MAN AGAINST SHARK.

How a Cuban Fruit Peddler Laid Out Two Man Eaters.

"The prettiest battle I ever witnessed was between a Cuban and a couple of sharks," said Thomas C. Ridgeway to a St. Louis Globe-Democrat man. "We had reached Havana from New York, and were lying perhaps half a mile from the docks awaiting the signal to go in. Several fruit peddlers had boarded us, and among them a swarthy, bare-legged young fellow who looked like a pirate. The purser was standing by the rail, holding his five-year-old son in his arms, watching a couple of monster sharks that were hanging about the vessel, when the child slipped from his grasp and fell into the water. The father plunged overboard and seized him, and the sharks at once made for the pair.

"The bare-legged young buccaneer dropped the fruit basket and was over the rail like a flash. As the first shark turned on its back, the invariable prelude to biting, the Cuban rose, and with a long, keen knife fairly disemboweled it. The other was not to be disposed of so easily. He seemed to realize that in the Cuban he had a dangerous foe, and, in the language of the ring, sparred for an opening. Several of us began to blaze away at him with our revolvers, but the Cuban appeared to fear our bad marksmanship more than the shark, and begged us to desist. The purser and his child had been pulled on deck, and the combatants had a fair field. The Cuban dived, but the shark did not wait for him to come up, and changed his location. Finally the latter advanced straight upon his antagonist, his ugly fin cutting through the water like a knife, turned quickly upon his back, and the huge jaws came together with a vicious snap, but the Cuban was not between them. He had sunk just in time to avoid the shark, and as the latter passed shot the steel into it. The old sea wolf made the water boil, and strove desperately to strike his antagonist with his tail, but the latter kept well amidships and literally cut him to pieces.

CALIFORNIA REDWOOD.

Peculiar and Picturesque Growth of the Pacific Coast.

On the camping grounds of the Bohemian club on Austin creek, and in the Armstrong tract near Guerneville, one finds the lowland redwood in perfection. In such places there are often rings of great trees inclosing pits five or six feet deep and thirty, forty, or even fifty feet in diameter. Each of these pits is supposed to show where the venerable ancestor of the surrounding circle of trees once stood, says a writer in the Century. Long before it fell innumerable sprouts grew from the yet living roots. Afterward, when the giant yielded, the rains washed new soil into the "bottoms" from the mountain sides to fill the deep chasm. For a century or so there was a struggle among the children of the fallen monarch, and at last only seven or eight remained to become great trees of twelve feet in diameter set on the rim of the pit formed by the decay of the roots of the ancient tree and each having a complete root system of its own. Other trees, seedlings or sprouts, grow up between them and in a few more centuries the process of forming another redwood-tree ring will be repeated about the largest of the second growth. Rings of this sort can be found in all stages of formation in every canyon and valley of the redwood country. Some very large rings still show the broken edges of the central tree's roots projecting like the staves of a barrel around the hollow, overgrown with ferns and wild oxalis, or filled to the brim with fresh, spicy redwood sprouts. The green spires of the living forest, three hundred feet high, filter the air through their innumerable branches and shut out all but faint blue sparkles of the sky. The dust of one of the pioneers is underfoot and a little tree of last year's growth is struggling to gain a place. The red bronze trunks of the trees stand like a wall, hiding the rise of the mountains, hiding the banks of the river, though one hears the sound of its flow and the splash of little trout streams in the canyons. Such groves as this are the temples of the California forest system.

Prohibition is Dead.

Two surprising results of the election in Kansas are beginning to attract universal attention. One is the carrying of the proposition to hold a constitutional convention and the other is the cessation of the enforcement of the prohibitory law. The convention will be taken advantage of by the anti-prohibitionists of all parties to attempt the elimination from the constitution of the prohibition amendment and the hottest kind of a fight on that question is anticipated. Lorenzo Lewellen, the new third-party governor-elect, announced that the enforcement of the laws must hereafter be left with the local officers, and that the state will not use the power in its hands to enforce the law in localities. In other words he says such localities as desire to enforce prohibition can do so under the general law, and that those who do not desire its enforcement will not be made to enforce it by the state. That, in effect, means local option, and already the liquor industry throughout the state has taken a boom. Saloons have opened in many towns, and Kansas to-day is practically a wet state.—Ex.
