THE NEW YEAR.

Before another issue of the HERALD reaches our readers the year 1896 will be ushered in. Could the veil be lifted and a glimpse of the future seen, it might cause the strongest heart to flinch. Are we to witness the carnage of war? This is a question considered by all. While we hope such is not the case, all true Americans stand ready to back the patriotic position taken by President Cleveland and both houses of our National Congress.

There are other questions of importance to come before the American people during the coming twelve months, including the election of officers of state aud Nation. While this will be settled on partisian basis, the loyal hearts of our great country can be trusted to support the officers chosen.

What of the future of our own beautiful little city? Are our citizens going to stand as one man and work for her advancement and best interests, or are they going to allow selfish motives, and petty wranges to devide them and retard the forward march of our municipal prosperity. of the following monthlies: Mc We hope that all will unite and work for the advancement of Tawas City, and surrounding country, and that the year 1896 will be the most prosperous ever known.

It is evident that John Bull will either "come off the perch," or Uncle Sam will pull him off.

THE senate passed the house bill embedying President Cleveland recommendations on the Venesuelan question last Friday, and the President signed it Saturday.

LAST Friday President Cleveland sent to congress a message urging delphia success, the Ladies' Every congress not to adjourn for the holidays without taking some action to relieve financial matters of the nation and on Monday the house responded by pigeon-holing the resolution for rings, handsome silk dress pattern, the holiday recess. Some important financial legislation may be looked for within a few days, but of just what kind it is dificult to say.

Michigan Institute Work.

The last legislature appropriated \$5,000 for each of the years 1×95 and 1896 to cover the expenses of holding Farmers' Institutes throughout the state, says a press report of Michigan. Heretofore but \$1,000 a year was ex-, pended for this purpose and the scope of the work was, therefore, much restricted, the northern part of the state being entirely slighted. These Institutes are held under the direction of the State Board of Agriculture, and when the increased appropriation was made the board decided to do the fair thing by the hereto ignored counties.

The experiment of holding these Institutes in the newer agricultural counties has proven a success. Although some of them were not very largely attended, the attendance upon others was fully as large as that upon Institutes held in the southern portion of the state last year. "In many of the counties," says Kenyon L. Butterfield, superintendent of Institutes, many of the farmers did not know what an Institute was, having scarcely heard of such a thing, to say nothing of participating in one. They did not just know what to expect, but it was these very farmers who went away from the Institutes enthusiastic in their praise of the meetings and confident of the great good they are sure to accomplish. The seed having been sown, there is no doubt that next year's Institutes at these places will be much more largely attended-"

Superintendent Butterfield says that it would be difficult to estimate the benefits resulting from the Institutes held in the northern counties. Not only have the people received instruction of a nature which they ap-

preciate, but the Institutes have been an inspiration to them. The most important discovery they have made is that they have themselves had experiences which, when exploited, are sure to be of great benefit to themselves and to their neighbors as well. The diffident ones have been taught that they are able to advantageously relate their experiences, and that the Institutes are a benefit to them socially and financially. One fact demonstrated by the Institutes is the influence for good that is exerted by the Grange. In counties where the Grange has been at work for a number of years no difficulty was experienced in arranging for Institutes and securing a large attendance; in counties where the Grange is unknown the farmers were not accustomes to holding meetings of any kind for mutual improvement and benefit, and the attendance was smaller and the discussions less instructive.

Another great benefit which has already followed the holding of Institutes in the northern counties, is that those from the southern part of the state who attended them in the capacity of lecturers and instructors have come to know for the first time the great possibillities in the way of agricultural development which they obtain there. These possibilities were a revelation and the information concerning them, which will be disseminated as a result of the holding of the Institutes and the visits of wellknown men, will stimulate the development of those sections of the state, and open new and fruitful fields for persons in search of homes, -Prairie Farmer.

Dehorning Cows.

In a number of cases that have come under our observation the yield of milk of cows inclined to be bad tempered has been very materially increased by dehorning; and at the same time the cows have been made more agreeable to milk and to handle. It is well known that the cow that quietly, peaceable, and contentedly feeds and chews the cua makes more milk-other things being equal -than the cow that is quarrelsome and in a turmoil. Dehorning nearly always has a remarkably quieting effect on bad-tempered cows; and sometimes such a cow is a splendid milker -too valuable to be sacrificed when dehorning will make her tolerable and at the same time increase her milk yield. The most has been said about the advantage of dehorning steers to fatten, but probably the greatest gain is from dehorning cows. -Orange Judd Farmer.

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
