Who killed Ben Harrison's prematurely launched boom?

HON. J. H. GEAR was this week elected U. S. Senator from Iowa, by the republicans of that state.

GREED of employers to grow rich has had more to do with reducing wages in this country than the fear of tariff legislation.

If an extra supply of gas can make a good chairman, Joe Manley, of Maine, will be a great improvement on Carter.

QUEER about ex-minister Stevens. He is well enough to deliver lectures but entirely to ill to appear before the Senate committee who are investigating Hawaiian matters.

By the death of Col. Geo. P. Sanford, of the State Democrat, of Lansing, one of Michigan's brightest newspaper men has passed away, while the democratic party loses a strong and able supporter.

THERE are a few congressmen on the democratic side of the house who will have an opportunity to attend to their private business after their present term expires, while some one who is a democrat fills their present place.

THE porter who kissed Congressman Boutelle doubtless sympathized with him for the dubbings he had been given by Speaker Crisp. Besides, the porter was the proud possessor of a kissing jag that was all embracing in its desires.

A REMARKABLE feature of the tariff debate in congress has been entirely overlooked by the republican press. The most prominent democrats who had been advertised as opposed to the Wilson bill, have made strong speeches in its favor.

A LARGE number of manufacturers are making a pile of money out of their employees by cutting their wages, and at the same time are passing as philanthropists, because they do not shut down their mills entirely. What kind hearted mortals they are.

THE supervisors adopted a resolution Wednesday to again submit the question of the adoption of the county road system to the voters of Iosco county. The vote will be taken at the annual township election next April. During the time intervening the question should be carefully considered.

REPUBLICANS now admit that the Wilson bill cannot be defeated in the House. In the near future they will arrive at same conclusion about the Senate. "Tariff reform is in sight, and it cannot be stopped by manufactured opposition, paid for with money wrung from the consumers of the country by the millionaire beneficiaries of McKinleyism.

THE appointment of Hon. Chas. R. Henry, as postmaster at Au Sable, gives satisfaction throughout the county. Mr. Henry has been a hard worker for the interests of democracy in this county, and receives a just recognition for his services. His qualifications for the position are too well known to need repeating here.

THE McKinley bill has been in force three years. It increased the tariff on wool. Wool has steadily declined every since. Every wool-grower knows it. Why longer depress the industry? Off with the wool tariff, and let American wool have a chance for wider use. You can't fool the farmer any longer on wool. Free wool can't get prices any lower.—Adrian Press.

EVERY day or two the public hears of a petition, "several thousand and strong," against a reform of the tariff, signed by the dependent workingmen of the chief beneficiaries of McKinleyism. Since when have petitions been permitted to reverse elections? The voters of the country have commanded a reduction of the tariff in two general elections, each time by more than 1,300,000 majority. No perfunctory and interested petitions can cancel those commands.—N. Y. World,

IN the tariff debate yesterday Congressmen Burrows sent to the clerk's desk and had read letters from Constantine and other points in Michigan "showing that the wool growers are driving their sheep to the slaughter-pens by thousands." Considering the depressing effect of the McKinley tariff on the wool market this is not surprising. Since the passage of that measure wool has fallen from 26 and 28 cents to 12 and 15 cents. The next year after the passage of the bill wool dropped 8 to 10 cents a pound. This was twelve months before the democratic victory of 1892, and wool has been going down ever since. The manufacturers, to preserve the high rates of protection they were given by that bill are striving to pull the wool over the eyes of the farmers and make them believe the interests of the manufacturers and wool growers are identical. They know they can do as they have been doing for the past two years, use a large amount of shoddy, and pay the American farmers what they please for their clips. Yet it may be doubted whether "the farmers are driving their sheep to the slaughter pens by thousands," for the Chicago live stock market quotes sheep steady at \$3 to \$3.75 and lambs \$4.50 to \$4.85, which shows that the market is not overstocked.—Bay City Times-Press.

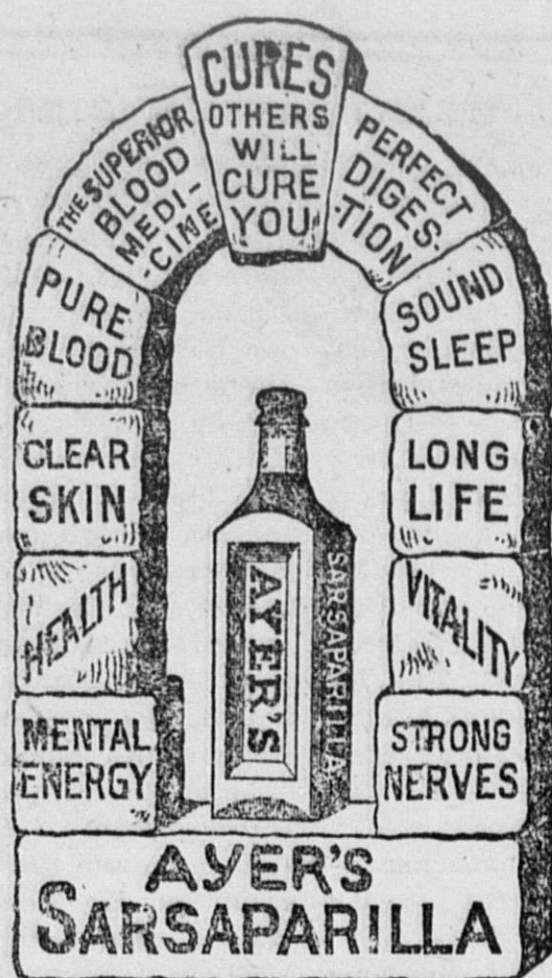

The board of supervisors of Iosco county met at the court house, in the village of Tawas City, in said county, on the 12th day of December, 1893, pursuant to adjournment from the 21st day of October, 1893.

The following supervisors were present: Betz, Wallace, Galbraith, White, Angell, Duplanty, Dillon, Latham, Jackson, Gardner, Horton, Murphy, Rodman, Yockey. Quorum present.

The minutes of October 17 and 18 were read and approved.

On motion the board took a recess until 1 o'clock this afternoon.

(AFTERNOON SESSION.)

The board was called to order by chairman Yockey who ordered the roll called.

Roll call: Present—Betz, Wallace, Galbraith, White, Angell, Duplanty, Dillon, Datham, Jackson Gardner, Horton, Murphy, Rodman, Yockey.

The minutes of October 19th, 20th and 21st 1893 were read and approved.

To the Hon Board of Supervisors of Iosco county:

GENTLEMEN: We, the undersigned members of the above board, having been duly appointed by you at the last session of this board in October last, to inspect the job of heating the court house by steam when completed, according to the terms and conditions specified in the contract, let to Herendeen Mfg. Co. per Sullivan Plumbing and Heating Co., contractors. We, therefore would recommend that the Herendeen Mfg. Co., or said Sullivan Plumbing and Heating Co., be paid in accordance with the contract given them.

The board met pursuant to adjournment from yesterday.

The board called to order by chairman pro tem Murphy.

Roll call: Present—Betz, Wallace, Galbraith, White, Angell, Duplanty, Dillon, Jackson, Gardner, Horton, Rodman, Murphy.

Moved by Betz, supported by Duplanty that the following resolution be adopted, viz:

Be it resolved, that the county treasurer be authorized to borrow \$1,000 for thirty days at 8 per cent per annum to defray current expenses and that a county warrant be issued for said loan. Carried, all voting yes

Moved by Duplanty and supported by White, that all bills for board of county canvassers to canvass election returns of special election held on December 4th, 1893 for the adoption of the county road system be presented to committee on claims and accounts of this board. Carried, all voting yes.

Moved by Duplanty supported by Angell that the following resolution be adopted:

Be it resolved, that the clerk of this board telegraph prosecuting attorney Gonnine and ask him if he will be present at this meeting of the board of supervisors, and if not that he appoint a proxy to be in attendance at once. All voted yes.

Moved by Horton supported by White that the following resolution be adopted:

Be it resolved, That the sheriff of Iosco county, be instructed by this board as part of his duties as sheriff of Iosco county to look after and keep in order the steam apparatus now in court house, according to printed instructions furnished by contractors of steam plant and that he shall be held responsible for the care of same. All voted yes.

On motion the board took a recess until one o'clock this afternoon.

Whereas, It has been made to appear that Augusta Dettmer, of the township of Tawas, is a widow with a large family of children, most of whom are unable to earn any means which in anywise decreases the expense of their care and maintenance; That she is the owner of the s ½ of the n w ¼ of section 21, town 22 n r 7 e, a small portion of which is in a condition for cultivation, and from this she manages to make a living for herself and family; That in the year 1892 and for several years prior thereto the s 1-2 of the n w 1-4 of the same section has been assessed to her on which she has managed to pay the taxes each year, and in the year 1892, she paid the taxes which amounted to \$11.60 on said last described lands; That the lands actually owned by her were assessed to August Dettmer, on which he has paid the taxes for each year until the year 1892, which he allowed to remain unpaid and have not been paid up to the present time. That August Dettmer was indebted to several parties for which he had given mortgages, and under the late tax law mortgages have been assessed as an interest in the reality, said mortgages were given upon the lands of said August Dettmer, and by the return of said taxes it leaves a lien upon the land owned by Augusta Dettmer, for the amount of such mortgage and other tax, the whole amount being \$44.62. Therefore be it resolved, That an order be drawn in favor of the county treasurer for the sum of \$44.62, and he is hereby directed to cancel all the taxes appearing against the s 1-2 of the n w 1-4 of section 21 town 22 n r 7 e.
