RICH MEN AND TAXES.

One of the most startling facts brought to light in Mr. Stead's book on Chicago is the way in which the rich men of that city escape their just share of taxation.

The assessors under oath make the following returns of the personal property of the richest citizens: Marshall Field, \$20,000. Marshall Field, Jr., \$2,000; P. D. Armour, \$5,000; George M. Pullman, \$12,000; J. W. Doane, \$12,000; H. H. Kohlsaat, \$1,500; C. T. Yerkes, \$4,000; Potter Palmer, \$15,000.

An income tax enforced by the National Government would fetch some millionaire tax-dodgers in Chicago and elsewhere to book. Now they escape doing their proper share in maintaining the institutions of government under which they fatten by the false swearing of others, connived at if not suborned by bribes.

Such facts as these revealed of Chicago show why the rich are as a rule against an income tax. Without it they can escape doing their duty. They fear they may not be able to do so any more.

to the pains and penalties of perjury in their own persons.

But so far from this being a reason against an income tax it is a strong reason for it. Too long and too heavily have taxes been imposed upon that part of the earnings of the people which is necessarily spent for shelter, food and clothing instead of upon the surplus which is saved.

THE SUPREME CRISIS OF THE DEMOCRATIC PARTY.

The supreme hour of the democratic party has come. The little coterie of protectionist senators, falsely calling themselves democrats, under the leadership of David B. Hill, have planted themselves squarely in the path of tariff reform and the Wilson bill and declared it shall not pass.

The New York World of March 7th announces in big head lines that "Hill takes off his mask and begins open warfare on the Wilson bill." Under this heading it says:

"Senator Hill has thrown off the mask. He is no longer a tariff reformer, nor is he entitled to call himself a 'conservative.' He is a protectionist, pure and simple, and will hereafter be so regarded by the friends of tariff reform.

The substance of the resolution is to strike out the income tax and substitute higher protective duties on imports.

Harper's Weekly says there is no doubt that Hill secured the defeat of Peckham's appointment by the pledge of democratic votes for protection in the senate. His act of last Wednesday was the first step in the delivery of the goods.

Let us see what democratic (?) senators have arrayed themselves under the disgraceful leadership of Hill in this unholy alliance. They are, "metoo" Murphy of New York, of course, the man who went to the Chicago convention to tell the democrats from the North, South, East and West that Cleveland could never be elected; Pugh and Morgan, of Alabama, who demand a protective tariff on coal and iron; Camden and Faulkner, of West Virginia, likewise demanding protection for coal and iron; the millionaire beneficiary of the protective tariff, Senator Brice, of Ohio; Gorman, of Maryland, who pays no heed to the demand of the democracy of his state that he vote for the Wilson bill.

Now, that is the situation? The democrats of the House have, by an overwhelming and almost unanimous vote, passed the Wilson bill, as moderate a tariff reform measure as could be voted for by a consistent democrat. Its chief features, those around which the democrats of the House and of the whole country rally, moderate as the bill is in some respects, are the income tax, the placing of the great staple raw materials of industry, coal, iron, wool and lumber, on the free list and the repeal of the McKinley tariff on sugar, which at once burdens the masses and builds up the giant sugar trust.

This is the darkest hour the democratic party has ever known since the Civil War. Loyal democrats all over the country are on the verge of despair, Unflinchingly they

have met defeat year after year till the ranks of the party were purged of Randallism and the paid attorneys of protected interests were driven from the democratic side of the House. And now, at the very moment when victory is in sight, it is snatched away by the faithless representatives (?) of the party in the American House of Lords.

To-day the loyal democrats all over the country who have never before faltered or lost hope in the face of defeat are standing in doubt and dismay and asking themselves "what is to become of democratic principles and of the democratic party?" These men will not abandon the principles they have so long and so loyally fought for. They will seek other political organizations for their accomplishment. Here lies the danger. To-day the democratic voters of this country must decide which is to go down, the democratic party or the renegade coterie of democrats in the senate.

There is but one hope left. When the Wilson bill is sent back to the amendments, the democratic majority in the House, the real representatives of the people, should reject the amendments and send back the bill to the senate in its original form without the courtesy of a moment's discussion. Then let a square issue be made on the question whether the country is to be ruled by a House of Lords or by the people through their legally elected and responsible representatives.

This is the final question of republics. It has been the fundamental question of English politics since 1832. It must be settled here as there; the people must and shall rule. The senate must be abolished or reformed. The democratic party must appeal to the people on this issue. The party of the people must make this a government of the people. Let the issue be either to abolish the senate or to elect senators by popular vote and for a term of two years. This issue, coupled with tariff reform and the income tax, would sweep the country. The hour of death or deliverance is at hand.—Pontiac Post.

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
