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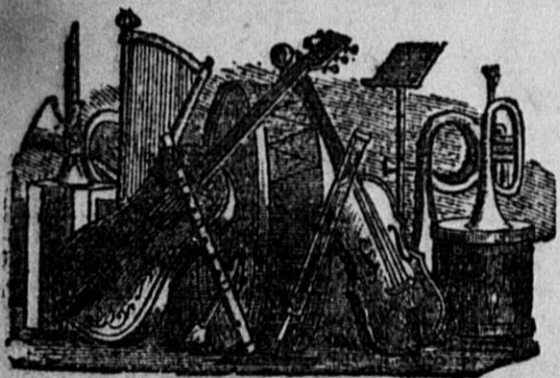

Bill of Wm. Phelan for \$2.62 for work on streets, was presented and allowed, and clerk instructed to draw order for same. All voted yes.

J. C. McKinnon, of Oscoda, left Wednesday for Frankfort, Mich., where he will engage in the business of raising chickens, having become convinced from recent experiments here that therein lies a large profit.—Monitor.

Chas. Mundy and Maggie Bacon created a sensation by eloping Thursday night. Mundy is a married man and the girl is but fifteen years old. Prosecuting attorney Connine has issued a warrant for them and if they are caught some sensational developments are expected.—Oscoda Press.

The Oscoda Council has appointed a committee to confer with the Au Sable Council in regard to closing the saloons of both places on Sunday, and otherwise enforcing the liquor laws. Oscoda wants to close her saloons on Sunday, but is not willing to take action in the matter until they have some assurance that Au Sable desires to do likewise. They saw the experience they had last summer is sufficient for them. They don't purpose to have Oscoda men fill up on Au Sable Sunday whiskey and then come back there and raise a row.—Monitor.

THE Detroit Free Press in a strong editorial claims that the efforts of politicians who were willing to bring financial disaster on the country, if by so doing they could discredit the administration, will fail by reason of Secretary Carlisle's ability to grasp the situation and the known sound financial policy of President Cleveland.

SENATOR JOHN P. JONES, of Nevada, tendered his resignation as a member of the monetary conference, and it was declined by President Cleveland. Noting this fact the Cleveland Plain Dealer says: "Senator Jones is the strongest advocate of bi-metallism in America, and his services should be retained if possible on the commission. Say what we may, the conflict is now on as to whether we shall have the money of the constitution; the money designed by the fathers of this country—viz., gold and silver, or gold only. The first means prosperity and fair and rising values, and the last means business on declining prices and an absolute decline in values of 20 per cent. Destroy one-half the volume of money, and you decrease in value one-half all other property except money."

THE republican attempt to make party capital out of the refusal of the election inspectors to receive the votes of the inmates of the Soldiers' Home at Grand Rapids has come to grief. The prosecution has been thrown out of court by a republican judge; and the action of the inspectors is declared to be lawful and right. Judge Grove is entitled to credit for the course he has taken in this matter and for his fidelity to conviction rather than to his party. He might easily have stood by his party and evaded all responsibility in the matter by permitting the inspectors to be convicted and letting the case go, as it would have done, to the supreme court. He could easily have excused such a course on the plea that only in that way could the question at issue be authoritatively settled, as the people, in case of an acquittal, could not go to the supreme court. Apparently, however, he preferred the approval of his own conscience to that of his party associates, which shows that he is a "rara avis" among republicans.—Free Press.

District Postoffices.

A reporter of the Bay City Times-Press saw Congressman Weadock last Friday afternoon just before his departure for Europe, and asked him how congressional matters were and how long he anticipated remaining abroad. He said:

"So far as my duties are concerned with reference to fourth-class

post-offices in the district, they are nearly all disposed of. Of the pre-idential offices the terms will not expire for some time; for instance, Alpena expires December 19, 1893; AuSable, Jan. 8, '94; Cheboygan, East Tawas and Grayling, Dec. 20, '93; Petoskey, June 27, '94; Portsmouth, July 1, '94; West Bay City, June 2, '94, and Bay City, Jan. 8, '94. It is the intention of President Cleveland to allow republicans to hold until their terms expire, unless the duties of the office have been neglected or the office has been used for partisan purposes."

"There is no session of congress probably before October 1 and my public duties offering some respite I shall follow the directions of my physician and take a little rest by a trip to Europe. I shall sail for Genoa on the steamer Kaiser Wilhelm II of the Nord Deutscher Lloyd line on May 13 from New York. I shall leave at 5 o'clock and cannot possibly receive any letters about either pensions or post-office for the next three months.

Crop Report.

State crop report issued by the secretary of state, dated May 1, says the outlook for wheat on that day was not as promising as one month earlier. It is now estimated that five per cent of the acreage sowed will be plowed up because winter killed or otherwise destroyed. The average condition in the southern counties is 73 per cent, in the central 79 per cent and in the northern 83 per cent of vitality and growth of average years. Compared with April 1, the decline in the southern counties is eight per cent, in the central 12 per cent and in the northern 10 per cent. This decline, however, is due to the fact that the injury could be better estimated May 1 than on April 1, rather than to actual damage to the crop during April. The weather during April was cool and wet, and neither wheat nor grass made the growth usual during this month.

The average condition of wheat May 1 1892, was, in the southern counties 84, and in the central 81, and the crop in the state that year was 24,141,000 bushels. The average condition May 1, 1892, was, in the southern counties, 104, and in the central 99, and the yield in the state that year was 28,039,000 bushels. The average yield per acre in '92 was 15 bushels, and in '91 18 1/2 bushels.

In their general remarks correspondents in the southern counties almost without exception report wheat in bad condition. The fields are spotted, large areas being killed out by ice, wind and water. Insects, also have done much damage.

The total number of bushels of wheat reported marketed in the nine months, August-April, is 12,341,618, which is 1,030,834 bushels less than reported marketed in the same months last year.

The average condition of clover meadows and pastures is 89 in the state and in each section of the state. This is fully 10 per cent better than one year ago. The condition in '91 was 100 in the southern counties and 99 in the central.

Nothing has yet occurred to injure fruit buds, and the outlook is favorable for nearly a full average crop.

Progress in the Use of Aluminum.

Aluminum is gaining a place among industrial metals. Lately there has appeared in the show-windows of fancy good stores a variety of articles made from aluminum. In appearance these goods are a little, if any, inferior to silver articles, and they are less liable to tarnish from the action of the sul-

phur gases. The metal is well adapted for numerous things in common use, such as pocket match-safes, cigar-cases, pencil cases, and even watch-cases. It will be more and more used for these and other purposes as time advances. One of the disabilities that has prevented its more rapid introduction into various industries has been the lack of suitable solders for joining it after it has been reduced to required forms. According to an article in the Engineering Magazine, however, several receipts for solders for aluminum working have lately been brought out, which promises to be of great value to the various trades in which aluminum finds a use.—Ex.

AND SHE ONLY SIXTEEN.

An Oscoda Man Arrested for Eloping With a Girl.

SAGINAW, May 8.—The police arrested an eloping couple from Oscoda to-day, and developments show that it is peculiarly an aggravated case. The couple arrived here Friday night and registered at the Dunbar House as man and wife, giving the names of Mr. and Mrs. George Oraz. The girl's father, Irvin Bacon, arrived here this morning from Durand, looking for the couple, but being unsuccessful left a picture of the man and went on to Bay City. Through the picture the man was located and arrested. He confessed everything, said he was married, but his wife had left him. His true name was Charles Mundy and he had at one time resided in Saginaw. He gave his age as thirty-two years and the girl's as about sixteen years. He said he had started for Little Falls, Minn., and the girl was bound to come with him. The girl was very ill and prostrated when her father was summoned from Bay City. The father said he left Oscoda the day after the guilty couple and since that time has had almost no sleep and only two warm meals. He came at once to Bay City and not finding them there he went to Lapeer, thence to Flint, Durand and back to Bay City. He said this morning that the man was an uncle by marriage to the girl. He said Mundy was a married man and never had separated from his wife, who had dinner ready for him on the day he ran away with the girl. Mundy was locked up at the police station awaiting a complaint being made by the father of the girl, who will be taken to her home in Oscoda as soon as her health permits.

SUICIDE.

As Ed. and Louie Roe, of Thompson station, were passing Graham's old camp near that place, last Thursday evening, they discovered the body of a man hanging to a tree. Upon investigation it proved to be that of Chris. Shepper, who has been living there for a short time.

Justice Wm. Lilliburg impaneled a jury and an inquest was held. A verdict of suicide was rendered.

Domestic troubles are supposed to be the cause of the rash act. He leaves a wife and six children in Bay City. A few days previous to his death he wrote a letter to his wife reminding her that the 5th inst. would be the 25th anniversary of their wedding day, and that she would receive a present from him. It proved to be his remains.

Justice Lilliburg is entitled to much credit for his exertions in having the remains properly cared for. He accompanied them to East Tawas, from which point they were sent to Bay City.

Death of H. Sampson.

Henry Sampson, of Prescott, who had his arm fearfully lacerated one week ago last Tuesday, by the bursting of an emery wheel, while he was engaged in gumming a saw, died Monday. Blood poisoning set in and it was decided that it would be necessary to amputate the arm in order to save his life. Dr. Howell, of East Tawas, went down Monday to perform the operation, but Mr. Sampson was so weak that he died during the operation. He was well known hereabouts and leaves many friends, who extend their sympathies to the bereaved family.
