It would seem that such a large number of experiments under such widely varying conditions as are furnished by the thirteen states in question, would practically settle the question of the best amount of seed potato to plant. In reality the whole question is not what gives the greatest yield, but what amount gives the greatest Highest Price Paid profit. When seed is high in the spring it will generally be advisable not to plant whole potatoes at orlinary distances, but when they are cheap it will generally pay. Since it has been proven that the vield is more in proportion to the weight of seed planted than the number of eyes, the cutting out of the eyes for seed, common in some parts of the State, is to be strongly condemned.

So also, the use of small potatoes for seed, not only lessens the profits the first year, but if followed for a series of years tends towards rapid deterioration, in accordance with the laws of heredity.

The larger amounts of seeds gave a more vigorous growth of vines, and on the "whole tuber" plats the crop matured five to ten days earlier than on the "single eye" rlats.
