Board met pursuant to adjournment, at 9 o'clock a. m.

Chairman called the meeting to order and ordered the roll called.

Present—Sups. Betz, Johnson, Galbraith, Slingerland, Sloat, Duplanty, Dillon, Latham, Yockey, Ferrister, Balcom, Murphy, Rodman and Jackson. Quorum present.

Moved and supported that the Board proceed to ballot for one school examiner for the term of two years. Carried.

The minutes of Oct. 11th and 12th were read and approved.

The Board then proceeded to ballot for school examiner which resulted as follows: Total number of votes cast, 13; of which J. K. Osgerby received 9, F. C. Thompson received 3, and A. Murphy received 1. J. K. Osgerby, receiving a majority of all the votes cast was duly declared elected to the office of County School examiner for the term of two years.

On motion the communication from the Superintendents of the Poor asking that the Board appropriate the sum of \$2,579.92 the same being the deficiency as shown from last year and the sum of \$6,000 in addition be raised for the care of the poor for the ensuing year was received and referred to committee on finance.

On motion the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That Robert K. Gowanlock, County Treasurer of Isosco County, be and is hereby authorized and instructed to make a loan of two thousand dollars (\$2,000) for incidental purposes to be placed in the hands of said treasurer for the use of the county aforesaid by issuing four county warrants for the sum of five hundred dollars each duly signed by the chairman and clerk of this Board, said warrants to be drawn in favor of said County Treasurer and to be negotiated by him at as low a rate of interest as possible but at no greater rate than six percent per annum, said loan to be repaid within six months from the date that such warrants are drawn.

On motion the Board took a recess until one o'clock p. m.

Board was called to order by the Chair who ordered roll call.

FINANCE COMMITTEE REPORT.

To the Hon. Board of Supervisors of Isosco County:

Gentlemen:—We, the undersigned, the Finance Committee of your Honorable Board, beg to report that we have carefully audited the accounts of Robert K. Gowanlock, County Treasurer, for the year ending Oct. 12th 1892, that as part of such auditing we compared the vouchers having stubs with the stubs, and also all other vouchers for payments with the County Treasurer "statement book" that after examination all stubs and vouchers were cancelled by us.

That all items of receipts were carefully examined into by us and compared with statement book.

The following is the statement of receipts and disbursements by the County Treasurer.

For the financial year ending 12th inst your Board will perceive that during that period the County Treasurer's receipts were \$52,968.05; his disbursements \$48,394.06; excess of receipts

\$4,573.99.

This excess consists almost entirely of Taxes collected and to be paid over to the several townships and the City of Au Sable as soon as the amounts deducted from State and county taxes for school taxes has been replaced.

The balance in Treasurers hands on Oct. 10 1892 as reported to your Board was \$7,753.97.

The treasurer had made payments to the State treasurer of \$496.17 for which credit was not given him in the absence of the vouchers for same; these vouchers were subsequently produced and credit given him, this making the actual balance \$7,257.80 as per statement book.

Balance in Treasurers hands on Oct. 12th 1892 \$11,830.86. Your Committee report that \$213.45 has been collected on account of the balance due from Robert Merricks sureties leaving \$184.08 still unpaid with accruing interest.

The present indebtedness of the County as follows viz:

10 bonds, issue of July 1, 1886,
\$500 each.....\$ 5,000
20 bonds issue of Sept. 1, 1887,
\$500 each.....10,000
Jail bonds due Dec. 30, 1896..... 5,000
County Warrant.....2,000

Total.....\$22,000

We find that five of the above bonds of the issue of July 1st, 1886 fall due March 1st, 1893 and should be provided for in financial estimate now to be made.

The County Treasurer desires that your Board make provision for meeting the expenses of the County until receipt from 1893 taxes come to hand your committee recommended that a sum not exceeding \$2,000 be borrowed for that purpose on County warrant.

Your committee with pleasure call the attention of the Board to the statement book obtained by the County Treasurer as directed by the Board for the account between himself and the County.

Your committees work was greatly facilitated hereby and the County records made more complete.

Your committee would suggest that the order books used by the several justices of the peace be returned to the Board on the first day of the October session in each year that the stubs may be compared with the vouchers and cancelled.

All of which is respectfully submitted. James E. Dillon, M. Murphy, B. F. Slingerland, R. M. Pelton per C. Will Howard, Committee.


