RELIGIOUS NEWS.

The receipts of the American Board for the month of Oct. were \$53,397, an increase over those for the corresponding month of last year of \$1,360.

The membership of the Reformed (German) Church appears to be, from the latest statistics, a little over 224,000, an increase of about 3,000 over last year.

At the Woman's Christian Temperance Union Convention held at Baltimore last month forty-six states were represented by 425 delegates besides fraternal delegates from England, Canada, Australia and Armenia.

A new centre of work has been opened in the lower east side of New York City by the Protestant Episcopal Mission Society. The building includes rooms for Sunday-school, sewing school, boys' and girls, clubs, kindergarten, chapel, &c.

A novelty in advertising is shown in a Scotch church. A congregation could not pay its minister, when a soap firm offered to pay \$500 a year for five years on condition that its advertisement be hung up in front of the gallery in the church. The offer was accepted.

The old English harvest festival, the parent of our American Thanksgiving, is still observed abroad. At one recently held at Folkestone, in addition to the usual decorations, there was a display of fresh fish. In his sermon the preacher called attention to this, and remarked that the "harvest of the sea" was as deserving of notice as that of the land. We are apt to forget that the fruits of the earth include the products of the water as well as those of the land.

Last Tuesday marked the commencement of the fiftieth year of the pastorate of the Rev. Dr. R. S. Scorrin in

Brooklyn, N. Y. When he took charge of the Church of the Pilgrims, in 1854, the population of the city was only 63,000. Dr. Scorrin, who has a world-wide reputation as an able and eloquent speaker, has been identified with every prominent forward movement, while in his private life he has systematically practiced the Christianity he has so faithfully preached. — *N. Y. World.*

The society for promoting christian knowledge, founded in 1698, still continues its work on substantially the same lines. Its annual report, just issued, shows that during the past year ninety-three chaplains have been sent out on emigrant ships, \$10,000 has been given for the training of medical students for the mission field, and the work of industrial training for converts in Africa and India has been taken up. The circulation of the society's publication during the year, other than Bibles and prayer books, amounted to nearly eight millions. The efficiency of this ancient institution was never greater than at present.

The fourteenth annual meeting of the general board of managers of the Woman's Home Missionary Society of the Methodist Episcopal Church, held in Columbus, O., the latter part of Oct., showed total receipts during the year of \$123,241; valuable supplies have been sent to the frontier ministers to the amount of \$114,000. Action was taken in regard to the deaconess work, identifying it more closely with the work of the Woman's Home Missionary Society, and providing uniform rules for the different homes. During the past fifteen years the society has raised in cash \$963,650, and has sent out supplies valued at \$637,842.

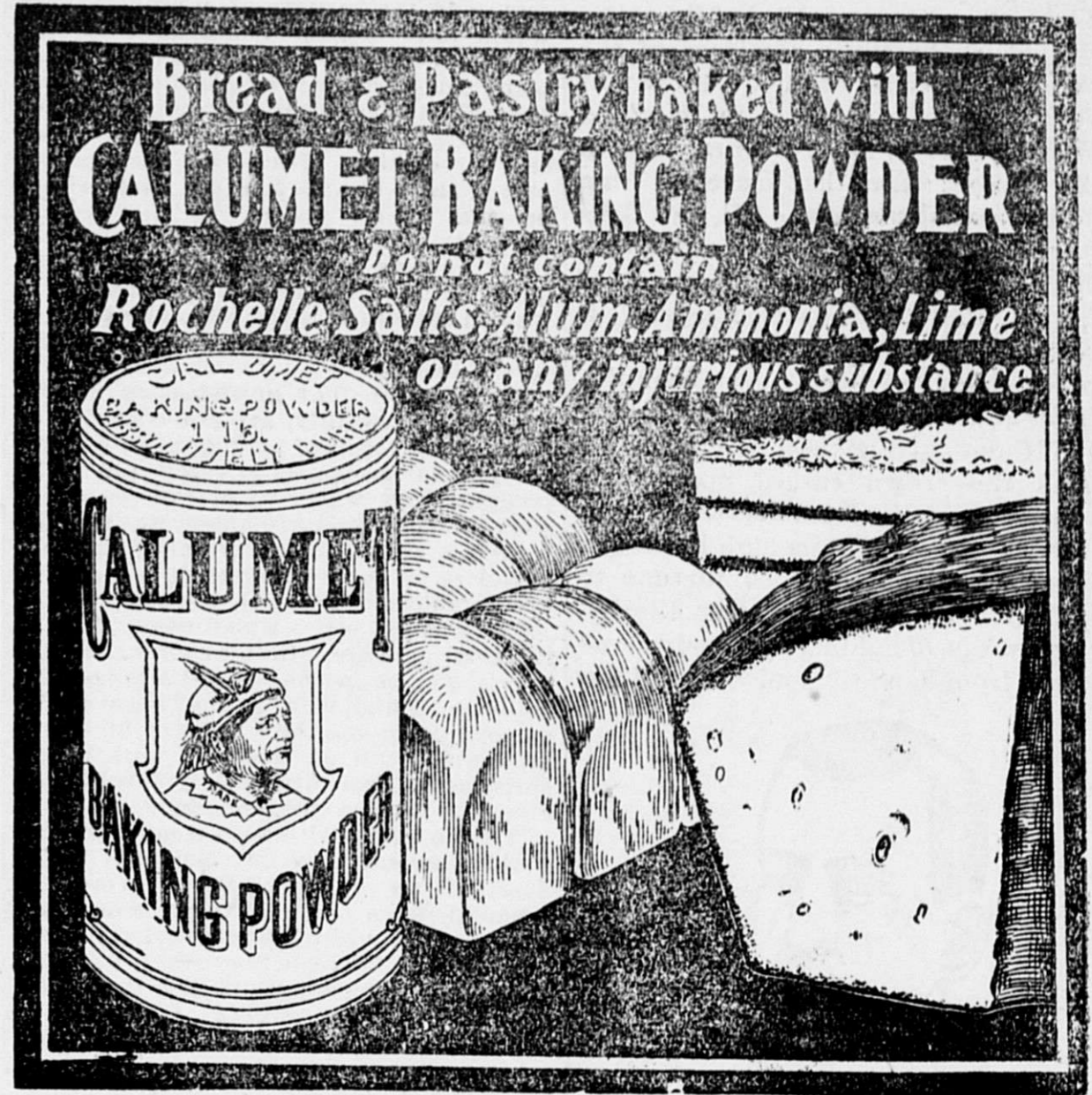
Potatoes For Fattening Stock.

The low price of potatoes this fall and the heavy yield in potato-growing districts, have brought the question of the value of potatoes as a food for farm animals prominently before feeders. At ordinary prices potatoes cannot be profitably fed to stock, but where, as in large sections of the country this year, the market price is only 10 cents a bushel, with the expense of hauling them several miles, often over poor roads, to be taken out the question deserves careful consideration whether it will not pay farmers better to feed the potatoes on their farms and sell stock or animal product rather than disposing of the crop at such low figures. In order to determine the feeding value of potatoes for farm animals experiments have been conducted in this country and abroad, the result of which furnish ample evidence of their value for this purpose. The Danish scientist, Prof. Ford, found as the result of a large number of trials that four pounds of potatoes produced a similar growth when fed to fattening hogs as did one pound of rye or barley. Prof. Henry in one of his experiments, found that about four and one-half pounds of potatoes were equivalent to one pound of corn in feeding ten months' old pigs. If we take the former ratio, we have that with corn at \$10 a ton (28 cents a bushel) potatoes will be worth about 7.5 cents a bushel for feeding purposes; with corn at \$12 a ton (34 cents a bushel) they will be worth about 9 cents a bushel; with corn at \$15 a ton (42 cents a bushel) they will be worth about 11½ cents a bushel, etc. When prices are as low as they are now, potatoes may in most cases be fed with profit to all classes of farm animals. On most farms the small unsaleable potatoes are now fed to hogs, and it is generally known that they make a first-class swine food. As early as the beginning of the present century Thaer, the great German agricultural teacher and writer, advocated the use of potatoes steer feeding. He says: "when a steer is fed sixty pounds of potatoes daily, and in addition ten pounds of hay, with straw ad libitum, he will, according to actual feeding experiments, be in better condition and make better growth than if fed thirty pounds of hay daily." To steers, as well as to all other kind of farm animals, except hogs and poultry, raw potatoes are to be preferred to cooked ones; the latter may sometime produce as good or better results, but the grain is not sufficient to pay for extra expense and trouble in cooking them. In feeding cooked potatoes to hogs Professor Henry found that they were relished best when least water was mixed in with them.

The experiments of Prof. Girard, the French scientist, with potatoes for fattening steers and sheep show their value for these farm animals. Steers fed fifty-five pounds of potatoes a day gained 2.86 pounds a day per head during eighty-six days, while steers fed 110 pounds of fodder beets daily gained 2.09 pounds per head per day during ninety-five days, hay and straw being fed in addition in both cases. Sheep fed 4.4 pound of potatoes a day gain .239 pound per head per day during seventy days, while sheep fed 8.8 pounds of fodder beets daily, gained only .124 pound per head per day, hay and straw being fed in addition, also in these experiments. The potato-fed sheep dressed 51 per cent of their live weight, and the potato-fed steers dressed 60.19 per cent. The usual yield of meat from French steers is said to seldom exceed 56 per cent of their live weight. The meat produced in the experiment is reported to have been of superior quality, the flavor being rich and delicate.

These and other experiments certainly encourage the belief that farmers who are at a distance from the markets and who can only receive a low price for their potatoes, will do well to turn their attention to utilizing the crop for the feeding of their stock. It may be stated in general that four tons of potatoes fed will save one ton of grain.—*F. W. Woll, in Live Stock Report.*

THE STATE PUBLIC SCHOOL.

HOW MICHIGAN CARES FOR HER DEPENDENT AND NEGLECTED CHILDREN.

The State Public School, for the care of the dependent, neglected and ill-treated children of Michigan, is an institution of which the people of Michigan may well be proud. It has solved the financial problem of taking care of these children, and as a protective measure against pauperism, vice and crime, its value to the public is immeasurable. Before its foundation there was no place for the children thrown upon public charge, except the county houses, where they were necessarily under the debasing influence of pauperism and vice. At a time in their lives when impressions received are most lasting, they were thrown among those whose influence is almost uniformly bad, and their young lives were thus blighted.

The establishment of the State Public School marked an epoch in the child life of Michigan. The State assumes the right to the guardianship of those children who are dependent, neglected or ill-treated, and cares for them by furnishing them a temporary home at the school where, by means of perfect physical comfort and healthful moral training, they are led to forget their old life and become prepared to take their places with their more fortunate fellows in the families and public schools throughout the State. Before admission to the school they have known little of comfort and happiness. Their residence there, short, though it usually is, gives them a new idea of life, and they have no desire to return to the old manner of living. The price of admission is dependence or ill-treatment, and the qualifications are that they shall be between one and twelve years of age and sound mentally and physically.

Since the opening of the institution in 1874, nearly 3,700 children have been received and cared for. There are now in the institution about 200, and over 1,350 are with good families throughout the State and under the supervision of the school. The others have passed out from under the school's control. Those with families are placed on contracts which provide for their proper care and education.

It is not probable that there are many in this vicinity who would gladly take one or more of these children into their homes and make them their own?

The best selections are boys from 4 to 8 years of age, and it is believed that the homes would be blessed fully as much as the children by taking the children into them.

Thrifty Housewives.


There is every commendation in the world for an economical woman, but a stingy one has no one's sympathy. Economy is a virtue when not ridden as a hobby. When all the waste that exists is taken into consideration, it seems strange that housekeepers and mothers, do not, or will not, exercise their ingenuity to prevent it, or rather, make all things go as far as possible, and thus save the surplus and assist those in need. One housekeeper we have in mind, keeps house for five persons on less than anyone we know of. There is not a sign of stinginess in anything about her work, and her table is always laden with good things. It is true, it does

not show the best the market produces, but the way she cooks and takes care of what she has is the only secret. I have never known her to throw away or burn anything that could be utilized again.

Many housewives do not care to take the trouble of saving or fixing over things, especially where the table is concerned. The waste in some homes is simply deplorable. We have seen a friend of ours when clearing up the remains of a meal, take two or three potatoes, meat, bread—food which had never been removed from the dishes on which they were brought to the table—and burn. If remonstrated with she would answer, "Oh, pshaw, that would be too much trouble." She is one of the most generous souls who ever lived, but is improvident and lavish where her table is concerned. She must be either very indifferent or lazy, and as a consequence the waste in her house would positively make an economical person angry.

So-called economy may be carried to such an extreme as to amount to stinginess, and is sometimes ludicrous. One woman was so remarkably careful that over her new carpet she first tacked a muslin cover and then placed newspapers wherever she thought it would have the hardest wear. Again, many people want to be so economical that company is altogether out of the question with them. They never can afford to give a beggar a bit to eat when he comes to their door. They cannot go here nor there, because it may cost something. They shut themselves out from so much of the pleasant and beautiful in the world that life to them must be a burden.—*Prairie Farmer.*
