

The chinch bug extends over most of the United States east of the Rocky Mountains. It is double brooded, the insect passing the winter in the adult Every Monday, Wednesday and Friday, at 5;15 stage, very largely at least, and depositing eggs for the first brood of POINT LOOKOUT, young becoming full grown and de-Rule 7. Kerosene emulsion, made and applied as recommended in the text will be found effective; ditching in front of their advance, and plowing, harrowing and rolling the ground will bury fungus can be used to advantage when the weather is favorable, espedamp. The burning of grass, leaves and rubbish in winter will destroy many hibernating adults and reduce their numbers the following year.

Many of the state experiment stations are now supplying the chinch bug fungus to farmers free of charge, with the hope of eventually controlling, if not entirely destroying the pest.-WesternPlowman.
