During the ten days pleasure junket of the members of the legislature the state paid a thousand dollars a day for legislative salaries, beside the expenses of the committee galavanting around the state. Who says the republican party isn't a party of reform.

Judge Simpson will, before presiding at another term of court in this county, after that which convenes here on Tuesday next, have undergone the fatigue of the spring campaign; will have braved the political hurricane and have sailed safely into port on the crest of a tidal wave of personal popularity, created by his unwavering fidelity to duty and his sterling integrity as a man and a public official. It is seldom that a man elevated by the people to the position of a circuit judge finds himself at the close of his term of office occupying so warm a place in the hearts of his constituents, without regard to party affiliation, as does Judge Simpson today. Not only in his own county is he respected and admired, but in every county in his circuit and by all classes with whom he has come in contact during his official career. This has not been brought about on his part by any sophistry or by pandering to any class, rings or corporations for the sake of currying favor. It is the natural feeling that arises in the breast of the American people for a man who unflinchingly does his duty as he understands it, with fairness and impartiality, showing favor to none, great or small. Judge Simpson has earned the place he holds in the hearts of the people, and they will be glad of the opportunity to cast their ballots for him, thus testifying their appreciation of his faithful service. The only opposition he will have, except that dictated by rank partisanship,—we are of course supposing that he will be in the race, which he is sure to be unless he emphatically says no, as the democratic convention will nominate him by acclamation,—will come from corporations, non-resident land owners and speculators, whom he refused to favor when their interests clashed with that of the settlers and taxpayers of the several counties. This opposition on account of its purely selfish character will not amount to a great deal and the people of Tawas will again have the pleasure of greeting Judge Simpson at the court house here four times a year—when our rights are restored and court is held regularly where it should be, at the county seat—during the next six years. To use a slang expression, he is decidedly "in it."

shrank from making his opposition

of itself by declaring war upon puny
Chili. It was not his politics but
his staunch Americanism that gave
to Blaine his fame, a fame of which
the American people, without regard
to political opinions, are proud.

On motion the election of school ex-
aminer was to be made a special order of
business to-morrow afternoon at one
o'clock.

The building committee recommend-
ed that the sheriff be allowed to make
necessary repairs on the jail, and award-
ed the contract to furnish 100 cords of
wood to S. Brabou. Their report was
adopted.

The report of the special Highway
Commissioner committee was read and
on motion received and placed on file.

The following resolution was adopted:
Resolved, That the bond of the County
Treasurer be placed at the sum of twenty-
five thousand dollars.

Minutes of January 10th read and ap-

The following communication from
County Commissioner of schools, J. K.
Osgorby, was read and on motion received
and filed and ordered spread at length on
the minutes.

To the Honorable Board of Supervisors
of Iosco County:

GENTLEMEN: Not in compliance with
a duty that is required of me by law, but
with a desire to use every available op-
portunity to serve the Public Schools of
this County, I herewith submit for the
consideration of your honorable body the
following report of my labors and places
for future work, asking your aid in an
effort to improve their conditions. In
the performance of my duty and the en-
deavor to become familiar with the con-
dition and needs of these schools, I have
visited eleven of them and talked with
eighteen school officers and twenty-one
school teachers in regard to their respec-
tive charges. Nearly all the schools vis-
ited are well supplied with apparatus
for higher grades of work but deficient
in simpler, less expensive, but far more
necessary apparatus for the primary
work. Unabridged dictionaries are
found in only a few of these schools.
Academic dictionaries, the best and at
the same time the cheapest, are entirely
wanting. A majority of the eleven
schools above referred to are supplied
with flags, and it is gratifying to know
that there is a determination among the
teachers and officers to provide every
school with the American flag.

While much may be said in praise of
the work done in these schools, a system
for classifying and grading the pupils in
their work is a pressing necessity in the
great majority of these schools, though
the teacher may be enthusiastic and ear-
nest, the constant turning of a class back
to the beginning of the book whenever a
new teacher enters the school has a de-
pressing effect upon that class. Stagna-
tion from the lack of a progressive course
of study or from any other cause destroy
the ambition and dwarfs the activities
of pupils and poisons the very atmos-
phere about the school room.



Many of you have stood on the beach at the seaside and watched the seas rolling in heavy breakers after a storm, curling and crashing into volumes of foam and broken water with such force as to send them sweeping up almost to your feet. It is through such waves that men who follow the sea must at times pass in reaching the shore, but not through one or two on a smooth, quick-shelving beach, but through thirty or forty, perhaps, covering a mile of treacherous shoals, and at places surging between jagged reefs and huge boulders. With intense interest we read of the dreadful shipwrecks almost every week. The survivors tell how the big ship labored and struggled through monster billows and shrieking wind, under black flying clouds and amid jagged streaks of lightning until, mastless and helpless, she lay exhausted in the trough of the sea and passively received the crashing deluge of merciless waves until she sank. They tell how they, poor, puny human beings, clung to helm and pumps till the great ship's struggles were over and it became evident that she could carry them no longer; then how they hastily threw a cask of water and a few provisions into some remaining boat and at a favorable moment launched upon the angry waters in a craft so frail that it seemed as if all on board were doomed to instant destruction.

Here comes what St. Nicholas calls the strangest part of their narrative. Read all such accounts carefully and you will find that in nearly every case where such a little boat is safely launched from an abandoned ship it floats and drifts for days and even weeks upon the open ocean, living through the dreadful tempest which wrecked the big ship, sailing buoyantly through calmer seas and finally bringing the survivors within sight of other ships or lands.

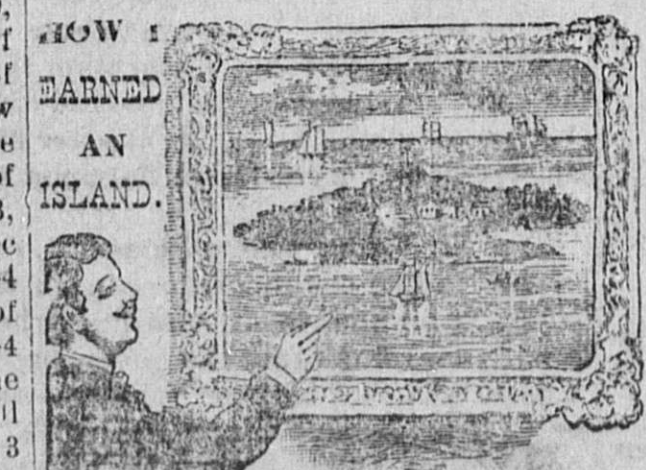
