WHAT a relief it will be to Michigan taxpayers when the present legislature adjourns.

DISSATISFACTION with President Cleveland is plentiful in republican papers, but it does not exist elsewhere.

THE forty thousand souvenir quarters which congress has authorized minted for the board of lady managers of the World's Fair, will be ready for distribution about May 1st.

THE new U. S. Crusier, Detroit was given her trial trip over a measured course on Long Island Sound Monday, and proved herself to be the fastest boat of her class in the world. Her average speed was 18½ knots per hour.

THERE is really no objection to the present legislature attending the theater when it is so inclined. The pastime is not in the nature of a junket that can be charged up to the state, and when the erratic majority is thus engaged there is a comforting assurance that no fool laws are being passed.—Free Press.

THE new state commissioner of labor is a rich farmer of Gratiot county whose acquaintance with public affairs was gained by a term in the state senate some years ago and by the means which are within the reach of every intelligent citizen. That he has made a study of labor questions does not appear from his connection with labor movements, since he has had none. If he were a man of more than ordinary gifts he would be more widely known, and the "labor" men are asking, "Who is Morse?" —Bay City Times-Press.

TEMPERANCE people will watch with interest the result of the new law which goes into effect in South Carolina the first of July. After that date no liquor will be sold in that state except by the state. Liquors are bought by whole sale by the state, and when the majority of the people petition for it the state opens a saloon and appoints a man to run it. The liquors are sold at cost, and not sold at all to minors or habitual drinkers. Drug stores can sell no liquor except alcohol, and this must be bought of the state. This system has been in operation in Norway for forty years, and it is claimed that it is the only practical way to solve the liquor question. If it works satisfactorily in South Carolina it will undoubtedly be adopted in all or nearly all the other states.—Ex.

NO WONDER the "reform" legislature now holding down the boards at Lansing is the butt and laughing stock of decent men and woman everywhere. For law makers it is the biggest burlesque ever perpetrated upon the public—the "Squaw-buck" body of two years ago could not hold a candle to the doings of the present republican legislature. Saying nothing of the recent disgraceful proceedings in open session, just fancy a body of men, supposed

to be chosen for their business and intellectual qualifications, offering a resolution inquiring whether a member is married or single, in order that his social statutes might be placed and referring the same to a committee, while the sergeant-at-arms is sent out to a minstrel show to bring back a Senator whose presence is said to be necessary in a vote on some common place measure. While later on the body neglects public business by adjourning because amusements in another part of the city were a greater attraction! One of the latest acts was the spreading on record of an almost libelous article that appeared in a local paper and after the editor apologized for the wrong, refused to have the speech of Senator Morrow, who had been assailed, and the retraction become a part of the Legislature proceedings! The best thing the Michigan Legislature could do would be to adjourn and get home on its dead head railroad passes at once. The public would be better off.—Howell Democrat.

Good Roads Win.

Returns from 79 out of 84 counties show that the good roads amendments has been carried at the recent election by a majority of 20,266. The counties not yet heard from are Lapeer, Manitou, Oceana, Roscommon and St. Clair. These will not materially change the result. This amendment provides that the improvement of the highways shall be placed in charge of a county board of commissioners, instead of the townships as at present. It takes effect only in such counties as desire it. Strange as it may seem the greatest opposition to this amendment came from the agricultural regions which will be the most benefited.

Of the other amendments, that providing for an increase in the salaries of certain state officers was probably defeated, while those providing for the relief of the supreme court and permitting Grand Rapids to improve the Grand river, seem to have been carried by a small majority.

THE MIND'S KINGDOM.

Some of the Beneficent Effects of Careful, Studious Reading.

Literary culture opens up a new world to the fortunate possessor of a trained and well-stored mind. He is never in solitude, for imagination peeps for him a world of his own, free from the distractions and disappointments of material life. He may at will withdraw himself into his own kingdom, where he reigns supreme. The immediate pleasure which one derives from reading, from witnessing stage performances that appeal to the intellect, and from social intercourse with cultivated people, scarcely equals that which abides with one always in recollection. It has been said that the highest pleasure is in anticipation, but a more lasting one, scarcely inferior, may be in recollection. Poets and novelists of the higher class have pictured characters as clearly to the imagination as those one meets in life; they have introduced to us pleasant people to whom we can turn as to old friends, conjure them up before us and make them again and again amuse or instruct us at times when there is no other recourse for the ever busy mind. When one considers the relief that may be afforded from the hardships and disappointments of real life by an intelligent use of the best literature, culture of this kind may be recommended on sanitary grounds. Literature may not "minister to a mind diseased," but it may prevent disease from getting a foothold, by furnishing healthful exercise at times when brooding over other and possibly more material matters might be injurious. "My mind to me a kingdom is!" He who can say that is in a measure independent of the petty annoyances that beset those whose thoughts and faculties are ever with the present material world. He has ears, but he hears not; eyes, but he sees not. He lives in another world, peopled as he pleases, and with such scenes passing before him as bring him enjoyment. Whether he is in the crowded world or in solitude, amid the bustle of business or confined to his lonely couch by illness, he carries with him his little kingdom of the mind and lives a dual existence. It is scarcely possible to convey to one who has not known of such enjoyments an adequate idea of the value of reading and general literary culture in this respect, but that it is something real and greatly to be preferred to riches of any other kind will be attested by all who have had the pleasant experience of recalling for their own delectation the friends they have found in fiction. The measure of such enjoyment that one may find is limited not only by the extent and variety of one's reading and other literary associations, but by the training given to the imagination. Mere hurried reading of works of fiction for the sake of the story gives no foundation for such culture of the mind as shall make it a kingdom. Even a novel, if it is worthy to be read at all, should be read attentively and thoughtfully. If congenial friends can be found to read it in company and to discuss it, the impression it may make will be more lasting. That is the great value of such organizations as Shakespeare and Browning societies, though they sometimes indulge in too much idle speculation. Their general plan is useful, however, in inciting to careful, studious reading, and to thought upon the matter that has been read. The habit having once been established, a little kingdom of the mind has been set up which may be extended in time in or out of the society. The essential or desirable thing to do is to cultivate the imaginative faculties, so as to make of the characters one reads about living pictures always present with us, always ready to entertain or amuse us. Thus fortified, one may in a measure defy the ills of life, and live the greater part of it in cloudland, with pleasant companions and no less pleasant surroundings. It is true that the duties of life must be met and fulfilled, the hard struggle for existence must be carried on; but it is lightened, and one returns to it refreshed when these excursions into the kingdom of the mind may be undertaken at will, without expense and without waste of time or effort.—Baltimore Sun.

Neighboring News.

The Alpena Spool Co. will make a handsome exhibit at the world's fair. The headquarters of the Northwestern Accident Association has been removed from Alpena to Detroit.

Thos. O'Connor's, setter on one of the carriages in Lond's band mill, at AuSable had his right wrist broken last week.

Fred Washington, a sick man bound from Pinconning to Saginaw, died on the train Saturday before reaching Bay City.

Ed Treman and George LaVerre, lumber inspectors, of AuSable, have formed a co-partnership, and will open an office Cheboygan.

J. V. O'Brien, W. H. Simpson and G. G. Griffith have bought the Tanner mill at Oscoda and will hereafter operate it under the name of the Oscoda Lumber Company.

The West Branch Democrat has ceased to be democratic in politics, and in now found in the independent column.

Messrs. Elliott & McLean shook the Oscoda sawdust from their feet Monday morning and departed for Indiana. They will return to be present at the next term of court. Mrs. Elliott and Mrs. McLean will remain here until summer.—Press.

The Michigan Central railroad company has just received for use in the Bay City yards, an engine which is known as the "Schenectady Hog." It has six driving wheels and starts off with 100 flat cars with less effort than a common engine pull along half that number.

Willie Woo, a Chinaman, is a candidate for the postoffice at West Harrisville. If he gets it, which he is liable to, it will be the first instance on record where a Chinaman has been made postmaster in the United States. Woo operates a grocery store at that place and is quite popular.

Are Your Eyes Alike?

According to a German doctor, who has just published the results of a long course of experiments on this subject, the site is rarely alike in both eyes. He finds that only in one case out of fifteen are both eyes in good condition. In seven cases out of ten one eye is stronger than the other. In two cases out of five patients are affected with astigmatism, which may be defined as an imperfect focusing of the light rays entering the eyes. This usually arises from a difference in the curvature of the cornea or transparent portion of the front of the eye. Nearly fifty per cent possess only an imperfect appreciation of colors.

Michigan Logging Camp.

Workmen have begun the construction of the Michigan logging camp south of Michigan Hall, on the World's Fair ground. Alongside it on a flat car are forty-five logs, which will form part of the exhibit. There is nothing unusual about the logs, but the men who are cutting down the forests of Michigan have some notions of their own about what constitutes a novelty. In this case the interesting feature about the logs is the fact that they were hauled a third of a mile by a single team of horses. The horses are big ones and so are the logs. The combined weight of the later is 145,000 pounds and Michigan log rollers at the park will tell you that no other span of horses ever hauled such a great load. That is the reason the timber is to be exhibited. The camp will be twenty feet wide and seventy feet long, and logs are being rolled up into their places on skids. Pork, bacon, coffee and cornmeal, etc., will be served in the cabin. Then there will be a display of lumbermen's tools.

May Not Run.

There have been rumors about during the week that the steamer Stewart and Metropolis, formerly of the Bay City-Alpena line, would not be put on this season and that there would be no line to Bay City and the Saginaws. Capt. Hitchcock, manager of the line at this end, informs us that he has not been notified by the owners of the steamers that they would not go on the line, and as yet he has reason to expect them. The latter part of last week he was notified that the Metropolis was about ready for business, and inferred that she would soon be on the line. The Stewart will not run her this season as she has been chartered by Chicago parties. Should there be no line between

here and Bay City, the Bay City wholesale merchants would be the sufferers as they do considerable business, not alone in Alpena, but in all the shore towns, and a raise of freights would send many of their customers to Detroit.
