The receipts of the American Board for the month of Oct. were \$53,397, an increase over those for the corresponding month of last year of \$1,360.

The membership of the Reformed (German) Church appears to be, from the latest statistics, a little over 224. 900, an increase of about 3,000 over last year.

At the Woman's Christian Temperance Union Convention held at Baltimore last month forty-six states were represented by 425 delegates besides fraternal delegates from England, Canada, Australia and Armenia.

A new centre of work has been opened in the lower east side of New York City by the Protestant Episcopal Mission Society. The building includes rooms for Sunday-school, sewing school, boys' and girls, clubs, kindergarten, chapel, &c.

Potatoes For Fattening Stock. The low price of potatoes this fail and the heavy yeald in potato-growing districts, have brought the question of the value of potatoes as a food for farm animals prominently before feeders. At ordinary prices potatoes cannot be profitably fed to stock, but where, as in large sections of the country this year, the market price is only 10 cents a bushel, with the expense of hauling them several miles. often over poor roads, to be taken out the question deserves careful consideration whether it will not pay farmers better to feed the potatoes on their farms and sell stock or animal product rather than disposing of the crop at such low figures. In order to determine the feeding value of potatoes for farm animals experiments have been conducted in this country and abroad, the result of which furnish ample evidence of thier value for this purpose. The Danish scientist, Prof. Ford, found as the result of a large number of trials that four pounds of potatoes produced a similar growth when fed to fattening hogs as did one pound of rye or barley. Prof. Henry in one of his experiments, found that about four and one-half pounds of potatoes were equivalent to one pound of corn in feeding ten months' old pigs. If we take the former ratio, we have that with corn at \$10 a ton (28 cents a bushel) potatoes will be worth about 7.5 cents a bushel for feeding purposes; with corn at \$12 a | Sash ion (34 cents a bushel) they will be uniform rules for the different homes. worth about 9 cents a bushel; with corn at \$15 a ton (42 cents a bushel) they will be worth about 111 cents a bushel, etc. When prices are as low as they are now, potatoes may in most cases be fed with profit to all classes of farm animals. On most farms the small unsaleable potatoes are now fed to hogs, and it is generally known that they make a first-class swine food. As early as the beginning of the present century Thaer, the great German agricultural teacher and CROWN writer, advocated the use of potatoes The Catholic social at the opera steer feeding. He says: "when a steer is fed sixty pounds of of potatoes daily, and in addition ten pounds of hay, with straw adiibitum, he will. according to actual feeding experiments, be in better condition and make better growth than if fed thirty pounds of hay daily." To steers, as well as to all other kind of farm animals, except hogs and poultry, raw potatoes are to be preferred to cooked ones; the latter may sometime produce as good or better results, but the grain is not sufficient to pay for extra


mixed in with them. The experiments of Prof. Girard, the French scientist, with potatoes for fattening steers and sheep show their value for these farm animals. If you are going to buy furniture, Steers fed fifty-five pounds of potatoes a day gained 2. 86 pounds a day per head during eighty-six days, while steers fed 110 pounds of fodder beets daily gained 2.09 pounds per head per day durning ninty-five day, hay and straw being fed in addition in both cases. Sheep fed 4.4 pound of potatoes a day gain .239 pound per head per day during seventy days, while sheep feed 8.8 pounds of fooder beets daily, gained only .124 pound per head per day, hay and straw being fed in addition, also in these experiments. The potato fed sheep dressed 51 per cent of their live weight, and the potato-fed steers dressed 60.19 per cent. The usual yield of meat from French steers is said to seldom exceed 56 per cent of their live weight. The All members of G. K. THE STATE PUBLIC SCHOOL.

HOW MICHIGAN CARES FOR HER DE-PENDENT AND NEGLECTED CHILDREN.

The State Public School, for the care of the dependent, neglected and illtreated children of Michigan, is ar institution of which the people of Michigan may well be proud. It has solved the financial problem of taking care of these children, and as a protective measure against pauperism, vice and crime, its value to the public is immeasurable. Before its foundation there was no place for the children thrown upon public charge, except the county houses, where they were necessarily under the debasing influence of pauperism and vice. At a time in their lives when impressions received are most lasting, they were thrown among those whose influence is almost uniformly bad, and their young lives were thus blighted.

The establishment of the State Public School marked an epoch in the child life of Michigan. The State assumes the right to the guardianship of those children who are dependent, neglected or illtreated, and cares for them by furnishing them a temporary home at the school where, by means of perfect physical comfort and healthful moral training, they are led to forget their old life and become prepared to take their places with their more fortunate fellows in the families and public schools throughout the State. Before admission to the school they have known little of comfort and happiness. Their residence there, short, though it usually is, gives them a new idea of life, and they have no desire to return to the old manner of living. The price of admission is dependence or ill-treatment, and the qualifications are that they shall be between one and twelve years of age and sound mentally and physicially.

Since the opening of the institution in 1874, nearly 3,700 children have been received and cared for. There are now in the institution about 200, and over 1,350 are with good families throughout the State and under the supervision of the school. The others have passed out from under the school's control. Those with families are placed on contracts which provide for their proper care and education,

It is not probable that there are many in this vicinity who would gladly take one or more of these

children into their homes and make them their own?



If remonstrated with she would answer, "Oh, pshaw, that would be too much trouble." She is one of the most generous souls who ever lived, but is improvident and lavish where her table is concerned. She must be either very indifferent or lazy, and as a consequence the waste in her house would positively make an economical person angry.

So-called economy may be carried to such an extreme as to amount to stingyness, and is sometimes ludicrous. One woman was so remarkably careful that over her new carpet she first tacked a muslin cover and then placed newspapers wherever she thought it would have the hardest wear. Again, many people want to be so economical that company is altogether out of the question with them. They never can afford to give a beggar a bit to eat when he comes to their door. They cannot go here nor there, because it may cost something.
