Gounty Roads.

The following is the provisions of the law relative to the county road system, which will be voted on in this county December 4.

Section I. Provides that the board of supervisors may by a two-thirds vote of all members of said board elected, submit the question of adopting the county system to all the electors in the manner prescribed by the act.

Sec. 2. Provides that at least three weeks shall intervene between the action of the board of supervisors and the date of holding the election.

Sec. 3. Requires the clerk to cause the notice to be printed in the form or a hand-bill, to be posted and published in newspapers, and provide for the printing and distributing of ballots as general election, the question to be stated in said ballots: Shall the county road system be adopted by the county of-

Sec, 4. Provides that if on a canvas of votes a majority be in favor of the sys tem then the county road system shall be considered as adopted in said county, and thereupon the provisions of this act and all other acts relative to such system shall be and become operative in said county.

Sec. 5. Provides that all elections under the act which may be held on the first Monday of April shall be considered general election.

Sec.6. Provides that when the county road system shall have been adopted there shall be a board of county commissioners elected by the people in such county, and such board shall not exceed five in number, and the board of supervisors shall determine how many shall constitute the board.

Sec. 7. Provides for the terms of office of the said commissioners, according as the number may be more our less, so that there will be one each year to go out of

Sec. 8. Provides for filling vacancies in the office of commissioner by appointment of the board of supervisors until

This section also authorizes the board of supervisors to fix the compensation of those commissioners.

Sec. 9. Says that a majority of the board of commissioners shall constitute a quorum; authorizes this board to adopt rules and regulations for its own meetings, and for the transaction of its business, and the clerk of the county is to be cierk of said board of county road commissioners, and shall keep their records preserve their files.

Sec. 10. Prohibits the clerk and every member of the board from being interested directly, or indirectly, in any contract to be let by the board or any property to be purchased or sold by the board, and requires accurate accounts to be kept of all disbursements and authorizes the commissioners to em_loy superintendents and engineers, and to purchase the proper tools and material for their work.

Sec. 11. Authorizes the board of county road commissioners to lay out new roads within the county, and to change the width or the location or straighten the line of roads over which they may take jurisdiction, and authorizes private property to be taken for road purposes if necessary.

Sections, 12, 13, 14, 15 and 16, provide for the condemnation of such private property and the method of proceeding. Sec. 17. Authorizes the boards of county road commissioners of adjoining counties to unite in laying out a county

line road if thought best, Sec. 18. Provides that any road heretofore lay out or any part therof shall become a county road if the board of county road commissioners shall at any time so determine, and in passing through or on the line between town-

or eincoporated villages, any orabits of streets of such village ted as a county road, with fof the proper authorities of e or villages. It riquires a ch commissioners to be taken nays to be entered at large ntes, and a notice of such to be given to the higher of each township in ad may be situated, and gives the commissioners ction over the road; and y of the board of comthe road a name by wh in their proceed-

Sec. 20. Authorizes the board of county road commissioners on or before the first day of October in each year to determine the amount of taxes to be raised for county road purposes. Such tax shall not exceed \$2 on each \$1,000 of such valuation without authority of the board of supervisors previously given to assess a greater sum; requires the money to be collected and kept as a seperate fund, and applied exclusively for the purpose of improving the roads.

Sec, 21. Prohibits the county road commissioners from contracting any indebtedness: and makes the county liable for any indebtedness that may accrue for its neglect to keep the roads in proper repair, the same as townships, cities and villages are made liable in the re-

Sec. 22. Authorizes the board of supervisors by a two-thirds votes, to submit the question to the people as to whether bonds shall be issued for the construction and maintenance of roads.

Sec. 23, All roads and bridges in townships will remain under the care and control of the township, except such as the board of county road commissioners shall have declared to be county roads.


Sec, 24. Provides that in all cases where the county road system is not adopted, the township system, as heretofore in vogue, shall continue in force.
