OUR Immigration officials should lbe on the alert to prevent the Europ－ rean anarchists who are now being driven from pillar to post coming to America．We have no use for them．
Time only demonstrates more fforceably that that un－American in－ istitution known as the United States iSenate should be abolished．This， Thewever，probably cannot be accom plished during the present genera－ ition，and consequently the next best thing to be done is to elect senators lby a direct vote of the people． Under the present system of elect． Ing United States senators the peo ople are practically without represen－ itation in the upper branch of con－ gress．That body is at present
Hargely composed of and controlled liby a few millionaires who have jpurchased therr seats by the most profigate，ruthless and demoraliz iing expenditure of their ill－gotten wealth．

The three republican state officers whom the governor is trying to lbounce from office are not disposed to suffer the disgrace alone．We Thave already referred to their ex posure of Gov．Rich for signing warrants and pardons in blank，and
they also get after Auditor Gen． Turner for robbing the＇state by lbig expense account．They publish a list of items paid the auditor gen－ reral from Feb．15th，1893，up to －Oct．25th，1893，the whole amount－ ing to $\$ 1,398.24$ ，nearly every dollar of which was unnecessary and not roontemplated by the law．Auditor ＇Geereral Stone＇s entire expenses paid Wy the state during his two years in roffice did not exceed $\$ 300$ ，and the greater part of this was due to the state equalization board，which was atan unusual expense．The law com－ pels corporations paying specific raxes to pay them at Lansing，but the present auditor general has been charging the state railroad fare and other traveling expenses，and big hotel bills under the pretense of col－ llecting these taxes．The figures which his fellow republicans publish andicate that he has been drawing ：about a hundred dollars a month more from the state for his personal expenses than his predecessor did． The tax payers of Michigan are paying dearly for defeating the democrats in＇92．－Petoskey Demo－

TWO PATERNALISTIC AR－ MIES．
The country looks aghast on the Folly of the misguided men who are forming armies of unemployed at Los Angeles，Cal．，and Massillon， Ot，to march to Washington and demand appropriations for public work from congress．Yet the coun－ try cannot condemn these men with－ out condemning itself．
The whole country has laid the foundation for the folly of these men in the paternalistic legislation
which it has demanded of its rep． resentatives in congress．The dif－ ference between the armies of the unemployed and the armies of the protected is a difference of methods only．The principle actuating both is the same．The armies of the un－ employed are marshaled by foolish ignoramuses and the armies of the protected have been handled by shrewd and able leaders．The one proposes to gain its end by the crude prothods of ignorance and folly and
men the other has gained its end by sharp practices and astute means．
The Carnegies and Havemeyers， with their senators，trained lobbyists and workingmen＇s positıons and slush funds，have got the govern－ ment to do exactly what the Los Angeles ard Massillon armies want it to do－provide for one class of citizens at the expense of another， They are smart enough to do it in a more effectual manner than the poor fools who are now inviting condem－
nation and scorn by trying in a nation and scorn by trying in a share of overment favor．
The ignorant demagogues who propose to lead foolish workmen into trouble have learned the patern－ lism they preach from the people＇s representatives．As long as the country suffers the horde of greedy plutocrats to hold up the govern－ ment it must not be surprised if ar－ mies of hungry workmen thunder at the capitol doors．The two ex－ tremes of paternalistic parasites come together there．－St．Louis Post－Dispatch．

LORDS AND SENATORS．
In his address to an anti－house of Tords meeting of 80,000 London workingmen in Hyde Park Sunday John Burns，M．P．，declared for a single chamber－the commons．He aid the British workingmen would rather retain the lords，worse than
useless as they are，than erect an elective senate．＂The senate is failure everywhere，＂he said，and sited the agitation against the French senate and the＂hopeless
corruption＂of the United States senate in proof of his statment．
Mr．Burns is not a man who min－ es his words and his conclusion are hot always the most iogical，but，as Americans，can we flatly deny his impeachment of our＂upper house？ It is，of course．absurd to say that all our senators are corrupt，or half or even quarter of them．The body has fallen from that high estate in which it was designed to live，as balance wheel to our legislature and a breathing place for the purest and highest spirits of the nation．It is o longer，unhappily，as unfailing pronf of great parts or unimpeaci Yet integrity to be elected senato Yet it is not also true that there is
sufficient leaven of corruption in the chamber to taint the whole mass？ Allowing for all ot Senator Peffer＇s ecentricities，real and alleged， would such resolutions as those he introbuced the other day have been posible or even conceivable fifty years ago？Or，having been intro－ duced is it conceivable that the sentate of Webster＇s day would have turned them down without com－ ment？The whole country believes that senators gamble in Wall Street on information obtained in their official character．The senate may or may not be guilty，but the very act that the country entertains such a suspicion is proof enough of the estate to which it has fallen．In－ deed，the manner in which seats in
the senate have of recent years been openly purchased or won by polititial tricks and trades is proof sufficent of the character of the men and sufficiently
tempt in which the country holds
Burns may be right in his as－ sertion that an elective senate would be no improvement on the hereditary senate of his own country．But， after all，that theory amounts to an
indictment of the electoral body－ of the democracy which Mr．．Burns assumes to champion－no less than cago Times．

THE USE OF OATS．
In feeding oats，especialy the whole grain，much depends upon the nature of the hull or chaff．It is ives thes heaves That which is much above the standard weight has most often a rough，gritty claff which so acts on the stomach as to expel much of the grain in an un digested state．
The hull，however soft its texture， is always laxative，and a moderate degree of laxativeness is beneficial especially to breeding animals，but there is no gain in passing through the heaviest grain in a nearly whole state．Better use a light grain， which will be more thoroughly digested．It is commonly supposed that the oat which sells for the highest prices is the best feed，but it is not always the case．
MONEY IN SHEEP RAISING There is money in sheep－raising England，and there certainly should be some in the United States． The Englishman has not only free vool but free trade in every depart ment of farming，yet his sheep are
kis protection against bankruptcy． The difference lies in the fact that in England there is great pains－tak－ ing in the sheep husbandry．Noth－ ing is to good for the flock，whic is given the best food，care and
shelter．As a result mutton is highly eateemed there，as it deserves to be，for special pains have been In the Urited States，on the other and，little or nothing has been done for sheep．These animals will bear a good deal of neglect and still live though they will not thrive ed to test the popular theory that a sheep will live on nothing，by mak－ ing it a general weed and thistle exterminator．Such food dose not con－
