PROCLAMATION.

I, Michael Murphy, Supervisor of the Township of Tawas, County of Iosco and State of Michigan, as required by law, do hereby warn the inhabitants of said Township, of the provisions an act entitled, "An Act to Maintain Political Impunity" being sections 9377 to 9386 inclusive, of Howell's Annotated Statutes, which said act defines the offences of bribery and corrupt practice at any public election, in this State, and makes it unlawful to sell, barter or give away any liquors on the day of any such elections, and prescribes the penalties for violations thereof.
All violations of said act will subject the offender to prompt and speedy punishment. Sheriffs, Marshals, Constables and all police officers are required to close all houses or places found violating the provisions of the said act and to report forthwith all such violations to the Prosecuting Attorney of said County and to the undersigned.

The Force Bill.

We take the following from the Independent Democrat, Petoskey:
If the American people realized the enormity of the infamous outrage intended by the force bill they would hang every man who had anything to do with it.

If it had passed, it would have made it absolutely impossible to ever secure a change of administration. It would leave the American people with less power than the Russian serfs. The supervisors of election were given more power even than the judges of the United States supreme court. The judges are appointed for life, but their pay is provided for by the chosen representatives of the people. The Republican supervisors of election, on the contrary, were not only appointed for life, but their pay was secured by a perpetual appropriation. They were to be given absolute power to decide who could and who could not vote, and their certificate of election was to be final and absolute. It was made a state prison offense to refuse to accept their certificate, even though every one should know that it was a false return.

No such infamous measure was ever proposed in a free government, and the apathy of the people when their rights are thus endangered is a sad commentary upon the intelligence of our people.

There are also to be elected by the electors in each congressional district in which the State is divided, one elector of President and Vice President, and one alternate elector of President and Vice President, the ballot for which shall designate the number of the congressional district and the persons to be voted for therein, as district elector and alternate district elector of President and Vice President of the United States respectively.

Also on the general ticket, a Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Secretary of State, State Treasurer, Auditor General, Commissioner of the State Land Office, Attorney General and Superintendent of Public Instruction; also a member of the State Board of Education in place of Samuel S. Babcock, whose term of office will expire December 31, 1892; also a Representative in Congress for the 10th Congressional District of this state, to which your county belongs; also a Senator for the 28th Senatorial District; also a Representative in the State Legislature for one Representative District composed of the counties of Losco, Alcona, Roscommon and Ogemaw.

You are also hereby notified that at said election there will be submitted to the people the question of a Convention for the purpose of a revision of the Constitution of this State. That each person voting for said proposition shall have written or printed or partly written and partly printed on his ballot the words, "Convention for the purpose of a general revision of the Constitution of this State—Yes;" and each person voting against said proposition the words, "Convention for the purpose of a general revision of the constitution of this State—No."

Also an Associate Justice of the Supreme Court to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Allen B. Morse. The term of whose office will expire December 31st 1893.

Also the following county offices are to be elected viz: A Judge of Probate, Sheriff, Clerk, Treasurer, Prosecuting Attorney, Register of Deeds, Surveyor, Circuit Court Commissioner and two Coroners.
