An observer has taken 1,000 notes of the conversations of passing young women. The 12th international convention of the Young Peoples Society Christian Endeavor, will be held at Montreal, July 5th to 9th. This promises to be the most interesting and profitable convention ever held. The convention will be held in Drill hall, which seats 9,000, and an immense tent will be pitched on the opposite side of the street which will seat 8,000. The special train of the Michigan Endeavor Union will leave Detroit on the morning of July 4, at 8 o'clock via the G. T. R. R. The rates will be one fare from the starting point to Detroit, and return and \$15 from Detroit to Montreal and return. The evening of July 3 the Detroit Union will entertain the Michigan and Ohio delegations at a mass meeting, which will be addressed by some of the speakers of the Montreal convention.

One of the best arguments of good roads is contained in a calculation recently published in one of the engineering papers. It states that on the worst earth roads, not muddy, but sandy, a horse can draw only twice as much as he can carry on his back; on a fair, earth road, three and a half times as much; on a good macadamized road, nine times as much; on a smooth plank road, twenty-five times as much; on a stone track way, thirty-three times as much; and on metal rails, fifty-four times as much. The men who use the country roads can therefore make money by improving the roads, rather than by buying new horses every year or two.

The law concerning stray animals is not as well known as it should be. If you take up a stray animal you must within ten days, give notice to your township clerk, who must make an entry of the same; then you advertise the animal in your local paper and sixty days after such advertisement has appeared, you apply to a justice of the peace to sell the animal. He issues a warrant to the constable, who gives ten days notice by posters, you get your expenses. The penalty for taking up a stray animal and not giving notice is \$5; and besides the owner can come upon your place and take it away without paying you anything.

MORE rot has been written and printed about pensions, than about any one subject ever before the public. No democrat wishes to deprive a single deserving veteran of his pension; but every democrat wants the payment of money to the undeserving stopped.

IS the general synod of the Lutheran Church a political body? One might be excused for asking the question after reading the speech of Dr. Kulins, introducing Gov. McKinley to the synod. A church is a poor place from which to start a Presidential boom.

CHAS. FORSTER, the man who showed his unfitness for managing national finances while he was Secretary of the Treasury under Harrison, has shown his inability in his own private business by going into bankruptcy with indebtedness aggregating a million dollars. And he blames President Cleveland for his failure, saying that it was due to "lack of confidence" caused by the refusal to issue more bonds for those scoundrels in Wall street. It looks as though it was time for people to lose confidence when a person who poses as a great financier runs in debt a million of dollars, and has not half enough property to pay his debts. Has President Harrison permitted Mr. Foster to issue bonds last fall when the secretary insisted upon doing so, it is quite probable that Foster's share of the swag would have been sufficient to enable him to tide over his affairs.—Bay City Times-Press.

The Tin Plate Tariff.

The announcement that a scheme is on foot to keep up the tariff on tin plate though a practical fraud will surprise nobody. The history of our tariff legislation in this country is full of just such devices; and worse ones. When a tariff is adopted an attempt is made to persuade the country that it is for the general public good; but it is no sooner adopted than those who have been instrumental in securing it begin scheming to twist it to their own purpose—if it needs any twisting as is not always the case. The effort to secure such a decision as will hold all tin plate dipped in this country as a part of the domestic product in deciding whether the tariff is to be continued is, therefore, quite in keeping with the customary course of tariff beneficiaries.

In order to understand just what the scheme is, it is necessary to refer to the tariff act passed in 1890. By schedule "C" of that act it was provided that after the 1st day of July, 1891, tin plates, terne plates and taggers' tin, should pay a duty of two and two-tenths cents per pound, and all manufactures of such tin plates, terne plates and taggers' tin should pay a duty of 55 per cent ad valorem. It was provided in the act, however, that on and after October 1, 1897, tin plates and terne plates lighter in weight than sixty-three pounds per hundred square feet shall be admitted free of duty, unless it shall be made to appear to the satisfaction of the President (who shall thereupon by proclamation make known the fact) that the aggregate quantity of such plates lighter than sixty-three pounds per hundred square feet produced in the United States during either of the six years next proceeding June 30, '97 has equaled one-third the amount of such plates imported and entered for consumption during any fiscal year after the passage of the act and prior to October 1, 1897.

The plan as now disclosed is to have all tin plate dipped in this country—the plates being imported—counted in, making up the one-third of the importation necessary to prevent the abandonment of the duty. This does not seem to be at all the intent of the act, and it is scarcely to be believed that Secretary Carlisle will so find it. The purpose and intent of the act were to encourage the manufacture of tin plate in this country, not the dipping of imported plates, and the letter of the act seems to be in full harmony with this purpose and intent. The final proviso of the paragraph to which we have referred reads as follows:

And provided, further, that the amount or weight of sheet iron or sheet steel, manufactured in the United States and applied or wrought into the manufacture of articles or wares, tined or tinned, in the United States with weight allowance as sold to manufacturers or others, shall be considered as tin and terne plates produced in the United States within the meaning of this act.

There is nothing here about dipping imported plates, and it does not seem possible that the Secretary of the Treasury will strain the language of the act to aid an interpretation of it for the benefit of the monopolists. It is, however, of comparatively slight importance what the ruling of the Secretary shall be in the matter. Before any ruling he can make will have any practical bearing—that is to say, before the 30th of June, 1897—there will be a session of a Congress chosen expressly to do away with the iniquities of the McKinley act. The action of that Congress in the premises will not be likely to leave anything for a Secretary of the Treasury to do in construing the provisions referred to.—Detroit Free Press.

IS THE SUN PEOPLED?

A New Theory of the Universe Founded on the Law of "Actien."

A recent number of the Arena contains an interesting article by Stephen M. Allen, A. M., upon the newly discovered law of "Actien," which, if the theories concerning it are correct, will deal a severe blow to the preconceived ideas concerning the formation of worlds.

The writer explains that actien is supposed to be surplus energy or fluid thrown off from central suns toward their planets, having a direct and positive agency in the original creation of the universe. The new law supposes that our sun, through its axial revolution, is constantly throwing off actienic force, which is primarily neither heated nor luminous, but which passes through etheric space into the atmosphere of the earth, where, through combustion, light, heat, electricity and magnetism, are produced. In corroboration of the theory, it is asserted that, if the sun were the incandescent mass it has been held to be, the heat radiated from it would, in passing through the 18,000,000 degrees of cold which are known to exist in the space separating our sun from the earth, cease long before it reached our atmosphere. That darkness also reigns in the regions of the sun is likewise incontestible. At seven miles, the highest point reached by man, the sky is found to be dark and somber, and the rays of the sun are so dim that it resembles a copper-colored moon.

The theory makes provision for the light and heat of our solar orb. This is supplied to it in the form of actienic force from the parent sun. Lastly, the conclusions reached are that the sun is not an intensely heated body, that it possesses an atmosphere and that it is provided with a moderate amount of light and heat. For these reasons there is no longer any reason, says the writer, for believing it uninhabitable. The actienic process of world formation is thus described: "The surplus force thrown off from the sun at once aggressively enters etheric space with a positiveness that overcomes all resistance. A conflict ensues between action, the positive, and ether, the negative principle, resulting in the birth and construction of atomic and molecular substances, both ponderable and imponderable, which fly off into space, but which are used in the construction of a globe."

These substances are finally aggregated and held by attraction. They are formed into a nucleus, which, still under the influence of original actienic and etheric decompositions, in time forms a globe. From this point, the theory coincides with the principles generally received concerning cosmic forces and influences, and the work of formation is supposed to be continued according to the principles already known.
