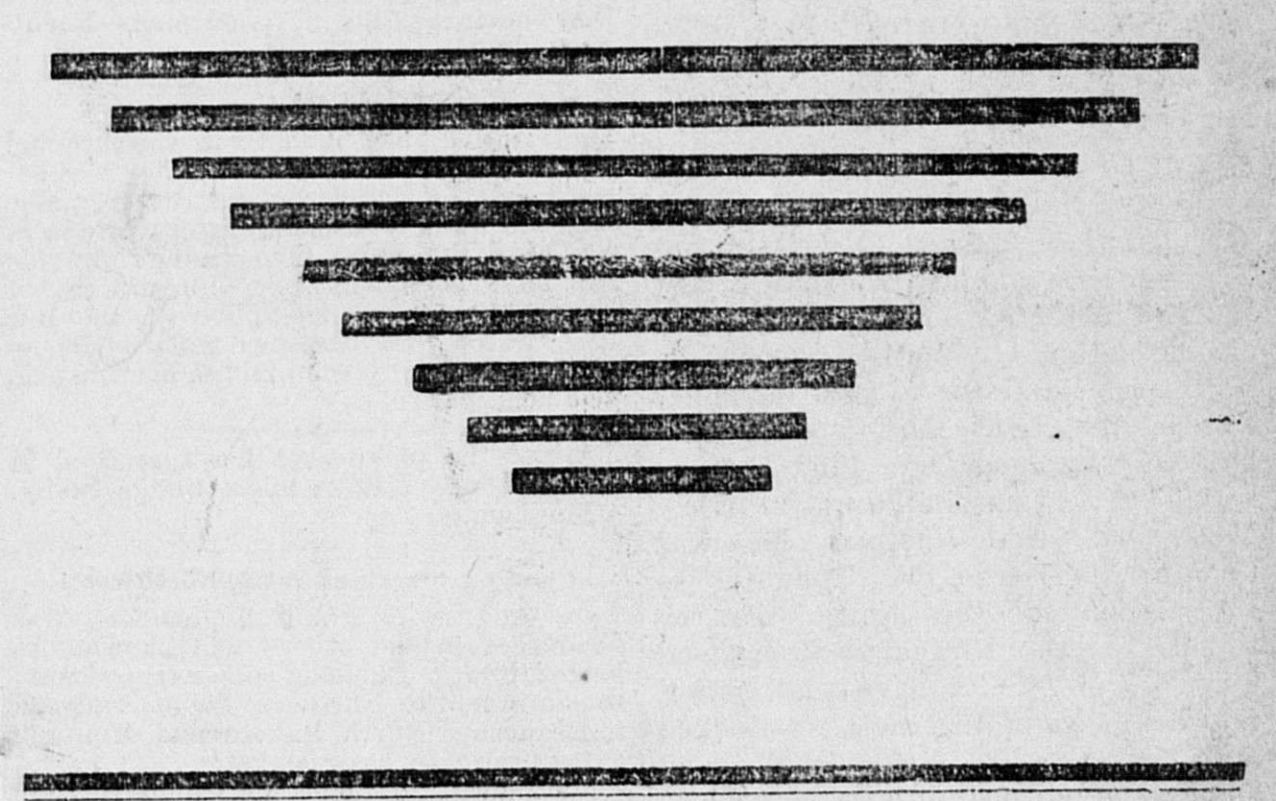
