MICHIGAN'S governor is about the only public man who has yet been quoted as believing President Cleveland's message on the Venezuela matter, was at all premature.

THE democratic national committee will meet at Washington, Jan. 16, for the purpose of selecting a place and setting the time of holding the next National convention.

GEN. WM. SHAKESPEAR, of Kalamazoo, is announced as a candidate for department commander, before the department meeting G. A. R., which meets at Saginaw next March.

WHEN the question of adopting President Cleveland recommendations as to a commission to examine the Venezuela boundary line was brought up in congress Wednesday, it was carried by a unanimous vote.

LAST Thursday Judge Allan G. Thurman, died at his home in Columbus, Ohio, at the advanced age of 82 years. The "Old Roman," as he was best known, was one of the noblest citizens of our country, and his career was one that all young men could follow with credit.

Gov. RICH seems to think Michigan can safely postpone preparations for war with England. While there may be no immediate prospect of a conflict, we believe, surrounded as we are by the great lakes and British providences, it is advisable to organize and maintain better military protection than we now have.

A FEW of the republican congressmen—who were probably elected to congress because of their money rather than their brains—are making a bluff at impeaching Minister Bayara, because he denounced the republican tariff as a form socialism. It is surprising what fools some men will make of themselves for the sake of a little notoriety.

TUESDAY President Cleveland sent to Congress a message on the Venezuela boundary controversy, wherein he urges on Congress the necessity of enforcing the Monroe Doctrine. The message is an exceptionally strong document and very war like in its tone. He recommends the appointment of a commission to investigate the boundary line in question. The message was received with a burst of applause in both houses such as has not greeted a state paper before in years, and is universally commended by all men, regardless of party.

THE new woman is better educated than the old and along more practical lines. Instead of doing endless tatting and crochet work she has turned her attention to hygienic cookery, healthful dress, outdoor sports, remunerative employments and affairs of church and state. She is braver than the woman of old, for she will give the helping hand to a repentant fallen sister and repulse an unrepentant fallen man. She prefers to be a self supporting entity rather than a clinging nonentity. She accepts marriage not as a means of support, as occasionally did her predecessor, but in order to complete the happiness and development of herself and the one she loves best. When she manages a bank, or preaches the gospel, or writes books, or practices medicine or law, she is by just so much better prepared than an untrained woman to assume the duties of wife and mother.—Catharine Wauugh McCulloch.

Practical Application of Manure.

"The quantity of barnyard manure on a farm is usually so limited that it is not easy for many to decide what disposition of it promises the most profit. Frequently one sees evidence that the farmer is hunting for the quickest returns, regardless of profit in the long run. When the supply is limited, we may safely lay down the rule in ordinary farming that the year's supply of manure should not be concentrated upon a few acres with the idea of making the one strip or small field abundantly for a number of years. This is often done, the plan being to manure another poor

strip the next year, and thus have a few acres abundantly able to produce a maximum crop of potatoes or corn. The objections to the plan are twofold—the owner of the average-sized farm with usual quantity of manure cannot keep up fertility of the whole farm in this way, and the manure will give far better returns if used to make a manurial crop grow," says Alva Agee, in Country Gentleman.

"The application of twenty-five to forty loads of manure to an acre will make it possible to grow a big crop; but while the plants are appropriating a small portion of the plant food in this manure, a good portion is leaching into the subsoil. I have seen a heavily manured patch of ground yield several successive crops of potatoes, and when the crops became too small to be profitable, a crop of extraordinary rank clover was grown, providing that down in the subsoil a big store of soluble plant food was reached by the clover roots. Heavy manure is an attempt to supply from the stable all the plant food the crop of one field requires, while other land goes begging for a little assistance. It may enable one to get a seemingly large profit from a very few acres, but leaves the average for the farm lower than it should be. It is pleasant to have a very fertile strip of ground on the farm, but it is more pleasant and is better paying to have all plough land in a reasonably profitable state of fertility.

"The manure from the stable accomplishes much more when it is used as a sort of equalizer over the fields; helping the thin portions to shade themselves with clover and to form a sod that will furnish needed humus for future crops. When the manure is put thick upon a few acres, thin ridges and spots in other fields are left without power to help themselves. The truth is made plainer every year by our scientists that soils elaborate their own supplies for future crops in great measure, and the skill of the farmer comes in when needed in assisting the soil by furnishing the plants needed, or the tillage needed, or a little soluble plant food to give the soil a start. Notwithstanding the too common practice of using the annual supply of manure in heavy application on a small area to insure a big yield of some vegetable or grain, it is coming to be understood that the best farm practice demands the use of the manure on all the thin land that is being seeded, or has been seeded, to clover or grass, or other plant that will be used to furnish organic matter to the soil.

"The market gardner wants the manure fermented and ready for immediate use. As his supply from the city is nearly unlimited, and he depends directly upon the manure for the fertility needed by his crops, this practice pays him; but the farmer works under different conditions. His land lies in grass or clover a year or two preceding the one in which a ploughed crop is grown, and the manure that is spread on the clover or grass disintegrates, and is used up by the roots in the sod. The less an expense that attends the rotting of manure in pits is unnecessary in the farmer's case, and hence there is no better time to scatter manure than when taken from the stable. It then contains more plant food than it ever will again; no matter how carefully it may be preserved. The only exception to this rule that requires attention is in case the surface of the ground is full of water and hard frozen. Under those circumstances there is danger of loss from washing by rains. It is probable, however, that the loss from this source in this country is not equal to one-tenth of 1 per cent of the loss of fertility in barnyards.

"It seems to me that the practice of drawing manure to fields and placing it in small conical piles has nothing to commend it. This method is often employed when the manure is wanted in the spring for top dressing, but usually there is a sod field that can use the manure as soon as made, and will more than double in value to a spring crop by making an increased vegetable growth for the soil. When the manure is put on the surface of a field intended for a ploughed crop, it is only a source of fertility. When it goes on a sod, or on ground intended for wheat and grass, it helps the sod to furnish a greater store of plant food. If it can be spread evenly on the surface, ten loads per acre do more to increase the fertility of the farm than fifteen loads used on bare land.

"The truck field (or patches) gets too great a share of manure. There should be rotation with clover here as well as in other fields, and then one part of the farm would not be robbed to feed another. The chances of an abundant yield of "truck" is enticing but in the end the manure will give the best returns on the thin portions of fields where the sod is, or promises to be, light. Evenness in fields is most desirable, and we should look to the barnyard manure to secure it. Heavy applications on a small area, or the ploughing under of manure,

are not calculated to make best returns in a series of years when the supply is relatively small,"—Prairie Farmer.
