—Democratic County Convention to nominate a county ticket to-morrow.

—Frank Baker, of Plainfield, has put to the breeze a Cleveland and Stevenson banner—the first in the township.

—Mr. Rose, of Rosetown, Ogemaw county, was nominated by the Republicans for Representative in this district at Au Sable this week.

—Hon. T. A. E. Weadock, our candidate for congress, will speak to the people of Iosco county at Au Sable, on the 7th day of Oct. He will go from there to Oscoda county.

—The people of the Tawas were very much disappointed in the speech of VanKleek Thursday evening. His issue was a slim feature of the campaign, and did not create any effect.

—At the Republican State convention, held at Grand Rapids on the 27th inst., Judge F. A. Hooker, of Charlotte, was nominated to fill the position vacated by Judge Morse on the supreme bench. H. H. Hatch, of Bay City, was a candidate, but was not "in it."

—Our draymen had a race the fore part of the week to the steam boat dock. Mike McGeary and John Brabbon were the contestants. They kept neck and neck till the last quarter, when McGeary came in under the wire a dray-length ahead and took the prize.

—In communicating with and interviewing the delegates from this end of Iosco county and our neighboring counties of this Representative district, we find that A. F. Zeitler of this place, is the only candidate who will get the support of the delegates for the nomination of Representative.

—Sam D. Clay, of Grand Rapids will address the people of the Tawas at the court house, Tawas City, Monday evening, Oct. 3d, on the Democratic issues of the day. Everybody should hear this gentleman, as he is an able orator, and you will be convinced beyond a doubt.

—The nomination of Hon. B. Wachtel, speaker of the present House of Representatives of the state of Michigan is a matter of importance, not only to the counties of his district, but to the state at large. It will give satisfaction not alone to the Democrats, not alone to the citizens of his district, but to all intelligent and fair-minded citizens throughout the state.

## REPUBLICAN CO. CONVENTION.

Harrison, Rich, VanKleek, and the Whole State Ticket Left Out in the Cold.

At 1 p. m. yesterday, a full delegation of Republicans from every township and ward in the county, met at the court house to select the strongest candidates to make a county ticket for Iosco county.

M. J. Connine called the convention to order at the appointed hour, and stated that the first move in the order of business was to elect a temporary chairman. Mr. Butts, of Whittemore, was given this plumb, and Frank Slingerland, of Alabaster, was complimented with the office of secretary.

Following delegates represented Tawas township: C. D. Bennett, L. B. Smith, J. W. King, J. M. Walker, W. B. Kelly, A. G. VanWey, L. I. Halsey, Dr. G. S. Darling and Wm. Nesbit as proxy for F. W. Whittemore.

Baldwin Tp.: J. E. Dillon, N. Robinson, B. F. Oakes, R. Hovenden, W. M. Locke proxy, W. E. Mowery, John Grant, W. G. Richards, A. Urquhart.

The chairman appointed the following committee on credentials: W. B. Kelly, E. Mason, A. H. Fish. The following gentlemen were appointed as a committee on permanent organization and order of business: R. K. Gowanlock, B. F. Oakes, Harry Laird.

The committee on Per. Org. and order of business reported that the first office to be voted for was Sheriff, but this did not meet the approval of the convention. J. W. King rose to a point of order and said it was customary to nominate Judge of Probate at the head of the ticket. Mr. K. made a few able remarks on this point, and placed the name of the present incumbent Hon. Ebenezer Laidlaw before the convention, which was seconded from Oscoda. W. M. Locke nominated Robt. Hovenden, which was seconded by E. Tawas, and E. Rix, of Oscoda nominated Granger Hill, which was seconded from the interior. John Sullivan also received strong support in the convention, but after three ballots, Laidlaw was declared the nominee.

For Sheriff there were four candidates, viz: Thos. P. Cox, James Quinn, Peter Shien, and Hugh Colwell. After 20 ballots Cox was found to be the choice of the convention. There seems to be a bitter feeling between Oscoda and Au Sable regarding this office.

A. Long of Oscoda, and E. A. Tremain of AuSable, were the only candidates for Clerk. One ballot was taken which resulted 25 for Long and 32 for Tremain. All other ballots were held informal, but the chair held this as formal and declared Mr. Tremain the nominee.

Frank W. Whittemore was nominated for Treasurer by acclamation, B. F. Oakes withdrawing. The name of R. S. Dodds was also presented and withdrawn.

M. J. Connine was nominated by acclamation, for Pros. Att'y, A. E. Sharpe withdrawing in his favor.

Robt. Hovenden was the only candidate for Cir. Ct. Com'r, and received the nomination by acclamation.

For Register of Deeds, the names of Geo. L. Cornville, P. C. Goldie and W. B. Kelly were presented. Kelly withdrew in favor of Cornville, which resulted in his nomination.

Howard Belknap was re-nominated for Surveyor.

W. B. Kelly and J. A. Cheverier were chosen as candidates for coroners.

Dr. G. S. Darling and N. Robinson acted as tellers, and were kept busy declaring the results of the ballots.

A vote of thanks was tendered to the chairman of the convention, but not a word said of the State, Congressional, Senatorial and Representative candidates.

Van Kleek, the candidate for Congress, was in attendance for two hours and he did not even get an introduction to the convention.

With a good strong Democratic ticket the efforts of the above convention avail nothing.
