—Ye editor in company with Geo. McKay, of Oscoda, attended the state convention at Lansing Tuesday last, and cast the vote of Iosco Co. for Wm. Newton of Flint, as successor to Allen B. Morse, resigned. Mr. Newton is an able jurist, and has been endorsed by the labor party.

—The first Democratic rally took place at the court house last Monday evening, and although but a short notice was given, a large and enthusiastic assemblage was present. Sam Clay, of Grand Rapids, and Arthur M. Johnson, of AuSable, made some able remarks on the issue of the day.

—Rev. S. G. Taylor, of Grayling, was in our city Thursday. We hadn't the pleasure of shaking him by the hand.

—Dr. Hauxhurst confirms the diagnosis of Drs. Darling and Goodale as to the existence of diphtheria in the Simon family, and says that the Simon's boys, being isolated from the sick, may conduct their business with perfect safety to the community at large.

Miss Lotta Dixon one of the belles of the family, aged about nine years, was called away to that distant home from whence no traveler returns, by that dread disease diphtheria, and was buried last night in the Tawas City cemetery. The broken hearted parents and family have the sincere sympathy of the entire community.

Representative Convention.

A Representative Convention for the Iosco district was held at Oscoda Wednesday Oct. 5th, '92, for the purpose of nominating a candidate for the office of Representative on the Democratic ticket.

The convention was called to order by Sylvester Vaughn, chairman, and F. W. Winter was called to the chair temporary, and Geo. Cosgrove was elected secretary.

The convention was fully represented from all over the district.

A motion was made that the following committees be appointed by the chairman:

Committee on Credentials, committee on Permanent Organizations and committee on organization and order of business, and they were appointed as follows:

Committee on Credentials.—A. F. Zeiter, J. E. McDonald and John Doyle.
Committee on Permanent organization.—Geo. Cosgrove, Jas. Larkins and J. E. Dudley.

Committee on order of business.—A. F. McDonald, Wm. Elliott and W. C. McLean.

All reports of committees was accepted and adopted. The two-thirds rule on nominating a candidate was adopted.

Iosco county had two candidates, W. C. McLean, of Oscoda, and A. F. Zeiter, of Tawas City.

The vote stood on the ballots as follows:

Zeiter, —1st, 16; 2d, 17; 3d, 17; 4th, 17; McLean—1st, 8; 2d, 11; 3d, 10; 4th, 10.

Thus it run for 24 successive ballots, when both men withdrew and Jas. E. Dudley, of Ogemaw county, editor of the West Branch Democrat, was nominated by acclamation.

R. H. Cooper, of Ogemaw Co., was elected permanent chairman of the Iosco Representative district, and Geo. W. Chappell, of Alpena Co., Sylvester Vaughn, of Iosco Co., A. C. Sly, of Roscommon Co., as a standing committee, and no further business being before the convention before the adjournment, their was three cheers for the whole Democratic ticket.

DEMOCRAT CO. CONVENTION.

One of the most Enthusiastic Ever Held in the County.

Cleveland & Stevenson, Morse, Weadock, and Johnson, Endorsed with Cheers.

At the Democratic county convention held at the court house Saturday last, every township, ward and voting precinct in the county was fully represented.

Hon. C. R. Henry, chairman of the county committee, called the convention to order at 11 a. m., and requested that a temporary chairman be appointed, but it was voted that the present chairman preside.

Mr. Henry addressed the convention and stated that this was a time when the representative people from every township in the county were called together to perform a duty, and he hoped a good, strong ticket would be the result of the delegates present.

M. Schneider was appointed temporary secretary, and on motion was made permanent.

Committees on credentials and permanent organization were then appointed and the convention adjourned till one o'clock p. m.

Convention reassembled at one o'clock p. m.

The committee on Credentials reported that the following delegates were entitled to a seat in the convention:

Baldwin—J. R. Staats, Jas. Larkins, Wm. LaFave, Peter Moussett, E. Kunze, John McGeary, R. McElheron, C. O'Brien and C. Curry, proxy for W. K. Dillon.

Alabaster—John Kinney.

Saerim—M. Schneider, Jr.

Plalunel—Frank Baker.

Grant—John Dempsey.

Keno—Geo. Charters.

Au Sable—Donald McKenzie.

Wilber—J. B. Scott and one proxy.

Burdleigh—F. Duplanty, Chas. Titus.

Oscoda—A. Boffisant, S. Vaughn, H. M. Elliott, C. Yockey, Art Smith, S. Goyoun, N. Henniger, Geo. Cosgrove, W. Wallace, A. Burbie, C. Erickson, C. Fremont, A. Rennell, Fred. Winter, G. D. McKay, Elias Hill.

Au Sable City—Frank Betz, J. C. McDonald, John Doyle, Wm. Madden, Jas. Archer. Being unable to get a report from the secretary of the convention we will have to defer giving the balance of this delegation.

Judge of Probate was the first office to be voted for. The call of townships reached Baldwin when W. K. Dillon and J. R. Staats were presented and Au Sable—C. R. Henry. Two ballots were taken which resulted in the nomination of C. R. Henry, which was made unanimous.

The next in order was Sheriff. Au Sable presented the name of Wm. Elliott; Baldwin, J. W. Lanktree; Tawas, M. Murphy; Oscoda, Robt. Smith and Jas. Barnes; and after 25 ballots, M. Murphy was unanimously nominated for the office of Sheriff. Although the balloting was worrisome, the best of feeling prevailed and all the defeated candidates shook hands.

Next was a candidate for Clerk. The nomination was given to Chas. A. Jahraus, the present incumbent, by enthusiastic acclamation.

Treasurer was next to be ballotted for. Jas. LaBerge was given the nomination by acclamation. Geo. Chamberlain's name was before the convention, but his friends declined to have him run owing to the vast amount of business which has recently come into his hands.

Register of Deeds was next in order. The names of Geo. Cosgrove of Oscoda, and C. W. Howard, of Au Sable, were placed before the convention. After several ballots C. W. Howard was unanimously

nominated.

There being only one candidate for Pros. Att'y, H. M. Elliott, of Oscoda, was nominated by acclamation.

Cornelius Dietz, the present Cir. Ct. Com'r, was renominated for that office.

W. P. Taft, of E. Tawas was nominated by acclamation for Surveyor.

Xavier B. Konkel, of Au Sable, and Wm. H. Murphy, of Tawas City, were nominated by acclamation for Coroners. This concluded the days proceedings. William Elliott rose to a point of order and stated that he had a strong following in the convention and thanked his friends for their untiring support and said he had no grievances as he was beaten fairly in the convention, and that he would stand by the ticket from President to Coroner, for which statement the convention gave him three rousing cheers.

Before the appointed hour for adjournment three cheers were given for Cleveland and Stevenson, Morse, Weadock, Johnson and the entire ticket from President down. Also the chairman of the convention, Hon. C. R. Henry; when the convention adjourned, sin die.



LOOKING FOR THE PRESIDENTIAL OASIS IN THE POLITICAL DESERT OF 1892.






