RICH MEN AND TAXES．
One of the most startling facts brought to light in Mr．Stead＇s book on Chicago is the way in which the rich men of that city escape their just share of taxation．Twenty years ago the assessment for taxa－ tion of the property of Chicago，real and personal，was $\$ 312,072,995$ ．In 1893 it was but $\$ 245,790,351$ Here is a shrinkage in twenty years of about $\$ 70,000,000$ in the assessed property，while，as everybody knows， the wealth of the city has enormous ly increased．The rich have found ways of concealing it from the assess ors．
The assessors under oath mak the following returns of the persona property of the richest citizens：
Marshall Field，$\$ 20,000$ ．Marshall Field．Jr．，$\$ 2,000$ ；P．D．Armour \＄5，000；George M．Pullman，\＄12， 000 ；J．W．Doane，$\$ 12,000$ ；H．H Kohlsaat，\＄1，500；C．T．Yerkes $\$ 4,000$ ；Potter Palmer，$\$ 15,000$ ． None of these men makes out or swears to his own account．The swearing is all done by the assessors， who are allowed by the C cesuse grossly to undervalue their posses sions for taxation．It is not with－
out reason that Mr．Stead says： out reason that Mr．Stead says：
＂There is a heavier sum in solid dol lars pocketed every year by the official perjurers of Chicago than is pard to any other officials in the service of the city．
An meome tax enforced by the National Government would fetch some millionarre tax－dodgers in Chi－ cago and elsewhere to book．Now they escape doing their proper share in maintaining the institutions of government under which they fatten by the false swearing of others，
connived at if not suborned by connived at if not suborned by bribes．Many of them would not swear falsely themselves．Those who are willing to do it might not ors as easily as they corrupt their local officials．
Such facts as these revealed of Chicago show why the rich are as a rule against an income tax．With－ out it they can escape doing their duty．They fear they may not be able to do so any more．Their talk about the evil of false swearing that than that they doubt their more
to the pains and penalties of perjur their own persons．
But so far from this being reason against an income tax it is a strong reason for it．Too long and too heavily have taxes been imposed upon that part of the earnings of the people which is necessarily spent for shelter，food and clothing instead of upon the su

## THE SUFREME CRISIS PARTY．

Let us see what democratic（？）sen ators have arrayed themselves unde the disgraceful ．dership of Hill in his unholy allia a．They are ＂metoo＂Murphy o．Vew York，o curse，the man who went to th Chicago convention to tell the den crats from the North，South，Eas and West that Cleveland could neve e elected；Pugh and Morgan，o Alabama，who demand a protective riff on coal and ron；Camden an Faulkner，of West Virginia，like wise demanding protection for coal and iron；the millionaire beneficiary of the protective tariff，Senator Brice， of Ohio；Gorman，of Maryland，who pays no heed to the demand of the democracy of his state that he vote for the Wilson bill．In addition to this list it is probable that the sen－ tors from Louisana will insist upon duty on sugar．
Now，that is the situation？The democrats of the House have，by an overwhelming and almost unanimous vote．passed the Wilson bill，as mod－ erate a tariff reform，measure as could be voted for by a consistent democrat．Its chref features，those around which the democrats of the House and of the whole country rally，moderate as the bill is in some respects，are the income tax，the placing of the great staple raw ma－ terials of industry，coal，iron，wool and lumber，on the free list and the repeal of the McKinley tariff on sugar，which at once burdens the masses and builds up the giant sugar trust．In 1890 and again in 1892 the people have demanded tariff reform by unprecedented and overwhelming majorities．l＇he democratic paaty，in its last nationa platform，denounced the protective tariff as a fraud and a robbery．
This is the darkest hour the demo
have met defeat year after year till the ranks of the party were purged Randallism and the paid allorneys of protected interests were driven Hom the democratic side of the House．And now，at the very mo－
ment when victory is in sight，it is snatched away by the taithless re－ presentatives（？）of the party in the American House of Lords．
