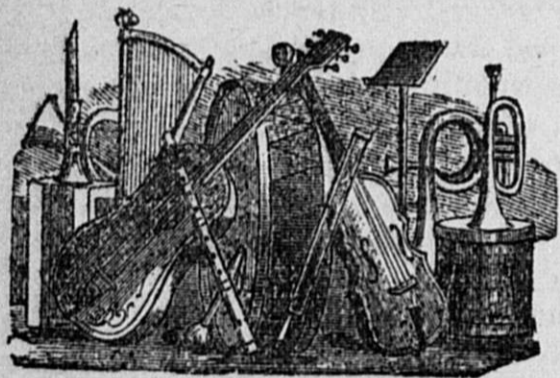

THE Chinese must go.

Gov. RICH has signed the bill making Labor day a legal holiday.

WHAT a relief it will be to the tax payers when the present legislature adjourns, which they have promised to do on the 29th inst.

THERE are five thousand different car couplers in the U. S. patent office, yet men continue to be killed daily while coupling cars.

THERE seems to be some doubt as to the exact nature of the gathering of republican mourners of Louisville. Some call it a wake, others a funeral.

PRESIDENT CLEVELAND does not stampede worth a cent, either on appointments, issuing bonds, or calling a summer extra session of Congress.

THE World's Fair is unquestionably the biggest thing this country has ever seen, but that furnishes no excuse for the stand-and-deliver prices which are already raising a howl of complaint.

TWELVE thousand dollars has been saved in the administration of the affairs of the United States pension department during the first two months of democratic rule, just by cutting off little extravagances.

LATE events have confirmed the wisdom of President Cleveland and Secretary Carlisle in divorcing the U. S. Treasury from Wall street. The alliance was a very unwise one, as has been shown often in the past.

THE president of the Mexico republic has suppressed the publication of nearly one hundred newspapers, and it is announced that the process will be continued until every paper antagonistic to Diaz is silenced. A republic that throttles a free press and free speech is a republic in name only, and Diaz will learn this in sorrow if he lives long enough.—Saginaw Courier-Herald.

WE have had two years of the McKinley bill that was to create such an abounding prosperity in this country; but are our republican friends entirely satisfied with the results? If unparalleled tightness of the money market, failing credit, idle industries, a big adverse balance of trade, and a general panicky feeling are the signs of the McKinley bill prosperity, then the sooner we can get some of the free trade variety of prosperity the better the people will like it.—Lansing Journal

THAT report made by the State Senate special committee on state prison is a literary exotic. It exhales the rare fragrance of tropical hyperbole and is banked up on all sides with the most brilliantly tinted flowers of rhetoric. It is such a production as to turn the most grifted sophomore green with envy, and as Bulwer-Lytton in his most fervid flights of fancy never approached. In the magnificence of its utterances the plain facts at which it aims are completely buried. One marvels at

its gaudy decorations and forgets for the time that it embodies a report of Jackson's prison affairs. The author of the gorgeous report is throwing away his time in performing the plain, practical duties of a statesman. There is a place yawning and yearning for him in the literary world. Even as the writer of a soap advertisement he would be a star of the greatest magnitude.—Free Press.

Chinese Exclusion.

The constitutionality of the Geary exclusion act has been affirmed by the highest judicial authority in the land, and the formidable task of enforcing it will doubtless be commenced unless a rehearing should result in a different finding, which is not probable. The question of expediency has been most largely considered in connection with this matter as discussed by the people, its legal phases being left to the courts, and its moral features being passed with comparatively little attention. In defense of his law, Mr. Geary presented some very strong arguments to show the undesirability of Chinese immigrants. He opposes them from political, social and economical standpoints. They come here with their families, have no sympathy with our institutions, acknowledge no laws except those of their own country, return home upon making enough money to maintain them there, carry millions of money from the country and take employment from those who would otherwise add to the permanent wealth of the communities in which the live and of the country at large. He also paints in the darkest colors their immoralities and immeasurable damage which they do in the cities where they have a strong hold, as in San Francisco. They are the scum of the Chinese population, as a rule, and must be a detriment to any civilized community.

These appeals in the interest of labor, progress and good morals, have given the new law its chief endorsement, and now that it is held in consonance with the fundamental law of the land, the exportation of the unwelcome residents will begin. Comparatively few of them have complied with the the legal requirements which would entitle them to remain in this country, and now face a situation in which they can find little hope. Trouble is anticipated in some localities where the Chinese are collected in numbers, for their advisers have told them that they could remain, and they are liable to accept this as of higher authority than the law which provides for deporting them. They cannot of course, prevent the enforcement of the law, but they can cause a great deal of trouble, and with the feeling existing against them, especially in the far west, it will be fortunate if bloodshed is avoided. The adoption of a retaliatory policy by the Chinese government is almost a certainty. It has been held there that its people in this country were entitled to protection under the treaty existing with the United States. But this supposed dependence has failed through the decision given yesterday by the Supreme Court and China will not be in a mood to accept the situation without acts indicative of disapproval. It has been claimed that the American residents of the empire would be excluded, and the adoption of such a policy is not improbable. In any event, the hatred of certain classes against American citizens in general, and missionaries in particular, will be greatly aggravated. More revolting outrages than ever may be expected, and when the Chinamen banish from American reach home their merciless persecution of American residents may be

expected. This is the first nation to which China opened her ports for commercial intercourse, and now a cause of contention is established which may even lead to war between the two countries.—Free Press.

Potatoes--Amounts of Seed.

H. G. Reynolds, Secretary of the State Agricultural College has just issued bulletin No. 93, of the Michigan Experiment Station, is on "Potatoes: Amounts of Seed."

The conclusion arrived at is that the potato growers of Michigan do not plant enough seed. Our own experiments, corroborated by those of other stations, go to show that for ordinary distances the half potato gives better results than any smaller amounts. For weak growing varieties, or varieties having small tubers, even a larger amount of seed will be found more profitable.

A careful investigation shows clearly: First, That an increase in seed within ordinary limits produces a marked increase—both in total yield and in marketable yield. Second, That an increase in seed, from one eye up to the half potato, produces an increase in the net value of the crop; but the increased yield from the whole potato over the half potato is not sufficient to cover the cost of the greater amount of seed.

The above conclusions are the result of hundreds of experiments, extending over many years. They practically agree with the results of twelve other stations as compiled in the bulletin. It would seem that such a large number of experiments under such widely varying conditions as are furnished by the thirteen states in question, would practically settle the question of the best amount of seed potato to plant.

In reality the whole question is not what gives the greatest yield, but what amount gives the greatest profit. When seed is high in the spring it will generally be advisable not to plant whole potatoes at ordinary distances, but when they are cheap it will generally pay.

Since it has been proven that the yield is more in proportion to the weight of seed planted than the number of eyes, the cutting out of the eyes for seed, common in some parts of the State, is to be strongly condemned.

So also, the use of small potatoes for seed, not only lessens the profits the first year, but if followed for a series of years tends towards rapid deterioration, in accordance with the laws of heredity.

The larger amounts of seeds gave a more vigorous growth of vines, and on the "whole tuber" plats the crop matured five to ten days earlier than on the "single eye" plats.

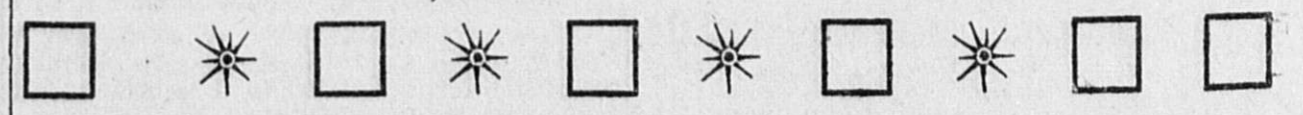
