COUNTING THE STARS.

Wonders Revealed by the Aid of the Camera.

Photographic Methods Have Largely Assisted in the Development of Astronomical Research.

Recent tidings from the Cape of Good Hope seem to confirm in a rather remarkable way the fact of the general richness of the southern skies in stars. The evidence now before us is provided in a photograph which has been taken by Dr. David Gill, the illustrious astronomer, at the cape. A highly sensitive plate was exposed to the sky, the light of the stars being concentrated by the aid of a powerful telescope specially constructed for the purpose of taking photographs in the celestial spaces. Only a small part of the sky can be represented in one picture, and about ten thousand plates would be required to produce a picture of the whole sky.

The longer the exposure the greater is the number of the stars which are described on the plate after it has been developed. Bright stars may record their impression by an exposure of a second or two, but when the faint stars are to be depicted, exposure of an hour or of several hours is demanded. At the Cape of Good Hope, as at other places, many photographs have been taken in pursuance of a general survey of the heavens, but the picture to which we are now specially referring received an exceptionally long exposure, and possesses, accordingly, an exceptionally large number of stars.

From an examination of this photograph, writes Sir Robert Ball in London Graphic, it has been possible to count the number of stars it contains, or, rather, to estimate their number, for it would have been rather a tedious piece of work actually to reckon the tens of thousands of stars which the plate showed. It was then an easy matter to calculate what the number of stars in the whole heavens would be, supposing that the plate contained what might be regarded as a fair sample of the sky. The result of this computation is indeed an astonishing one. If the sky were generally as rich as the part on the plate in question, it appears that the number of stars in the heavens cannot be less than three hundred millions.

Of course it may well be that the sky on the part represented may be more copiously jeweled with stars than many other regions. On the other hand, it cannot be supposed that the stars actually shown on the plate, numerous as they certainly were, adequately exhibited all the contents of the sky in the region examined. There must have been hundreds of thousands of stars too faint to record their images even with the prolonged exposure which the plate required. Therefore seems not at all unlikely that the stars in the heavens may amount to the gigantic total just stated.

Truly the photographic method is developing amazingly our conception of the richness of the universe. The unaided eye shows about six thousand stars, and according to the figures now given, there are about ten times as many given to the unaided eye, there must be about six thousand stars that cannot be seen by the unaided eye.

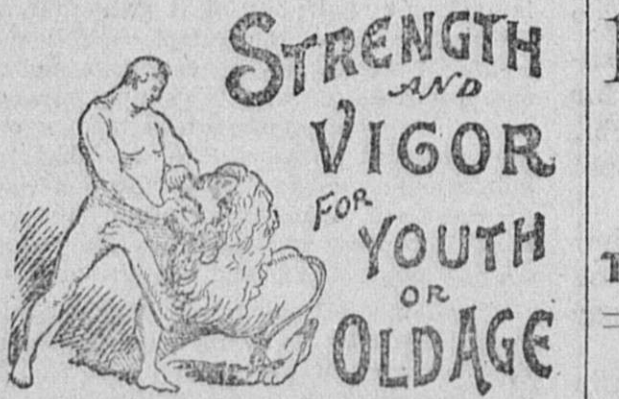

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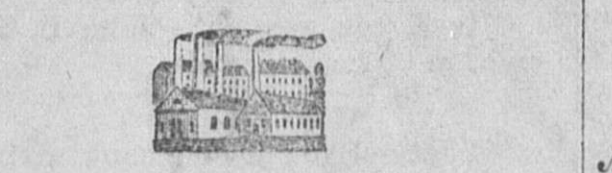
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
