THE HARRISON boom seems to be very much out of gear in its progress department.

OUR Immigration officials should be on the alert to prevent the European anarchists who are now being driven from pillar to post coming to America. We have no use for them.

TIME only demonstrates more forcefully that that un-American institution known as the United States Senate should be abolished. This, however, probably cannot be accomplished during the present generation, and consequently the next best thing to be done is to elect senators by a direct vote of the people. Under the present system of electing United States senators the people are practically without representation in the upper branch of congress. That body is at present largely composed of and controlled by a few millionaires who have purchased their seats by the most profligate, ruthless and demoralizing expenditure of their ill-gotten wealth.

THE three republican state officers whom the governor is trying to bounce from office are not disposed to suffer the disgrace alone. We have already referred to their exposure of Gov. Rich for signing warrants and pardons in blank, and they also get after Auditor Gen. Turner for robbing the state by a big expense account. They publish a list of items paid the auditor general from Feb. 15th, 1893, up to Oct. 25th, 1893, the whole amounting to \$1,398.24, nearly every dollar of which was unnecessary and not contemplated by the law. Auditor General Stone's entire expenses paid by the state during his two years in office did not exceed \$300, and the greater part of this was due to the state equalization board, which was an unusual expense. The law compels corporations paying specific taxes to pay them at Lansing, but the present auditor general has been charging the state railroad fare and other traveling expenses, and big hotel bills under the pretense of collecting these taxes. The figures which his fellow republicans publish indicate that he has been drawing about a hundred dollars a month more from the state for his personal expenses than his predecessor did. The tax payers of Michigan are paying dearly for defeating the democrats in '92.—Petoskey Democrat.

TWO PATERNALISTIC ARMIES.

The country looks aghast on the folly of the misguided men who are forming armies of unemployed at Los Angeles, Cal., and Massillon, O., to march to Washington and demand appropriations for public work from congress. Yet the country cannot condemn these men without condemning itself.

The whole country has laid the foundation for the folly of these men in the paternalistic legislation

which it has demanded of its representatives in congress. The difference between the armies of the unemployed and the armies of the protected is a difference of methods only. The principle actuating both is the same. The armies of the unemployed are marshaled by foolish ignoramuses and the armies of the protected have been handled by shrewd and able leaders. The one proposes to gain its end by the crude methods of ignorance and folly and the other has gained its end by sharp practices and astute means.

The Carnegies and Havemeyers, with their senators, trained lobbyists and workingmen's positions and slush funds, have got the government to do exactly what the Los Angeles and Massillon armies want it to do—provide for one class of citizens at the expense of another. They are smart enough to do it in a more effectual manner than the poor fools who are now inviting condemnation and scorn by trying in a rough and impossible way to get a share of governmental favors.

The ignorant demagogues who propose to lead foolish workmen into trouble have learned the paternalism they preach from the people's representatives. As long as the country suffers the horde of greedy plutocrats to hold up the government it must not be surprised if armies of hungry workmen thunder at the capitol doors. The two extremes of paternalistic parasites come together there.—St. Louis Post-Dispatch.

LORDS AND SENATORS.

In his address to an anti-house of lords meeting of 80,000 London workingmen in Hyde Park Sunday John Burns, M. P., declared for a single chamber—the commons. He said the British workingmen would rather retain the lords, worse than useless as they are, than erect an elective senate. "The senate is a failure everywhere," he said, and cited the agitation against the French senate and the "hopeless corruption" of the United States senate in proof of his statement.

Mr. Burns is not a man who minces his words and his conclusion are not always the most logical, but, as Americans, can we flatly deny his impeachment of our "upper house?" It is, of course, absurd to say that all our senators are corrupt, or half or even quarter of them. The body has fallen from that high estate in which it was designed to live, as a balance wheel to our legislature and a breathing place for the purest and highest spirits of the nation. It is no longer, unhappily, as unflinching proof of great parts or unimpeachable integrity to be elected senator. Yet it is not also true that there is sufficient leaven of corruption in the chamber to taint the whole mass? Allowing for all of Senator Peffer's eccentricities, real and alleged, would such resolutions as those he introduced the other day have been possible or even conceivable fifty years ago? Or, having been introduced is it conceivable that the senate of Webster's day would have turned them down without comment? The whole country believes that senators gamble in Wall Street on information obtained in their official character. The senate may or may not be guilty, but the very fact that the country entertains such a suspicion is proof enough of the estate to which it has fallen. Indeed, the manner in which seats in the senate have of recent years been openly purchased or won by political tricks and trades is proof sufficient of the character of the men who are parties of such transaction and sufficiently explains the con-

tempt in which the country holds them.

Mr. Burns may be right in his assertion that an elective senate would be no improvement on the hereditary senate of his own country. But, after all, that theory amounts to an indictment of the electoral body—of the democracy which Mr. Burns assumes to champion—no less than of the senators themselves.—Chicago Times.

THE USE OF OATS.

In feeding oats, especially the whole grain, much depends upon the nature of the hull or chaff. It is not always the heaviest grain which gives the best results. That which is much above the standard weight has most often a rough, gritty chaff which so acts on the stomach as to expel much of the grain in an undigested state.

The hull, however soft its texture, is always laxative, and a moderate degree of laxativeness is beneficial, especially to breeding animals, but there is no gain in passing through the heaviest grain in a nearly whole state. Better use a light grain, which will be more thoroughly digested. It is commonly supposed that the oat which sells for the highest prices is the best feed, but it is not always the case.

MONEY IN SHEEP RAISING.

There is money in sheep-raising in England, and there certainly should be some in the United States. The Englishman has not only free wool but free trade in every department of farming, yet his sheep are his protection against bankruptcy. The difference lies in the fact that in England there is great pains-taking in the sheep husbandry. Nothing is to good for the flock, which is given the best food, care and shelter. As a result mutton is highly esteemed there, as it deserves to be, for special pains have been bestowed on its sweetness and flavor.

In the United States, on the other hand, little or nothing has been done for sheep. These animals will bear a good deal of neglect and still live though they will not thrive; hence the farmers here have proceeded to test the popular theory that a sheep will live on nothing, by making it a general weed and thistle exterminator. Such food does not conduct to fine flavored mutton, which explains the unpopularity of that meat. Now that farmers are realizing this a superior article is coming on the market, and there is no reason why mutton-eating should not increase to ten times its present volume.—N. Y. World.

KNOCKED OUT.

No Vote on the County Road System this Spring.

The Resolution did not Pass at the last Meeting of the Board.

At yesterday afternoon session of the board of supervisors, Supervisor Duplanty and Murphy called the attention of the board of Supervisors to the fact that an error had been made in the matter of adopting of the resolution regarding the county road system, at the last meeting of the board, and that it did not receive the necessary two-thirds vote. The following resolution was drafted by the prosecuting attorney, and on motion of Duplanty supported by Murphy was unanimously adopted:

Whereas, it appears that a resolution was offered and voted upon at the last meeting of this Board, submitting to the electors of this county the question of the adoption of the county road system, to be voted on at the April election 1894; and

Whereas, said resolution received 10 yea votes and 4 nay votes, on this board and was considered carried and so acted upon by this board, upon the belief in good faith that the adoption of such resolution required only a two-thirds vote of all members present, instead of two-thirds vote of all members elect as provided by law, and whereas the County Clerk of this county has taken justifiable steps under said resolution to give notice of such election; and whereas, it appearing to the board that said resolution was not legally passed by this board, inasmuch as two-thirds of all members elect of this board did not vote in favor of the same.

Therefore, Be it resolved, that the County Clerk has only done his duty under such resolution, and further

Resolved, that the submission of such question to the electors be withdrawn, and the County Clerk be instructed to withhold from the electors of the county all facilities for voting on the adoption of such county road system.
