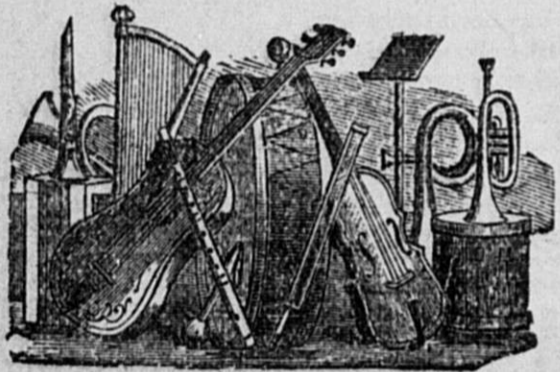

The launching of the steamer, S. S. Curry, occurred at Wheeler & Co.'s yard in West Bay City last Saturday. The Curry is the largest boat on fresh water. The principal dimensions of the ship are: Length over all, 377 feet 6 inches; length between perpendiculars, 360 feet; beam, extreme, 45 feet 2 inches; beam, moulded, 25 feet; depth of hold, 12 feet; height between decks, 8 feet 3 inches; height of forecastle deck, 7 feet 6 inches.

The fact that capitalists and speculators are buying up the valuable timber lands of Northern Michigan ought to be a hint to those who desire to make homes here of the destrability of such investments. Such poripatetic dealers cannot be looked to for any enterprise of benefit to the town, nor for any help in carrying the necessary burdens that fall upon all. They are much more liable than home dealers to carry shoddy, and to use deception in sale and the buyers are usually without remedy when deceived. It is a short-sighted policy that does not always give home dealers a reasonable preference in making purchases.

Postmaster-General Bissell has issued a notice to all postmasters that there is now in operation in the government building on the grounds of the world's fair a branch of the Chicago postoffice, known as the World's Fair station. This station will make regular collections and deliveries through its own force of letter carriers from an too all points of the exposition grounds and will transact money order and registry business, as well as all other business pertaining to a first-class post-office. Post-masters are instructed to use every proper means to give publicly to this information, in order that persons intending to visit the fair may, if they desire, have their mail addressed to the World's Fair station.

THERE is a bill before the legislature at Lansing, to compel barber shops to close Sundays.

In order to reward a couple more republican politicians with good positions, the republican majority at Lansing is about to pass a bill to give Wayne county two more circuit judges.

THAT new asylum in the Upper Peninsula is to hold just 100 inmates. There are exactly 100 members of the House of Representatives that passed the bill, and it is supposed it is a scheme to house them without contaminating the other lunatics in the three asylums already built.

The official returns have been received at the Secretary of State's office from every county in the state and indicate that all the constitutional amendments have been carried. The amendment relative to the salaries of state officers received about 1,500 while the other amendments receive from 9,000 to 17,000 majority.

A BILL which has passed the house at Lansing in committee of the whole makes things interesting for mutual and co-operative life insurance companies. Such organizations are compelled to accumulate a reserve fund, equal at least to the maximum single risk which it carries.

It is easy enough to see why the bankers and capitalists of Wall street want the government to take their gold and give them U. S. bonds. There is a big speculation in it for them. But why should Uncle Sam buy their gold? He can't eat gold or wear it.

MEMORIAL DAY, May 30th, will soon be here. This is the one day of the year which every loyal American citizen should observe. The day on which all should meet to commemorate the deeds of the men who stood by our government in the darkest hours, and who are now fast passing to their final reward.

Elect the Postmasters. A contemporary that very often is right, the New York World, is making a fight that should enlist the services of all honest papers. It demands that in the future postmasters be elected instead of appointed. We believe that this would be a solution for the difficulty that confronts the President to-day.

Capt. Holt's Boats.
A Bay City dispatch to the Evening News says: Capt. Holt explains that that the big log rafts used in bringing logs from Georgian Bay are what have driven his boats off the shore line. Navigators and vessel owners of all classes have complained bitterly of the reckless manner in which the river channel has been blocked with rafts. Vessels have frequently been detained for 12 or 14 hours on account of them, and with loads of passengers and perishable freight on board, the loss, both of money and patronage, would be excessive. Capt. Holt says the route is usually good for \$10,000 to \$12,000 a year profit, but on account of these rafts last year he lost \$2,800. He gets \$12,000 net for the use of the Metropolis for the season, and will have the Dove rebuilt and ready to send to Chicago about June 10, for which he will receive \$7,000.

It is with pleasure that we give the following communication, which fully explains itself, space having known Mr. Connine personally for the past five years we do not hesitate to brand the whole story as an infamous falsehood. We do not believe there is a single person who is acquainted with Mr. Connine, that believes the charge yet there may be those among our readers who, not being acquainted with him, might give it credence. As for the woman—Alice Grace Chrenshaw—her reputation is well known in this vicinity and need no comments from us.

EDITOR OF THE HERALD:—On the 28th of April the Evening News published an article purporting to come from Bay City stating that one Mrs. Klien claimed that Main J. Connine, of Oscoda, was her lawful husband; and that she threatened to sue him for non-support. That she showed letters, which if genuine, indicated that Mr. Connine was married to her in 1883; that they lived together for four years at Marquette and Detroit; that he then deserted her, and that she had for some time, at Connine's suggestion, assumed the name of Klien.

After reading the communication in the News, I at once counselled with Mr. Connine, as his attorney, in reference thereto, and as such attorney wrote to the News, demanding, in behalf of Mr. Connine, a full, fair and complete retraction of the article and the publication of such retraction in as conspicuous a manner as such original publication. The article as published in the News was an infamous falsehood, without the element of truth in it, and being false, it was in no sense justifiable, and was therefore libelous. The publication on the part of the News was wholly inexcusable for reason that it was within the power of the Evening News to ascertain the truth or falsity of the facts alleged before the publication. As the News has a large circulation throughout the state and is doubtless read by many subscribers to your paper, it is desirable to remedy, as far as possible, the gross wrong done Mr. Connine, and in his behalf, I wish you would do him the justice and favor of publishing editorially such facts concerning Mr. Connine and this charge as shall under the circumstances commend themselves to your judgment.

Mr. Connine's life contains no mysteries and has been as public as an open book, furnishing no excuse for such infamous charges. In 1877 he graduated from the Indiana Normal School at Valparaiso, and thereafter, in October, was married to the wife with whom he has ever since lived and with whom he is still living. In 1878 he attended the law department of the University of Michigan where I first became acquainted with him and have known him personally ever since. After leaving the University he practiced law in Allegan, Mich. From Allegan he went to Grayling in 1882 where he practiced law until September 1888 when he removed to Oscoda, where he has resided and practiced law ever since.

Wherever Mr. Connine has been he has numbered among his friends the best citizens of the town, and reference is cheerfully made to the professional and business men of Crawford and Iosco counties and the officials with whom he has been well and favorably known.

From investigations made since the publication of the charge in the News, it has been established beyond a doubt that this woman Klien referred to by the News, is none other than the notorious Alice Grace Chrenshaw, who has at different times in her life figured in anything but commendable sensations, and has passed under the name of Mrs. Sabine, Alice Wilson, and Alice Grace Chrenshaw.

Mr. Connine unhesitatingly and emphatically denies ever having had any relations with this person, except of a business character, and only when acting in the capacity of an attorney, and is abundantly able to establish the fact that she was treated by him as any other client and that he received his pay for his services from her as from other clients. He characterizes her without qualification as a black-mailer. I shall acquaint Mr. Connine with the contents of this communication, and will send a similar letter to the newspapers throughout the counties where he is known, in hopes of curtailing, to some extent, the gross injustice that this woman, aided by the sensational proclivities of the Evening News, wittingly or unwittingly heaped upon him.
