## A SMASH UP.

**Thirteen Cars Loaded with Logs Ditched.**

The Alpena express was over an hour late in reaching here Tuesday morning. The delay was caused by an accident to a log train which delayed the passenger at Henry station the previous night so that she did not reach Alpena until 9:30 Tuesday morning. At 6 o'clock Monday night a long timber train came out of the Mud Lake branch for Black River. When near Henry station an inside rail on the curve turned over, throwing the engine from the track and piling up thirteen cars loaded with logs, and tearing up about three hundred feet of track. This of course blocked the road and it was one o'clock next morning before the wreckage was removed from the track and the engine, which was but slightly off, was put back and started for Black River for a supply of rails to make the necessary repairs. At 6 o'clock Tuesday morning the damage had been repaired and the passenger train started for Alpena. It was a most fortunate circumstance that the passenger had not passed over the place in advance of the log train, as the accident was just as likely to have occurred to it, probably sacrificing previous lives as well as crippling and injuring many of the passengers.

**He Passed Away Peacefully this morning**

**JAMES G. BLAINE** died this morning at his residence in Washington.

The end, which had been looked for for weeks past, came peacefully, and the great Statesman sank into his last rest as quietly as though falling into a refreshing sleep. His death ends the career of one of the Nation's most prominent and distinguished citizens.

**Judge Lamar.**

Death has recently removed some of the most prominent figures in our national life. Justice Lamar, of the federal supreme bench, is now numbered among those who have answered the final summons. Few men have appeared so conspicuously in the affairs of the country and been so little understood by the masses of the people. There are many who, without reason, regarded him as wanting in the legal learning and profound judgment so generally associated with the exalted position which he occupied. He came of a scholarly family and inherited natural endowments of a high order. Physically he was of a rugged type and had ample backing for the active brain which was earnestly exercised in the acquisition of a liberal education. He was not content with the routine of knowledge acquired in the schools, but was a close observer and a discriminating reader, who finally entered college professorship with the highest equipment for such a position. He was thoroughly grounded in the science of law, and subsequently won high distinction in its practice, receiving at length the crowning honor attainable in his profession.

During his terms of service in Congress Mr. Lamar was recognized as a clear thinker, and able disputant and a man of unquestioned integrity. A portion of his service was during a period when partisan feeling was aggravated by memories of the war, but he was always the dignified statesman, never displaying sectional animosity and always enjoying the highest respect of his fellow members. On the bench his decisions have been marked for their clearness and fidelity to the determining principles of law involved. From the fact that he was an officer in the confederate army and because of the section which he represented, a prejudice against Judge Lamar has never been entirely overcome. Time will insure a just estimate of his character and the future historian will recall him as among those leaving their impress upon the eventful age in which he lived.—Free Press.

CONGRESS will pass worse bills before it adjourns than that introduced by Representative De Armond, of Missouri, proposing that the Civil Service law, so far as it relates to appointments and dismissals, be suspended for the first year of every administration.

THE World's Fair will have to struggle along without Spain's baby Queen or England's gambling Crown Prince, but the presence of numerous coal kings and plumber princes will make ample amends for the absence of foreign royalty, and will be much more profitable to Chicago, than

Mr. Cleveland's answer to the question "will the McKinley tariff law be repealed?" is plain enough to be read even by those who run. He said: "I'd like to know what else we are in power for?"

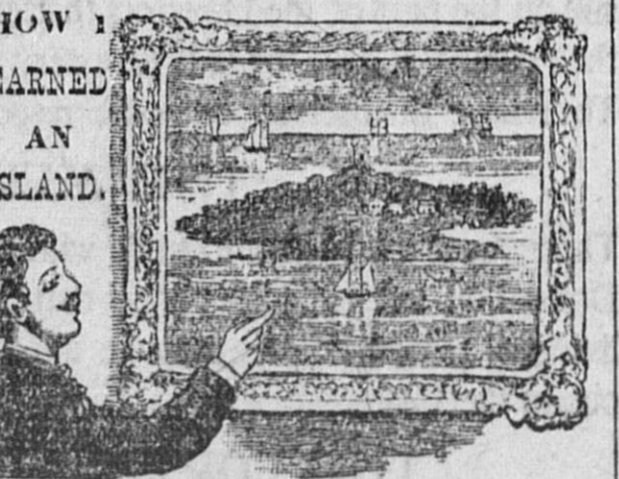
