## CANDIDATES.

There are Numerous Aspirants for County Offices.

We clip the following from the Saturday Night of Sept. 17:

There are numerous candidates for the different county offices this fall. The following are among those who are more or less prominently mentioned:

### SHERIFF.

For sheriff on the Republican ticket there are Peter E. Shlen of Oscoda, Hugh Colwell and James Quinn of Au Sable, and Thos Cox of East Tawas. On the Democratic side the following are given by the TAWAS HERALD, which is good Democratic authority: Michael Murphy of Tawas City, Robt Smith and Noah Hennigar of Oscoda, Wm. Elliott, James Barnes and John Dunn of Au Sable; J. W. Lanktree of East Tawas and Frank Duplanty of Whittemore.

### CLERK.

For Clerk Charles A. Jahraus the present incumbent seems to have a clear field for the Democratic nomination, as it seems to be conceded that he is entitled to a renomination. There is no candidate as yet for the Republican nomination.

### TREASURER.

Benj. Oakes of East Tawas, and Frank W. Whittemore of Tawas City, are candidates for the Republican nomination, and R. S. Dodds of Au Sable has been mentioned by his friends, although The Saturday Night does not understand that he is an avowed candidate. On the Democratic side Geo. H. Chamberlain of East Tawas can have the nomination if he will take it. Jas. LaBarge of East Tawas is also talked of.

### PROSECUTING ATTORNEY.

Main J. Connine, the present Prosecuting Attorney, agrees to run again on the Republican ticket if the party wants him, although he is not urging his own candidacy. The friends of Albert E. Sharpe of East Tawas, are urging him for the nomination. For the Democratic nomination E. M. Elliott seems to be the most likely candidate. C. R. Henry has been urged by his friends to stand for the nomination but is reported as being opposed to it. W. A. McLean is also mentioned for the nomination.

### PROBATE JUDGE.

For this office E. Laidlaw, the present Judge of Probate seems to be the only avowed candidate for the Republican nomination. For the Democrat nomination C. R. Henry is the probable man.

### REGISTER OF DEEDS.

Geo. L. Cornville and Thos. Bradley are the candidates for the Republican nomination. Geo. H. Cosgrove has been talked of considerably for the Democratic nomination, but has not consented to become a candidate.

—Prof. J. K. Osgerby, of East Tawas, will preach in the Congregational church next Sabbath morning. Rev. Culver, who is at conference in Owosso this week, will again occupy the pulpit the Sunday following.

—P. O. Colby, of Cheboygan, brother of the late Mrs. R. G. Anschutz, made us a pleasant call to-day. He will remain a short time, being in town in the interest of the Equitable Life Assurance Society of New York.

—Miss Rose M. Knoblauch and Miss Covert, of Bay City, will open a dress making shop over W. A. Reeves' clothing establishment in East Tawas, Oct. 1st. They respectfully solicit a share of the public patronage.

—Sheriff Bradley has just completed a fine frame barn, and is erecting a residence on his farm adjoining our city. Mr. Bradley has worked hard and faithfully for the people at large, and is deserving of what he has made, and now he will have a comfortable home when all the surroundings are completed to suit his want's. If he gets the nomination on the Republican ticket for Register of Deeds, and should be elected we will make him a call and help him cut a watermelon, and crush his pumpkins occasionally.

## T. A. E. WEADOCK.

This Popular Democratic War Horse Renominated.

Following is what the Alpena Argus of a recent date says regarding this popular leader, and the Congressional convention:

Last Wednesday the Democratic Congressional convention was held at Cheboygan, and Congressman T. A. E. Weadock was renominated by acclamation, and in so doing the convention carried out the unanimous demand of the Democrats of the Tenth district. Congressman Weadock has been tried and has proved a faithful servant of the people, and during his term of service has done good work for this district. His record is one that will bear the closest scrutiny, and so well are the people satisfied with him, that we predict his election next November by a large majority. Congressman Weadock is a man that the Democrats will be pleased to vote for. There are but few Congressmen who have made as good a record during their first term as did Mr. Weadock.

## JOHNSON FOR SENATOR.

A Convention of the Democratic electors of the 28th Senatorial District was held at Roscommon Tuesday, to nominate a candidate for Senator in the State Legislature.

There were two candidates, Wm. A. Burritt and Arthur M. Johnson. The last named gentleman was the choice of the Convention.

Mr. Johnson is a resident of Oscoda, this county. He acquired his education by working in the saw mills at that place during the summer months and going to school in the winter. He graduated from the law department of the State University in 1889, and was admitted to the bar that year. He has taken a very active part in the cause of Democracy, and has been elected by handsome majorities to several township offices. He is a bright, intelligent young man, and greatly respected by all classes in this district.

—The new plaster mill, at Alabaster, steamed up Saturday last, and the sound of the new whistle was much appreciated after a long silence in that enterprising village. The mill will be under full operation in a few days.

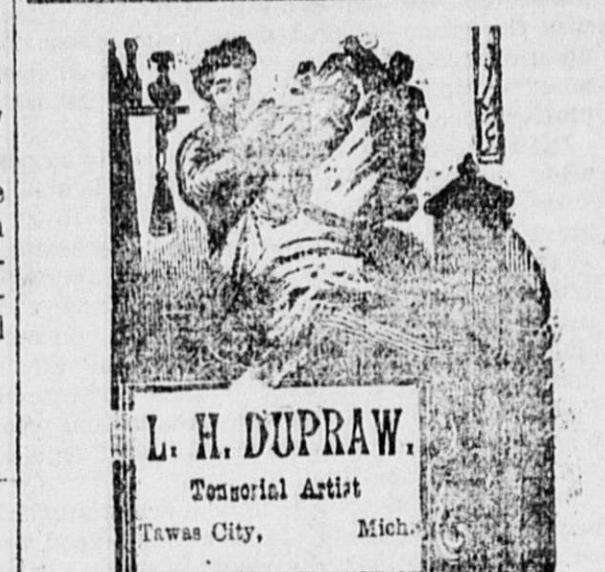

## DEATHS.

During the past week the Grim Reaper has several times visited our beautiful little city:

CHARLES PATIENT—DROWNED.

Last Saturday while Charles Patient, with John McGeary and Johnnie McKinnon, all of this place, were working on a raft of the Mich. Log Towing Co. in the bight of the Bay, the water, which was considerably agitated by the quite violent wind prevailing at that time, so tumbled the logs as to make it impossible for the two former to remain upon them and they were both thrown into the bay where Charlie Patient found a watery grave.

McGeary, who could swim, immediately climbed up and recovered his position on the logs, but poor Patient, who, unfortunately could not swim a stroke, after a faint, futile effort to reach the logs, let loose of his pole and sunk to the bottom. The other two gentlemen waited for him to come to the surface, but, unlike the usual cases, he did not appear. The engineer of the tug T. F. Moore, which was working with the raft, made a brave attempt to save the life of the drowning man by diving after him, but he was unable even to see him. The life saving crew were prompt to respond to the call for help, and from 10:30, (the time of the fatal accident) a vigilant search was prosecuted till Tuesday afternoon at 4 p. m. when Frank Bearinger and Wm. Dean, found the body and brought it to the surface. It had been imbedded in the mud, which probably accounts for it not having risen to the surface.

The remains were placed in charge of undertaker E. L. King.

Deceased was born in Illinois, and was 24 years old—unmarried. He moved to Canada with his parents in boyhood and came to this place about five years ago where he has worked in the mills till this summer. He has been rafting this season, much to the wonder of many of his friends, he not being able to swim. His parents, Alfred and Mary Patient, still live with several brothers and sisters. As soon as it was possible to do so, a telegram was sent to his people, and after some delay his father and brother arrived and took the remains to their home.

Deceased belonged to the I. O. O. F., which took charge of the services held over the remains at the residence of Anthony Miller at this place. Also to the I. O. F. in which he held a \$1,000 policy. Both orders escorted the remains to the train Wednesday.

MRS. EMMA ANSCHUTZ.

Sunday morning at 4 o'clock Mrs. Emma Anschutz, wife of R. G. Anschutz, died at the family residence in this place, of consumption, brought on by a severe attack of la grip last winter.

Many warm friends deplore her loss.

Funeral was held at the house at 2 p. m. Tuesday, Rev. A. C. Kay officiating, and the remains were buried in East Tawas cemetery.

Perley Colby, brother of deceased, was here in attendance at the last sad rites, also several other relatives from Saginaw.

Mrs. Anschutz was born at Perry, Shiawassee Co., in 1849. Her maiden name was Emma Colby, daughter of Rev. Thos. and Eliza Colby, the latter of which still lives, and is now living with the family here, her father having died several years ago. She came to this county when 15 years old, and March 13, 1870 she married R. G. Anschutz, who was at that time running a shingle, saw and grist mill on the Plains. Nine children—seven girls and two boys were the result of this union, only four—May, Iva, Eva and Edith, survive her. Also her husband, who is at present following the lumbering and land-looking business.

At a meeting of the school board last week the matter of the diphtheria in the village and its relation to the schools was the most important matter under consideration. According to the report of the health officer there were cases in the families of Messrs. Blust and Livingston out in the country, and Lake, Lyon, King and Walters in the village. The board, after thoroughly discussing the matter, felt that it would not be wise to close the schools as the teachers had been well directed by the physician, Dr. Darling, in regard to detecting the symptoms of the disease among the children, and should at once report to the board or to the doctor after sending the child home. By this method the teachers can better keep the children from mixing in the school room than can be done on the street. A resolution was passed guaranteeing the health officer extra pay for his services in this regard if the council should neglect or refuse to do so.

It was also decided to borrow, on the best terms obtainable, \$1,000 to pay teachers' wages, etc., till the taxes come in.

It was decided to improve the condition of the out-houses and fence at the ward school as considerable trouble has been occasioned by the state of affairs there.

Various bills were allowed and the matter of arranging the studies and grading the scholars when the two rooms are combined at the high school was discussed somewhat, and action deferred till the scholars move into the new building.

Hugh Colwell is hustling for sheriff. We did not learn on what ticket. Perhaps it is on the Prohibition, Union Labor, Farmers Alliance or Republican ticket. We know it is not on the Democratic, as the woods is full of candidates.

Some of our local papers seem to differ as to the change of the D. B. C. & A. R. R. into the hands of the Grand Trunk company. Whatever body says must be true. What this \$3,000,000 is placed to the credit of our road in the Detroit bank for is a conundrum.

James Dillon, of East Tawas, seems to be about the man for the Republicans of Iosco, for County Clerk.—Monitor. Yes James would make a hustler in the campaign, and a first-class man for the office, but he informs us that he is not a candidate, but is very thankful for his name being brought forward.

A few points of the game and fish laws will be of use to the sportsman now that the season for shooting is drawing near. The season for fishing trout and grayling closed August 31. Deer may be killed from Oct. 15 to Nov. 1, and in the U. P. between Sept. 25 and Oct. 25. Must not be taken or killed in the water or by trap or pitfall, by artificial light or by use of dogs. The partridge season is open from Oct. 1 to January 2, and the duck shooting season opens September 1.—Advocate.

Our local papers should be very careful and not mislead our people regarding the game law. As to the time for killing deer under the law of 1891 passed by the last session of the Legislature, it reads as follows: "Act No. 152, laws of 1891, Sec. 11 the people of the State of Mich. enact, no person or persons shall pursue, hunt or kill any deer in this State save only from the fifth day of November to the 25th day of November in each year, provided, that in the Upper Peninsula, deer may be killed between the 25th day of September and the 25th day of October (only) in each year."

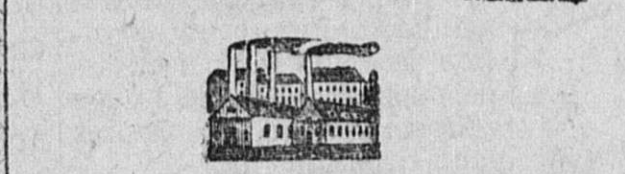
