### The Wilhelm held liable for her consorts.

Chicago, Nov. 8.—The United States  
Court of Appeals, sitting at Cincinnati,  
has just decided the Wilhelm case. The  
decision of the circuit court is reversed,  
and the steamer Wilhelm is held liable  
for the loss of the Mears and Moonlight.  
Late in 1889 the Wilhelm was caught out  
in a gale in Lake Huron and her tow  
broke up. The Mears and Moonlight  
went ashore near East Tawas and be-  
came total losses. E. J. Vance and Wil-  
liam Keith of Saginaw, owners of the  
two boats, claim that the steamer was at  
fault in abandoning the barges, and li-  
beled her for \$27,000. C. E. Eastman, of  
Saginaw, owner of the Wilhelm, who is  
in the city received a dispatch today  
from his attorneys announcing the re-  
sult.

The above will be read with much in-  
terest by the readers of the HERALD, as  
all the facts are fresh in our minds, and

ing Mr. Vance, and it now looks as  
though the same fate awaits Mr. East-

## EDUCATIONAL RALLY.

Iosco, Alpena, Alcona and Presque Isle counties to Participate.

A mass meeting of school officers, teachers and citizens of the counties of Presque Isle, Alpena, Alcona Iosco has been arranged to meet in the village of Harrisville, Nov. 17 and 18. Hon. H. R. Pattengill, state superintendent of public instruction, will occupy the chair.

This is expected to be the largest gathering of citizens for an educational purpose ever held in Northern Michigan. It is to be a grand rally of school forces. Everybody will be interested. Bright subjects of general interest will be ably discussed by speakers from and abroad.

The Rally. This feature of the meeting will take place in the Presbyterian church, beginning at 7.30 o'clock p. m., Nov. 17. An entertaining and instructive program is being prepared.

Beginning at 9 o'clock a. m. on the 18th, there will be a meeting of the teachers in the above counties. Papers on the leading topics of the day will be read and discussed.

Ample accommodations will be furnished for all visitors by the citizens of Harrisville. The city will be thrown open to your entertainment and we extend to you a cordial welcome. Carriages will meet all incoming trains at West Harrisville. The D. B. C. & A. will give special rates to parties of ten to attend the rally and council. The commissioners have left nothing undone to make this a grand educational rally.



Your committee on equalization, to whom was referred the question of equalizing the Assessment rolls of the several Townships and wards hereby report that we have had the same under consideration and report thereon as follows: That we have examined the assessment rolls of the several Townships and wards in Iosco County for the year 1893 and caused the total valuations of the several rolls to be footed and added; that we have examined the same to ascertain whether the relative valuation of real property in the respective townships and wards have been equally and uniformly estimated, and upon such examination we have deemed such real property valuations to be relatively unequal and we have equalized same by adding to or deducting from the valuation of the total taxable property in the several townships and wards such an amount as in our judgment will produce relatively an equal and uniform valuation of the real property and real property interests, (in the form of Mortgages, Contracts, &c.) in the County and the total value of real estate and real estate interests as assessed in each township and ward, and the total value of all personal property as assessed in each township and ward, and the amount added to, or deducted from the total valuation in each township, in order to produce relatively an equal and uniform valuation of the taxable real property and real property values in this county, and the aggregate valuation of real and personal property as equalized and determined by us, we each and all entered into and set forth in the following and annexed table, which is hereby made a part of this report.

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The clerk read his report apportioning the taxes for the city of AuSable, on motion the same was referred to Prosecuting Attorney for his opinion thereon.

Finance Committee report. To the Honorable Board of Supervisors of Iosco County.

Gentlemen, We the undersigned, the finance committee of your honorable Board, beg to report that we have carefully audited the accounts of W. Frank Whittemore, county treasurer and his predecessor Robert K. Gowanlock for the year ending October 10th 1893, and that as part of said auditing we compared the vouchers, having stubs, with and also all other vouchers for payment, with the county treasurer's statement book, that after such examination all stubs and vouchers were cancelled by us, that all items of receipts were carefully examined into by us and compared with statements of, and the county clerk's account with said treasurer.
