Democratic State Convention.

The Democrats of Michigan met in state convention at the Auditorium in Detroit Tuesday, and nominated Judge George H. Durand, of Flint, as candidate for Associate Justice of the Supreme Court, and Henry A. Harmon, of Detroit, and Robert E. Bonker, of Muskegon, for Regents of the University.

In many respects the convention was remarkable. Incidental to the transaction of the specific business for which the gathering was called there was apparent so much harmony and so many expressions of confidence in the principles of the party and its future that the most skeptical observer could not but be impressed. It was remarkable for the strong nominating and other speeches which were characterized by absolute loyalty to Mr. Cleveland and his Cabinet.

There was no clashing of interests, personal preferences being speedily removed when it was shown that they were not in accordance with the general desire, and the successful candidates were given an ovation which will long be remembered by every one present, while aspirants were retired with grace by their ardent admirers. The character of the speeches cannot be too highly commended, embodying earnest, straightforward utterances that were cheering in their promises of the best social fulfillment of party principles.

The general confidence in the result of the coming election was significant and indicated that no doubt was entertained that the candidates nominated would be sustained by the voice of the people.

Congressman Weadock Wants the Government to Print Return Envelopes.

Congressman Weadock made an earnest effort in the house to carry the amendment to the post office appropriation bill, providing that the Post Master General may have return envelopes printed. In his remarks before the committee Mr Weadock said:

"When the last appropriation bill was under consideration an attempt was made to stop the printing of these requests upon stamped envelopes. That was made in the interest alone of the printers of the country and without regard to the interests of the people. The furnishing of envelopes with these printed requests upon them imposes no additional expense upon the government and it costs the people nothing. The provision of law adopted at that time has not yet taken effect; so that the point of order that the present provision changes existing law is not well founded. Under the Constitution the manufacturers of these envelopes and the postal service itself is intirely within the control of the government; and the paper manufacturers may as well object to the government furnishing paper for the envelopes, as these people object to the government printing these requests for return on the envelopes. The objection is simply in the interest of a class of people who want to do this printing on the envelopes, and thus discriminate against the public, who have the right to buy the envelopes without additional cost to themselves and I insist that neither the saw mills, nor the grist mills, nor the printers, nor any other class should come here and ask us to legislate to help their business, and thereby discriminate against all of the other people by doing so."

Mr. Weadock also submitted the following letter to himself from the Third Assistant Postmaster-General, in support of his position:

"I have the honor to inform you that the printing of return requests on stamped envelopes costs the government nothing—that is to say, the contract prices for envelopes bearing these requests are no greater than for the unprinted envelopes. The reason of this is that the cost to the contractors of setting up the type for the work is but insignificant, while the imprint, produced usually by what is termed the press work, is effected on the machines that make the envelopes, and simultaneously with the embossing of the stamps. In the sale of the envelopes no difference is made between envelopes plain and printed, the prices are the same."

Good intentions counted for little in a Congress in which the Senate was republican and the house democratic. The situation will be different in the 53d Congress, which will be democratic in both branches.

The question as to the complexion of the next Senate is now definitely settled, and by North Dakota. That state has elected W. N. ROACH, U. S. Senator. Mr. Roach is a democrat, so, the next Senate will be democratic beyond a doubt.

SENATOR Harris, of Tennessee, struck a responsive chord in the average democratic breast when he said on the floor of the Senate that he would be glad to have the act which created the Civil Service commission struck from the Statute books.

WHATEVER may be done to preserve the autonomous rights of the states in presidential elections, it is perfectly plain that the present system of electoral college is an antiquated and defective piece of political machinery, which the bulk of the people are anxious to see dispensed with.—St Paul Dispatch.

SOMEBODY has been kicking because there is no law providing for the official notification of the men elected President and Vice-President. It does seem like an omission, but as no man has ever been elected without finding it out and duly presenting himself at Washington in time to be inaugurated, it can scarcely be called an important omission.

ATTORNEY-GENERAL ELLIS has been the recipient of numerous letters asking for information regarding the printing of tickets for the coming spring elections. It will be necessary for two tickets to be printed and two separate ballot boxes provided. One ticket he says, should contain the names of the several candidates for the offices of justice of the supreme court, regents of the university, circuit judge, and county commissioners of schools, and should be prepared by the county board of election commissioners. The other should be the regular township or city ticket, prepared by the election commissioners of the township or city.

To Change the Judicial Circuits.

Representative Holmes, of Bay Co., has introduced the following bill to reorganize the 11th, 18th, 21st, 23rd, 26th, 28th and 33rd Judicial circuits. As it would make several of the districts democratic there is not much danger of it becoming a law, though the change in some of the districts named would be a good one:

Section 1. The people of the state of Michigan enact, that from and after the passage of this act, the counties of Alger, Chippewa, Luce, Mackinaw and Schoolcraft shall constitute the eleventh judicial circuit; the county of Bay shall constitute the eighteenth judicial circuit; the counties of Claire, Gladwin, Isabella and Midland shall constitute the twenty-first judicial circuit; the counties of Arenac, Crawford, Iosco, Ogemaw and Rosecommon shall constitute the twenty-third judicial circuit; the counties of Alcona, Alpena, Montmorency and Oscoda shall constitute the twenty-sixth judicial circuit; the counties of Benzie, Kalkaska, Missaukee and Wexford shall constitute the twenty-eighth judicial circuit; and the counties of Cheboygan, Emmet, Otsego, Manistowick and Presque Isle shall constitute the thirty-third judicial circuit.

Sec. 2. The present judges of each of the several circuits as constituted by the first section of this act, shall hold the term of court in each of said counties, at the time heretofore fixed therefor, until a re-assignment of terms of court for said counties, as provided by law.

Sec. 3. The several circuit judges of the circuits hereby reorganized, shall have power in the counties which are hereby detached from their former circuits, to settle bills of exceptions, decide and determine cases which may have been submitted to them, and do all judicial acts in any cause now submitted to them, the same as if this act had not passed.
